GOOD ROADS NOW UP TO THE VOTERS

MAJORITY MUST DECLARE IN FAVOR OF THE COUNTY SYSTEM AT ELECTION NOV. 8.

SUPERVISOR ON THE QUESTION

Gives It as His Opinion That Marquette County Could Accomplish Excellent Results With the Proposed System.

There is one ballot that the voters of Marquette county should take care not to overlook November 8, and that should be sure to vote it right, said a member of the board of supervisors in The Mining Journal yesterday.

Do you think it would be possible for Marquette county to get a special act of the legislature vesting the control of the road improvements in the board of supervisors? The member was asked.

I should think that we might get such an act if we wanted it, was the reply. At our last meeting Mr. Wells, you remember, expressed the opinion that we could get the desired legislation quickly enough if we were a unit in asking for it.

These are details, however. The principal thing now necessary is to impress people with the desirability of a majority vote in favor of the proposed system. The supervisors went into the question extensively, and the fact that they decided unanimously to submit it to the voters of the county is a proof that they were favorably impressed.

The conservation of the board is a guarantee that the system will be administered carefully. The cost of building new roads will never become burdensome. At \$10,000 a year, say, certainly not an exorbitant sum, the county would be well provided with good main roads in ten years.
