



This report, which covers the business done by the canal for the six months Paine, Webber & Co. wired concerning ending December 31, 1906, has just been received by the department of commerce and labor. It shows that the gross receipts amounted to \$1,292,834, was added to through the earnings of the bridgewater department, the total balance carried to net profit account being \$738,300.

The wonderful financial success of the Manchester canal has surprised even the most ardent of those prophets who contended that it would become a great artery of commerce. Before its construction was begun the sentiment in England was similar to that in this country. Waterway development was not highly thought of, and the railroads were believed to be the only logical means of communication between ports and cities. That this premise was altogether wrong is shown in the fact that the traffic on the canal has shown a steady increase since 1893, when it was opened. In that year 686,158 tons were carried, while in the year just ended the traffic increased to 4,441,241 tons.

ON THE CANAL BOARD.

Youngest Rear Admiral, Rousseau, to Be Appointed.

Washnigton, March 11.-Harry H. Rousseau, civil engineer United States navy, chief of the bureau of yards and locks, with the rank of rear admiral, is at thirty-six years of age to become a member of the Isthmian canal commis-sion and will be the youngest member of that body as he is today the youngest officer in the navy who is chief of bureau or has the rank of rear admiral. appointment was offered him several days ago at the instance of Secretary Taft. When an administration official was asked today why Admiral Rous-

seau was appointed he replied: "The law requires that a civil engineer in the navy be a member of the commission and upon investigation we find that Rousseau is not only far and away the best man in his corps but is one of most promising young men in his profession. He is the sort of man we want on the commission; he had no backing except his record and no one could have been more surprised than he when the appointment was offered him."

Secretary Taft has been anxoius for ome time to obtain the appointment of Admiral Rousseau to the commiss but he insisted that he must resign his position as chief of the bureau of yards f he accepted a place on the canal commission. The new member of the com nission is by several years junior to the other members of the commission. He is a native of New York state and was appointed a civil engineer in the navy from Pennsylvania in 1898. He was recommended for his present billet by Rear Admral Converse, chief of the bureau of navigation, who told the president he was by long odds the best officer that could be obtained as the successor of the retiring chief of bureaus Mordecai T. Endicott.




