London, Tuesday, March 26 .- In a espatch from Sofia a correspondent of the Morning Post says that he has been informed from a reliable source at Rustchuk that ten Roumanian villages near there are burning, and that the flames are visible from Rustchuk.

Bucharest, Roumania, March 25 .--Plundering continues on a large scale in the districts of Roman, Putna, Jassy and Botosahni. There is much blooshed. The peasants are setting fire, to everything in reach, but they generally flee on the appearance of soldiery. FULL REPARATION

The minister for war has ordered the abbilization of four additional regiments at Jassy, where 12,000 troops already have been concentrated. At Jassy the artillery is encamped on the prin-cipal street. All the shops in town are closed. It is reported that large numbers of peasants, estimated at forty to fifty thousand, are ready to advance and attack the place.

A condition of anarchy prevails at Nanolossa, and reports from that village are alarming. A bloody encounter between peasants and the military is reported from Galatz, where on Sunday the troops fired on a gathering of people, killing two hundred. From Vasuli, it is reported that organized bands of robbers are maranding the district.
