



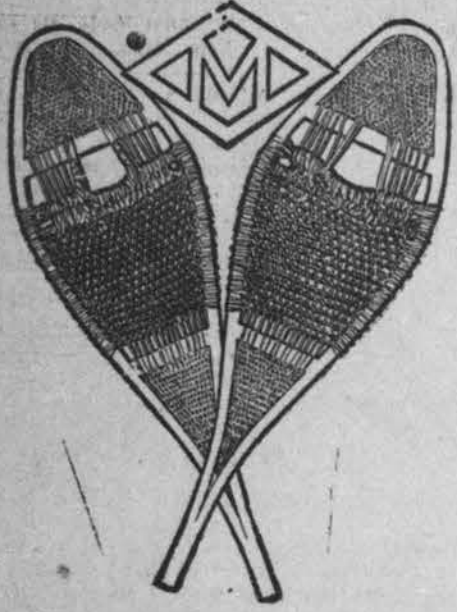

ICE HOLDS ITS OWN. Summary for Week Ending March 13, Just Received.

The summary of ice conditions issued from Detroit is as follows: The reports from the regular and display stations of the weather bureau indicate that there are extensive ice fields over the western portion of Lake Superior and no material change over the eastern portion. No change in St. Mary's river. The ice in Green Bay remains solid. There is very little ice reported in Michigan, the fields have practically disappeared. No change is reported at the straits. In Huron there are extensive fields reported over the northern and extreme southern portions; the ice bridge at the foot of the lake broke on Monday afternoon and the field moved north about two miles. St. Clair river is reported solid from South Park to Lake Street Clair. The Detroit river is practically open from Lake Street Clair to Lake Erie. The ice fields along the south shore of Erie extend beyond vision and there has been no change during the week. In Ontario the ice fields have moved off the south shore and are reported only at the eastern end. The harbors remain solid.

In comparison with same period last year there is more ice reported in Superior, Huron and Erie and the ice is heavier in Green Bay.

Details follow:

Duluth—Harbor ice 13 to 35 inches; lake ice solid and extends beyond vision.

Two Harbors—Harbor ice 8 inches; ice fields have moved out about 2 miles from harbor and extend beyond vision.

Bayfield—Harbor ice 20 inches; about six inches of snow on the ice.

Washburn—Harbor ice averages 20 to 24 inches and firm.

Ashland—Ice in harbor 18 to 20 inches; no change during the week.

Omagon—Harbor ice 14 inches; the field ice extends beyond vision.

Ship Canal—The ice is solid and extends beyond vision.

Houghton—Ice averages from 18 to 22 inches and firm.

Eagle Harbor—The ice fields extend beyond vision and are heavily wind-eroded.

Marquette—Ice 12 inches and solid; extends out about eight miles; open water north with small fields of drifting ice visible.

Grand Marais, Mich.—Ice extends one mile from shore; beyond is open water with no ice in sight.

Whitefish Point—There has been no material change in condition of ice during week.

Sault Ste. Marie—No change in ice conditions during the week.

Escanaba—Harbor ice averages 26.5 inches; the ice in Little Bay de Noquet solid with two inches of snow covering it; parties driving over from Washington island report about two feet of solid ice in Green Bay.

Menominee—Harbor ice is 18 to 22 inches and firm.

Green Bay—The ice in the river is honeycombing and is unsafe to cross.

The incorporation is for thirty years.

BILL OF COMPLAINT AND RE-TRAINING ORDER FILED IN DISTRICT COURT HERE.

HEARING SET FOR MARCH 25

Bill of Complaint Made by President A. S. Bigelow of Osceola as Individual Stockholder—C. & H. Canot Vote Stock Today.

"And it is further ordered that pending the hearing herein directed to be held on said twenty-fifth day of March, the said defendant, Osceola Consolidated Mining company, its officers, agents and employees be and they are hereby specially restrained and enjoined from making any contracts or incurring any obligations of any kind or nature except such as may be necessary in the ordinary conduct of its business and affairs to the end that the rights of the various parties hereto be maintained in statu quo pending the said hearing. "This order is granted in the absence from said District of the Circuit Justices and the Judges of the Circuit Court of Appeals and the complainants has therefore not had a reasonable time to apply to the circuit court for the writ. "And it is further ordered that a copy of this order, certified under the hand of the Clerk and the Seal of this Court, together with a copy of the bill of complaint herein, be served upon each of said defendants as soon as may be after this date. DATE FOR HEARING ON THE GAME LAW COMMITTEE ON GAME AND FISH LAWS TO HEAR ARGUMENTS OF UPPER PENINSULA SPORTSMEN. Marquette sportsmen were interested yesterday to learn that a day had been set for hearing the requests of upper peninsula sportsmen for a revision of the game and fish laws. Advice from the copper country were to the effect that George Williams had completed the draft of the proposed act of amendment and had gone to Lansing with it. Mr. Williams was Houghton county's representative at the meeting here Feb. 6, and was one of the committee appointed to incorporate the suggestions adopted into a bill. For a time there was a fear in Marquette that the committee had neglected its work, and that the matter would not go before the legislature this session. Now, however, every doubt is removed, and it is up to the legislators to heed the requests of the upper peninsula people who believe in better protection for the game. The committee on game and fish laws will first deal with the bill, and if a fight does not develop before the committee it certainly will if the bill is reported unchanged to the house. The lower Michigan counties are lining up in strength against some of the proposed amendments. The members of the committee have been flooded with protests and petitions from sportsmen's associations in the lower peninsula counties, especially those just below the straits. As far as the upper peninsula legislators are concerned, it is expected that the representatives and senators from this part of the state will stand together in favor of the bill. Since the meeting here there have been a number of complaints from upper peninsula people on some of the suggestions adopted at the conference, but for the most part the sportsmen are content to accept the action of the meeting as final. The gathering was representative and as united as the state has ever seen in securing the legislation desired, it is improbable that those who are dissatisfied will do anything in opposition to the bill. One change which is believed to be assured is the removal of the forest warden to the state game warden's department. The sentiment of the conference here was strongly in favor of such action. It is learned that a lower peninsula legislator has introduced a bill providing for the desired change, and it is believed that it has every chance of going through. It is certain that the upper peninsula members will lend their support, as the disastrous forest fires here last spring brought the realization that better protection for the forests is necessary. With a sufficient number of game wardens patrolling the woods of the state, better protection would be assured both the game and the forests. TO LEAVE POSTOFFICE. Victor Vanhalla Accepts Position With U. P. Brewing Company. Victor Vanhalla, for over two years past assistant postmaster under John D. Mangum, has notified Mr. Mangum of his resignation, to take the position of auditor and traveling representative of the Upper Peninsula Brewing company, succeeding the late Charles J. Hanek. The resignation will become effective as soon as Mr. Mangum can fill the office of assistant. Mr. Vanhalla will have the territory covered by Mr. Hanek, and will travel as far as Newberry, down the line of the Northwestern, and to other points where the brewing company has business to be looked after. Mr. Vanhalla took up his duties as Mr. Mangum's assistant here Nov. 15, 1904, succeeding Myles Grylls, resigned. He came to Marquette from Lansing, where for four years he had been a clerk in the auditor general's department. Before going to Lansing Mr. Vanhalla was employed with E. Braasstad, at Ishpeming. He is well known throughout the county, particularly in Ishpeming and Marquette. As assistant in the postoffice Mr. Vanhalla has an excellent record, he having been efficient, devoted to his work and obliging to the patrons of the office. Mr. Mangum will be sorry to lose his services. His position with the Upper Peninsula Brewing company is in the nature of a promotion, as it will carry with it increased responsibilities. He is well equipped to make a record in it. FIRES NOT SERIOUS. Forty-Seven Reported For Year Ending March 1, 1907. Superintendent Kern of the board of fire and water commissioners, has completed his report on fires from March 1, 1906, to the corresponding date this year. Marquette escaped with a light fire loss for the year, and none of the fires were of a serious nature. There were forty-seven of them, and the total loss figures up to \$4,632.04, all but a small part of it covered by insurance. The policies covering the property that was endangered aggregated \$47,810. The most serious fire during the year was the burning of Carl Seigel's newly built store in North Marquette. It was destroyed August 8, and the loss, which was total, is given as \$2,500. The most serious fire after this was one at the Samsbrook planing mill July 19, when the loss was \$190. 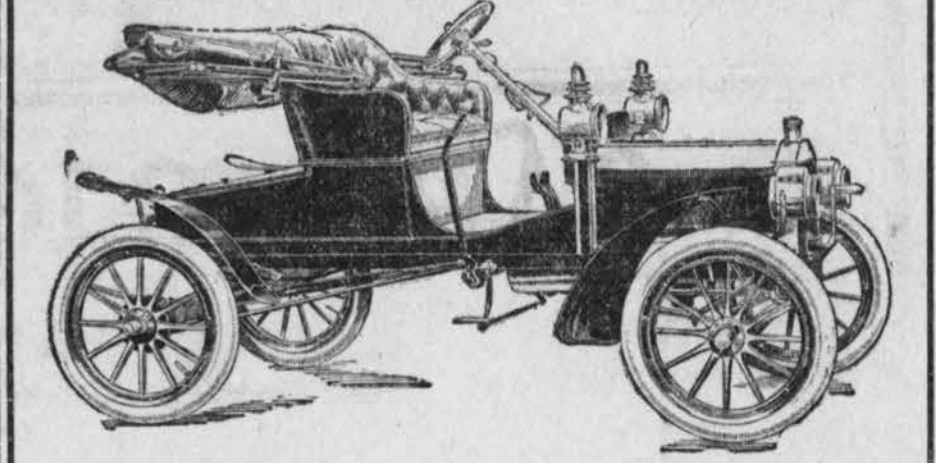
