TO IMPROVE CEMETERY. DIED AT BUTTE.
About 150 Trees Will Be Planted in Part of Plat Acquired Last Year. Former Ishpeming Man Passed Away Yesterday in Montana City.

The board of cemetery trustees held its annual meeting yesterday afternoon. Plans for the improvement of the grounds were discussed and it was decided to plant at least 150 trees in the planted portion of the ground acquired last year from the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company, adjoining the old site on the west. About one-half of the ground, or twenty acres, was planted last year, and a fence built around it, at a cost of something over \$400. The front fence is built of pickets, matching the fence of the old plat, and barb wire was used on the north side and at the rear. Some work was done on the roads, but these will be considerably improved the coming year.

The vault at the cemetery is not large enough. There is now little room left in it, and the board will soon have to open the roads to the lots. The board will likely ask for the enlargement of the vault a year hence. Its capacity is forty-five caskets.

At the close of business last year there was a balance of \$188.36 in the cemetery fund. The receipts during the past year for permits issued and on the sale of lots were \$1,687. The sum expended for labor, material, surveys, etc., principally on the new plat, amounted to \$2,048.90, leaving a deficit of \$851.99. As the bills are paid direct from the city funds an appropriation to meet the deficiency will not be necessary.

The members of the board say that it is many years since they have had to handle as much snow in keeping the roads passable as this winter. One of the members said that the snow is nearly ten feet deep in places.

Cobalt Gossip

The Trethewey's new ore-sorting plant is in full operation.

The Silver Queen has begun crosscutting north from the seventy-five-foot level to cut another vein in that direction.

The Prince Rupert is a property taking high rank in its district, which is in the unsurveyed portion of Coleman. It is developing a very important vein of Cobalt ore.

The ore shoot of Silver Queen has developed great richness in the east face of the seventy-five-foot level, some of the richest ore yet found in the property coming from there. The percentage of nicolite in this ore is not so high as the ore body carries near the shaft, but the silver values are very high. The vein is about fifteen inches wide.

A return of the mineral production of the province of Ontario for 1906 has been issued by the bureau of mines. The camp production of silver from the Cobalt camp for the period is given as 5,357,840 ounces value \$2,343,089. Up to the end of 1906 the same report credits the entire Ontario district with a production of 2,016,061 ounces of silver worth \$2,915,478.

F. J. Jennison discussed the matter at length. He took up each of the important suggestions which have been advanced to improve the water supply of the city.

Septic Tanks Not Favored. He said septic tanks might be practicable, but there is an element of doubt there also.

Protest to the Governor.

Alderman Siegel offered a resolution protesting against the action of certain Marquette citizens in using their influence with Governor Warner in opposition to the bill amending the city charter.

A communication was received from P. Van der Smissen, asking that a settlement be made with him for injuries sustained by his wife, who was struck by a horse.

The council accepted the offer of Lester Clark to purchase the boiler and engine at the city engine plant for \$200.

Alderman Bush of the special committee appointed to investigate the matter of having a map of the city water and sewer systems made reported that Mr. Cummings offered to make the map for not more than \$2,000.

The matter of publishing the annual report of the city was discussed at some length, and Mayor Culver was authorized to appoint a committee of three to look into the proposition, the committee to report at the next meeting of the council.

The ordinance granting the Lake Superior Railway Company a franchise to enter the city with an interurban railway was adopted finally.

According to a statement regarding the business of fire insurance in Michigan during 1906 given out by Insurance Commissioner Barry, more risks were written than in any previous year in the history of the Michigan department, the total for the year being \$84,798,289 as against \$54,032,000 for the previous year. Five insurance companies, however, were slightly less profitable than for the preceding year, the losses being heavier than at any time since 1901. The percent of loss to the amount of premiums received was 44, while in 1905 it was 39. The losses paid during the year aggregated \$3,111,235, while the premiums received were \$7,008,845. Apparently there was a good margin of profit in the business, but from the 64 per cent of income not paid out for losses must come all the expenses of the companies. The aggregate of surpluses of companies doing business in the state is less than a year ago, owing to the San Francisco losses.

WHOOPIING COUGH DEADLY. An astonishing increase in number of deaths from that cause. The annual report of the chief of the department of vital statistics of the Secretary of state, shows that 36,478 persons died in Michigan in 1906, which is 2,199 more than the number of deaths in 1905. The death rate last year was 14.1 for each 1,000 inhabitants. An astonishing feature of the report is the increase shown in the number of deaths from whooping cough, which was 127 for 1905 and 450 for 1906. This disease is little controlled by sanitary regulations and exhibits natural epidemic fluctuations. A slight increase in the number of deaths from tuberculosis was noted, but it amounted to less than one death for each 100,000 persons. Scarlet fever, diphtheria, croup, typhoid fever and measles all showed a considerable increase in the number of their victims. There were not three deaths from small pox during the year. Pneumonia, 104; cancer, 159; violence, 171. The total number of deaths reported to the department of state for the month of January was 3,235, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.1 per 1,000 estimated population. This number exceeds that for the month of December by 568, and also exceeds the number reported for January, 1906, by 367. Important causes of deaths were as follows: Pulmonary tuberculosis, 187; other forms of tuberculosis, twenty-eight; typhoid fever, forty-nine; diphtheria and croup, forty-nine; scarlet fever, twelve; measles, twenty-one; whooping cough, thirteen; pneumonia, 65; diarrhoea and enteritis, under two years, forty-three; meningitis, fifty; influenza, 104; cancer, 159; violence, 171. Pneumonia and influenza claimed an unusually large number of victims during the month. There was one death reported from rabies in the township of Frontenac, Saginaw county. There were 3,677 birth certificates returned for the month of January, corresponding to an annual birth rate of 17.0 per 1,000 estimated population.
