CASCADE RANGE QUIET.
Richmond Mine Is the Only Property in the District Getting Out Ore.

JACKSON HOUSES DAMAGED.
Property Owners Suffered Losses as Result of Powder Mill Explosion.

The Richmond property, operated by the Consumers' Ore company, is the only mine on the Cascade range that is getting out ore. A force of about 150 hands is employed. Early in the season much preparatory work was done, and shipments were not started until after the crusher plant was ready for operation. Since the crusher was started the working force has been doubled, a night crew having been added, and all the ore mined is going forward. It is expected that the property will be operated up to the close of navigation. The output will be the largest in the history of the Richmond, despite the fact that mining was not started until June. The new equipment installed put the property in first-class condition for rapid and economical mining. Several drilling machines are working continually. The ore is reached easily, and the method of delivering it to the crusher is inexpensive. Next season the Consumers' company will be able to almost double the 1905 output, as the stopes will be larger and will admit of working a greater number of men.

The work at the Moore, operated by the Oliver Iron Mining company, is at present confined to stripping the deposit. The force is not as large as was employed earlier in the season, when it was thought that the company would want considerable of the ore. However, the management is preparing the stopes for a large output when there is a demand for the product. The mine is well equipped with machinery and tracks leading to the open pits. The Moore ore is crushed at the Escanaba plant.

A sister resides at Palmer and a brother and the father at Baltic, Houghton county. The funeral will be held Wednesday at 9 o'clock, with services at St. Paul's church.
