SOO CELEBRATION A BIG SUCCESS

TWELVE THOUSAND VISITORS ARE PARTICIPATING IN THE INTERNATIONAL FETE.

MANY NOTABLE MEN PRESENT

Yesterday, the Opening Day, Marked by Ideal Weather—Marine Durbar and Military Parade Features of the Program—A Surprise by Peter White.

Yesterday, the opening day of the semi-centennial celebration at Sault Ste. Marie, was marked by perfect weather, an attractive program, and attendance that exceeded the expectation of the most optimistic friends of the project.

The real opening of the celebration began with the arrival of the training ship Yantic, Monday evening, the event being the occasion for a splendid demonstration in honor of the distinguished men who were to be the city's guests for two days.

The canal celebration brought together a large number of men distinguished as statesmen, industrial capitalists and business men. A prominent Cleveland banker who is in close touch with industrial conditions in the Lake Superior region said yesterday that representatives were present from practically every important corporation or firm identified with steel and iron working industries and lake shipping interests.
