A few minutes before the fight occurred, Vaughn left the house and started down Pine street. The detectives arrested him and returned and entered the house. Shea, McClusky and Dwyen were leading; Boyle and James were behind with the prisoner.

Hardly had the detectives entered the room in which Rose and Blair were seated, when they were met with a volley of shots. Shea sank to the floor on the first shot, and Dwyer followed almost instantly. The other detectives drew their revolvers and there was an exchange of shots for several seconds, each man pulling his trigger as rapid-

During the excitement Vaughn attempted to assist Rose and Blair. Boyle and James, however, clubbed their revolvers, beat their prisoner over the head until he was unconscious and thenwent to the aid of the other de
