PROPHETIC HISTORY.

### Kaiser Conquers Many Lands by Means of an Aerial Navy.

Berlin, March 24.—The world triumph of Germany by means of an aerial navy is foretold in a book of prophetic history which has interested all Europe. The author, Rudolph Martin, predicts that the kaiser will have extended the German empire as far as Bagdad, in German empire as far as Bagdad, in western Asia, annexing Austria and TROLLEY CAR HITS Russia, by the year 1913, and this will have been mainly accomplished by a great fleet of armed airships.

The book is written with minute detail and much knowledge of international affairs and government. Herr Martin also has put into it much scientific knowledge, and impresses the reader with a sense of the high probability of what he foretells. Here is a summary of the great events prophesied in this remarkable book:

On New Year's day, 1910, the German emperor makes a speech to the generals and admirals assembled in Berlin. The monarch proves conclusively that the flying machine is the peculiar privilege of Germany; that "the future of Germany lies in the air."

But the speaker has counted without Japan. On Oct. 2, 1912, Japan declares war against Russia. The czar flies. The news of his flight reaches the duma at 5 o'clock in the afternoon of March 15, 1913, and a motion is carried unanimous ly by which the house of Romanoff-Holstein-Gottorp is formally deposed and Russia declared a republic.

St. Petersburg, March 24.-M. Pobiedonostseff, former procurator general of the holy synod, whose fall from power came in the spring of 1905, is dead at the

Mr. Pobiedonostseff dominated the reactionary influences in Russia for twenty-five years. Upon the ukase confer-ring religious liberty upon the empire, he was the power behind the throne, with a long list of victories over the reform

As head of the Greek church Pobiedonontseff was primarily responsible for the cruel persecutions of the Jews and Polish Catholics in the czar's dominions. He had always been an unrelenting foe to the United States and to the spread of American ideas in Russia. His career shows him to have been possessed of





> WANT SMALL ROADS EXCEPTED. Hearing on Passenger Fare Bill in Lansing Today.

> H. R. Harris, general manager of the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company's railoads, and H. A. St. John, who looks after the passenger business, left for Laning Saturday evening, with the purpose of appearing before the senate commitce on railroads today, a hearing on the roposed legislation to reduce passener fares to two cents a mile below the traits and to three cents in the upper eninsula having been set. Messrs, Haris and St. John will urge that the small ads in the upper peninsula be exceptd from the three-cent fare requirement. the proposed law is enacted, and be alowed to charge four cents a mile, as at

Mr. Harris has been in communication with the upper peninsula members of his point, and hopes to be able to have he small roads excepted from the operation of any general bill. The upper eninsula members are said to have it icated a belief that the legislature will ote for three-cent fares in this region The managers of the small roads assert hat there is no money in their passenger business even at four cents. 




