### RED FLAG RALLY IN ST. PETERSBURG

Proletariat of the City and the Students at the University Participate in Monster Social Democratic Demonstrations.

Assemblage of the Duma Is Made the Occasion of a Menacing Display of the Revolutionary Spirit-Situation Is Fraught With Peril of Fearful Massacre, Yet Such Measures Are Adopted That Order Is Restored With but Little Bloodshed.

St. Petersburg, March 5.- The opening today of the duma, or lower house of the Russian parliament, although in itself deveid of incident, was made the occasion of a great revolutionary demonstra-tion by the St. Petersburg proletariat and students of the city, which resulted in several encounters between the police and populace and more or less serious injury to a number of the latter. The situation was so menacing that the authorities finally were forced to fill the streets with military patrols, as in the omnious days of the Trepoff regime.

The duma formally opened at noon in l'auride palace in the presence of all the ministers and many high functionaries. No member of the imperial family was present. Feodor Golovin, president of the Moscow tomstvo and a leader of the Constitutional Democrats, was elected

After the adjournment of the house, a tumultous crowd, by this time estimated at close to forty thousand, with red banners flying and accompanied by the music of revolutionary chants, started toward the central quarter of the city, where the winter palace of the emperor is located.

He has incurred the unrelenting enmity of politicians of great influence in the western states. They have sought in various way to acomplish his downfall. He let the stockmen know when they were here that he was in earnest and that he did not propose to stand still and allow a few men of large financial and political influence reap the chief benefits of the nust pay for them. C. W. Merchant, who owns 15,000 cat-

le on the range in New Mexico, was one of the men who came here to see what ongress would do this session. He has been in the cattle business for forty years, and left Texas with his herds when that state finally won in its struggle with the free grass cattlemen. 

Sec. 10. At all street crossings the tracks shall be so planked, paved or otherwise constructed by the company as to make a safe and convenient crossing for vehicles and pedestrians and shall correspond in material.

Sec. II. Said company shall keep in good repair all poles, wires, tracks, paving, macadam, crosswalks and other structures and improvements made by it to the satisfaction of the proper supervising city authority; and upon failure, after proper notice thereof, to promptly make any such repair, or to promptly make any change therein, herein authorized to be required, the city may cause the same to be done and the cost and expense thereof shall be paid by the company on demand.

Sec. 19. Only competent, experienced and sober persons, over twenty-one years of age, shall be employed as conductors or motormen on the cars of said interurban railway. Conductors of passenger cars shall be in uniform while on duty. They shall assist such infirm persons as require assistance to enter and leave the cars, and shall not permit women or children to enter or leave the cars while the same are in motion. Upon leaving each street or highway crossed by the car the conductor shall distinctly announce to the passengers within the name of the next street or stopping place on the

Sec. 6. The location and construction of the tracks and all structures and appliances of such interurban railway placed in any street of the city shall be under the direction and supervision of the common council, or its duly authorized agent, or such other board, officer or authority as shall be by law or ordinance charged with the superintendence of street improvements in said city.

Cars driven in the same direction shall not approach nearer each other than one hundred feet, unless from unavoidable necessity, or on switches or turnouts.

Sec. 21. Unless prevented by accident tailed, or out of the exercise or engoyment of the same by the company; or out of the failure of the company to comply with the laws of this state and of the ordinances and regulations of the city; or growing out of the failure of the company to construct and keep in repair its tracks, structures and appliances, and the pavement, crossings and other improvements herein required to be kept in repair by the company; and the company shall pay all such damages, costs and expenses on demand. 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### WANT INTEREST ON CITY MONEY

SOLUTION

lity Cannot Secure Interest at Present On Account of Virtual Contract With Banks-End of Fiscal Year to Change Situation.

The securing of interest on city funds in deposit at local banks was brought up at the meeting of the council Monday committee, was called upon for an expression in regard to the matter, that committee having been instructed to look into it. Mr. Asire reported that the terms under which the city money is now deposited prohibits any new agree ment being entered into at this time.

The money is about equally distributed between the three banks, they pay ing no interest, but furnishing treas urer's bonds for the city taxes, which costs them in the neighborhood of \$300 a year and also furnishing a persona bond for the treasurer for the state and county taxes. This also comes to a considerable figure. Mr. Asire pointed out that the city is virtually under a contract with the banks on those terms and thus no change can be made until the expiration of the fiscal year.

March 13, however, is the end of the fiscal year, and then something will undoubtedly be done in the matter. The displeasure with which the present system is regarded dates back a considerable period, the people being dissatisfied with giving the banks the use of the city funds without their paying anything for the privilege. Pressure was brought to bear on the council to remedy present conditions some time ago, but the facts cited by Mr. Asire prevented anything being done. The amount of city money on deposit is always considerable. and it is argued that the furnishing of treasurer's bonds by the banks by no means recompenses the city for the loss

The question of the rate of interest which should be paid was brought up for a moment at the council meeting No action was taken, as the rate could only be determined by a conference with the bank officials. It was the sentiment among the aldermen that a different arrangement should be made at the begin ning of the next fiscal year, and the finance committee will very likely come to an agreement with the banks by which the city will receive a fair rate of
