# IS NOT ISSUED

Wage Conference on the Western Railroads Continues Unchanged, Pending the Conference With the Federal Commissioners.

Representatives of the Government, Acting Under the Erdmann Law at the Request of the General Managers, Will Endeavor to Bring About Peace Today, and the Outcome Is Anxiously Awaited-Meanwhile Both Sides Are Remaining Firm.

Chicago, March 29 .- Whether or not there is to be a strike of employes in the train service of the Western railroads hinges on the meeting to be held here tomorrow morning between federal government officials and representatives of the unions and the railroads. This ON RAILROAD ISSUE meeting was brought about by the general managers of the railroads, who appealed to Washington for the settlement of the difficulty under the terms of the Erdmann act.

The government will be represented by Martin A. Knapp, chairman of the interstate commerce commission, and Charles P. Neill, commissioner of labor. C. B. Brown, chairman of the board of managers, will be the spokesman for the railroads, and Grand Chief Morrissey of the railroad trainmen's union and Chief Garretson of the Conductors' organization will look after the interests of the men. There were no new developments today, both sides remaining firm.

LABOR STRIKE AT ST. LOUIS.

Walkout of Brewery Workers Affects All Plants in the City.

At a meeting tonight at which all the breweries in St. Louis and East St. Louis were represented, the strike of the employes was discussed, and it was decided to stand on the following propositions: A flat increase of \$1 per to all employes; not to grant the demands of any particular class of labor. The employes were censured for having instituted a strike without warning, thereby placing material worth \$100,-







COUNCIL DECIDES TO USE VOTING MACHINES FOR STATE AND COUNTY TICKETS ONLY. -

Mayor Culver's Appointment Is Confirmed by the Council-Police Fund Is Created-Annual Report of Officers Received.

only was made by Alderman Donovan Alderman Jenks took a stand in opposi tion to the motion. He said he though no change should be made, but that the machines should be given a fair trial. He said the arrangement of the tickets on the machine was simple and could be easily understood by all voters. Aldermen Gustafson and Reichel took the stand that the time which would be consumed by the voters in voting on the machines and with the ballots also would be too great. Alderman Siegel thought the election could be conducted better with the arrangement provided for in Alderman Donovan's motion.

Opposition to Motion.

Alderman Reichel offered an amendment to Alderman Donovan's motion providing for the use of the machines for state, county and city tickets and amend ments. The roll call on the amendment resulted: Yes, Aldermen Ball, Ekstrom Gustafson, Jenks, Reichel; No, Aldermen Asire, Bush, Campbell, Corbett, Donovan McCarthy, Siegel. Alderman Donovan's motion was then put and carried, Al-

derman Reichel voting No. Later Alderman Ball, who was occu pying the chair in the absence of Mayor Culver, called Alderman Asire to the chair and Mr. Ball led an effort to have the action on the machines reconsidered He said that if the machines were con sidered suitable two weeks ago, when the council resolved to use them, they should he considered so at the present time and he could see no valid reason for changing the action taken by the coun


