Washington, April 9.—According to the decision of the interstate commerce commission today, E. H. Harriman will be made to appear in the United States proceedings to be instituted to compel him to answer certain questions to which he refused to reply when he was on stand at the recent hearing by the commission in New York. Numerous conferences have been held on the subject by members of the commission in anticipation of this action, which win be brought as soon as Attorneys Kellogg and Severance, special counsel for the government, can prepare the case for ubmission to the court.

The hearing before which Mr. Harriman appeared was held in the latter part of February, and it was in connection with certain transactions of the Union Pacific that, on the advice of counsel, he refused to answer the questions put to him. It was brought out in the tesimony that the Union Pacific owned a large amount of Southern Pacific stock. Mr. Harriman was asked whether any and if so how much of that stock belonged to himself; when he bought it, and what price he paid for it, but he de-

lined to answer. Another question which he refused to answer and upon which the commission desires light was whether or not any of the directors of the Union Pacific were

Men Will Be Called Out Today, but There Is Doubt Any Considerable Number Will Quit-Union's Strength Problematical.

Wiring to three correspondents at Bis bee yesterday, relative to the rumors of a threatened strike in the Warren mining district, affecting the Copper Queen, Calumet & Arizona and Superior & Pittsburg Mining companies, Minnear & Co. stock brokers, at Laurium, last evening received the following telegrams:

"The situation here looks very serious. The companies are blacklisting all union men, and refuse to settle. The men, those who have affiliated with the Western Federation of Miners, will be called out of all mines before 7 o'clock tomorrow (Wednesday) morning. It cannot be told before them how strong the union is. It is rumored tonight seventy-five called to meet all bills. per cent of the men will quit."

"The Federation of Miners will call a strike, effective tomorrow morning. The strength of the union is not known, but it is believed that a big majority of the ficit at the end of the season. Calumen will not stop work. In my opinion, met took the cellar championship and the 'strike' will not last long.

"A strike begins tomorrow morning, Cannot prophesize a settlement. How-ever, I do not like the outlook."

It is not believed in the copper country that the trouble at Bisbee will be of long duration. There have been wholesale discharges of union men the past two months, and it is considered here that the bulk of the miners still on the pay rolls will continue at work. 




