Chicago, April 9.—The passing of famous baseball stars will be more pronounced this year than ever before. It will be back to the minor leagues for them and then, when they have outlived their usefulness there, obscurity. Baseball fans will miss the familiar features of Billy Gilbert, Doc Newton, Heinie Peitz, Joe Kelley, Jim Jackson, Jimmy Sebring, Bob Wicker, Kittridge and others who have in the past years been the major league players.

Doc Newton Goes to Montreal. Doc Newton, who was suspended by the New York Americans last fall, has been practically forced out of the big leagues and has accepted the terms of the Montreal club of the Eastern League.

TO SELL MINERAL RIGHT.

Members of German Aid Society Believe They Own Valuable Lands.

Thirty-nine members of the Negaunee branch of the German Aid society own the mineral right to the farm which the late Charles Warner left the society at his death, some one or ten years ago. At a meeting of the owners Sunday afternoon it was decided to make an effort to dispose of the mineral right, the surface rights having been sold a few years ago to a Finn, who has disposed of several tracts of the original tract of 280 acres to countrymen, who are now farming there.

The tract has been partially explored, and The Mining Journal is advised that ore was discovered in shallow pits. Frank Varsellino did some work there a few years ago, and he claims to have located an ore body.

About sixteen years ago George J. Maas put down one claim drill hole on the land, and it is asserted that he made Mr. Warner a liberal offer for the tract, but the old man refused it, asking a price that was so much in excess of what Mr. Maas was willing to pay that the latter immediately threw up his option, and suspended the exploratory work.

Some of the members are willing, and in fact eager, to explore the tract on their own account the coming summer, but there is opposition to the spending of any money for that purpose. The question was discussed at the meeting Sunday, but inasmuch as all the members interested in the property would not agree no work will be done at this time.

The land is favorably located with reference to other mining properties on the range. Diamond drill work is now being done on three sides of the tract by mining concerns which either own or have options on the lands, and it is said that ore has been found in a number of places. The Richmond mine, owned by the Consumers' Ore company, is about half a mile east of the Warner lands, while the Star West, the property of the Corrigan-McKinney company, is not a much greater distance south; the Volanteer lies northwest of it. The men interested have agreed that the mineral rights shall be sold outright, or a lease given on reasonable royalty terms.

OLD DOMINION.

President C. S. Smith of the Old Dominion company has returned from a visit to the mines. He says: "The Old Dominion is nearly back to the position it was in before the fire and floods of the early part of 1906. Since these troubles we have been able to open the ore bodies in the west end, but we are now able to take care of the water, which is diminishing. We now have reason to believe that this water comes from Pinal creek, but it can be easily and cheaply controlled. It is one of the most remarkable ore developments that have occurred in the Southwest.

"It is providential for Old Dominion stockholders that the Lee-Higginson option was not exercised. It probably would have been had there been the present developments at that time, but when the mine was examined by the Lee-Higginson experts No. 1 crosscut on the fourteenth level was in a low grade milling ore and there were no indications of an ore body eight feet wide averaging 25 per cent copper. Of course the great importance of this ore body, outside of its richness in copper contents, is the fact that it is at the lowest depth in the mine. It is rather remarkable that directly above this rich ore body the ground is a broken quartz, what is called chicken feed quartz, and barren of copper, but we are now 200 feet below the barren ground in the richest ore in the mine.

Remarkable developments are particularly important in view of the geological survey report on the Globe district which report that below the twelfth level the Old Dominion would go into lean sulphides, that no rich ores would be found below the twelfth level. The Old Dominion mine proper is now producing about 900 tons of ore per day, and the capacity of the main working shaft, which was thought to be too large for the Old Dominion, is now taxed to the utmost. ALCOHOL AS FUEL.

Senator Hansbrough at Work to Promote Its Manufacture.

Washington, April 8.—Senator Hansbrough of North Dakota, the author of the denatured alcohol law, who is still here, is taking advantage of every opportunity to impress on the president the importance of the treasury department exercising good judgment in the preparation of rules and regulations for the manufacture and sale of new fuel under the law as amended at the recent session of congress. The new law does not go into effect until the first of next September. It is designed to encourage the manufacture of the fuel by farmers, who it is expected will club together and engage in the making of denatured alcohol in much the same way they now co-operate in many sections of the country in conducting creameries.

The original law providing for the manufacture of denatured alcohol passed nearly a year ago is a flat failure. It developed before it was put into effect that the whiskey trust had got in its work by having the legislation so worded as to make it impossible for anybody outside the whiskey trust to engage in the manufacture of the fuel. The treasury department added to the uselessness of the legislation by adopting rules and regulations which make it next to impossible for dealers to handle the stuff after the whiskey trust has made it. The internal revenue office appears to fear that some one may convert a gallon of the denatured article back into the state in which it existed before it was denatured and use it for drinking purposes. This would, of course, be a violation of the internal revenue laws, and the internal revenue bureau has taken pains to throw all kinds of restrictions about the sale of the fuel.

Up to this time only small quantities of the denatured product have been on the market, and if there has been any demand for it, it is because it is a novelty. The price demanded by dealers in different parts of the country is extortionate. "I saw a sign, 'Denatured Alcohol for Sale,' over a drug store from here in Washington the other day," said Senator Hansbrough, "and I stepped in and asked how much it was a pint. The proprietor answered, twenty cents, or \$1.60 a gallon. Now that is outrageous. Twenty or twenty-five cents a gallon would be a fair price. I am told that dealers all over the country have been asking from fifteen cents to twenty-five cents a pint for the fuel, and there has

CIGARETTES NOT INJURIOUS IF USED MODERATELY, SAYS NEW YORK JUDGE.

Magistrate Mayo, Sitting in Famous Children's Court, Declares Tobacco is Never the Cause of Moral, Mental or Physical Infirmity.

That cigarettes, so far as he has observed in years spent on the bench, are not ordinarily injurious to either minor or adults, if used moderately, is declared by Magistrate John B. Mayo, presiding over the famous Children's Court in New York. Probably no living member of the judiciary is better qualified by observation and professional experience to judge the effect of tobacco—especially cigarettes—on the moral, mental and physical man or youth. Magistrate Mayo once more exposes a popular fallacy.

"The deleterious consequences visited on so many tobacco users are purely, in the great majority of cases, traceable to the abuse rather than the use of the weed," he said. "Whether it be in the form of cigarettes or otherwise, the moderate use of tobacco, so far as I have observed, has rarely been injurious in itself. Its abuse is entirely relative to the individual, one person being peculiarly subject to the narcotic effect, where another may be benefited. Of possibly thousands of lads who have come under my notice as cigarette smokers, I recall no specific cases where a boy has been morally or mentally weakened by tobacco alone. Tobacco is so habitually made a scape-goat as to be notorious, whereas, in fact, cigar and cigarette smoking even to excess is generally the result and never the cause of viciousness and insanity."

"I do not presume," Magistrate Mayo emphasized, "to be an alienist or even an expert in such matters, but so far as my observations have gone the cases in which young men and boys have become moral, mental or physical weaklings have seldom or never been due to cigarettes. Insanity can never be charged, in my opinion, to the use of tobacco without other contributing causes. I should say, however, that the best cigarettes are less apt to be harmful than those of inferior quality. Drink too much coffee and you pay the penalty just as you must by smoking or doing anything else immoderately."
