Nobody expects to see mucl netal sold lower than twenty-five cents for the first half of the current year which will make the companies solid for twenty-cent average price for 1907 at the most conservative calculation.

The situation generally is thought to singe on the amount of copper that can be produced by some of the new plants which are expected to get into operation furing the coming summer. 


