"My company," he said, "relying on the mining act passed by the legislature, has either expended or obligated itself to expend \$2,500,000 in connection with the owners as partners for the development of properties that have been lying idle in the upper peninsula for forty years. These properties are known as the Superior, Cratiot, Caldwell, Manitou, Tecumseh and La-Salle, and their development was undertaken with the honest purpose of increasing the output of copper. In addition the Calumet & Hecla has expended several millions in purchasing stocks of mines that are already producing.

"We have been told that our purpos is to shut up these mines so as to re strict the output of copper. The direct expand them and produce as much more copper as can be done economically for benefit of the other shareholders equally with my own company as a shareholder.
