MINER FALLS 100 FEET. Employee of Cliffs Shaft Mine Fatally Injured Yesterday Afternoon. With strikes threatened, curtailments in production talked of and indication of a drop in the price of metal, both in this country and abroad, the speculators in the copper shares have little to encourage them at this time.

Matthew Ready, a miner employed in the shaft of the Cliffs mine, fell a distance of 100 feet, from the fourth to the sixth level, yesterday afternoon, sustaining injuries that resulted in his death two hours later. It is not known how Ready happened to fall, but it is supposed that he was climbing the ladder and in some way missed his hold. Several bones in his body, also one arm and one leg, as well as his neck, were broken. Despite the badly shattered condition of his body Ready lived and was conscious until a short time after he arrived at the hospital. Coroner William Prin empaneled a jury, consisting of William Peters, Wm. Gibbs, Patrick Collins, Jabez Stevens, Gust Sandberg and John Stevens. After viewing the remains at William Leninger's morgue an adjournment was taken until this morning at 9 o'clock, when the inquest will be held.

The deceased was not known very well in the city, as only about six weeks ago he returned from the west, after an absence of three or four years. He was about thirty-five years of age and he boarded with his sister-in-law, Mrs. Patrick Ready, on Superior street. Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed, but it is likely that it will be held tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock from St. John's church.

FOX'S ORIGINAL IDEA. Ishpeiming Man in Lead and Zinc District Introduces New Scheme. Robert Fox, who is superintending operations at the Vandevanter Lead and Zinc Mining company's property near Cuba City, Wis., recently introduced a scheme for raising ore out of the drift holes that will doubtless be generally adopted in that field.

The announcement that a strike was on at the Bisbee mines, which came over the wires yesterday, caused many to dispose of their holdings. While no very definite news regarding conditions in the Bisbee district could be obtained, it was generally understood that a large number of the workmen had gone out and that the mines were working with greatly reduced forces. This action on the part of the Bisbee workmen was entirely unexpected by the Ishpeiming people interested in the properties, as the impression has prevailed here for some time past that the men were satisfied with their wages and that the union officers were not making any particular headway.

Leading selling agencies and producers have repeatedly stated that they could see no reason for a decline in the selling price of metal, but in the face of this assurance the price has been cut to time, and today an announcement was made that the price were reduced a 1/2 cent in both the bid and asked price in New York. Bisbee wires this morning that 25 per cent of the miners employed in that camp went out on a strike today. We are unable to state, but the Western Federation of Miners has been trying for some time past to secure a foothold in the camp, and it is altogether likely that this trouble is the outcome. The smelters are running as usual, but the mines are working with reduced forces. Everything is reported to be orderly and no serious trouble is anticipated. This strike is a little unexpected and coming in the face of the recent wage increase granted all employees is rather hard to account for. All Bisbee stocks have ruled somewhat lower, but the buying, particularly that coming from the southwest, has been better than for several weeks past.

### MARY CHARLOTTE SCHEDULE.

Rate of Wages to Be Same as Is Paid at Other Mines on Range.

There seems to be some misapprehension among the working men, particularly those formerly employed at the Mary Charlotte mine, where a strike was declared a week ago last Tuesday, as to the scale of wages to be paid by the Mary Charlotte Mining company under the ten-hour plan. When asked yesterday by The Mining Journal representative what the schedule will be, Assistant Superintendent Hodgson said that the scale would be exactly the same as is paid at other mines of the range working ten-hour shifts, or as follows: Miners on contract, \$2.00. Miners company account, \$2.35. Trammers on contract, \$2.35. Trammers, company account, \$2.20. Machine operators, \$2.60. Machine helpers, \$2.25.

Under the eight-hour system the scale was lower, the miners on company account having received but \$2 per day. The company account trammers were paid a like amount. Captain Hodgson said that the contract prices were in proportion and were somewhat lower than is to be paid for ten hours work. The Mary Charlotte company, the captain stated, will not take advantage of the men by asking them to work on the ten hour shift at the wage rate paid for eight hours. A few men were added to the underground force yesterday. Members of the strikers' committee complained to the officials because Mr. Breitung had not sent his ultimatum in writing direct to the men. They were told that Mr. Breitung had no intention of communicating with them in this manner, but that all instructions relative to the work, etc., will be given out at the company's Negaunee office.

### STRIKE DECLARED OFF.

Mary Charlotte Men Voted to Return to Work This Morning.

The Mary Charlotte mine workmen decided at a meeting held yesterday afternoon at the Finnish Socialist hall to return to work this morning. The vote on the proposition to declare the strike off was eighty-six in favor and forty-two against it, all of the men present casting a ballot. It has been evident since mining operations were resumed that the men had little or no chance of winning in their demand for the continuation of the eight-hour day, as a number who were last week in favor of continuing the strike had expressed a desire to return to work on the plan adopted by the company. The number present at yesterday's meeting did not represent 50 per cent of the men who walked out a week ago Tuesday, but it was nearly as many as have attended most of the meetings held since the third or fourth day following the strike. The action of the workmen was reported to Superintendent Foley yesterday and he told the men that all who applied for places this morning could return to work. It is expected that at least 50 per cent of as many men as were employed prior to the walk out will be on hand this morning prepared to go underground. Mr. Foley is unable to say at this time how much of a force will be employed during the coming summer, but it is not likely that as great a number will be given work as held positions there under the eight-hour system, as the workings are not sufficiently developed to permit of as many gangs as were previously employed. The announcement that the strike has been declared off will be received with much satisfaction not only in Negaunee but elsewhere in the county.

### GETTING FIRM HOLD.

The Leisen & Hennes Brewing company, represented in Negaunee by Harry Jackson, has greatly increased its business here during the past year through Mr. Jackson's efforts. The company proposes to assist Negaunee men in conducting saloon businesses, in order to increase its patronage. It has secured a lease on the Winter building on West Iron street, in which John Parala and H. Kottalo are now conducting a saloon, and the interior of the place is being improved preparatory to the change on May 1. A lease has also been obtained on the Lobb building, in which Joe Trathen has conducted a liquor business for some years past and the occupants of the Hogan building will be obliged to sell the Leisen & Hennes products, as a year's lease of the block has also been secured.

### TO IMPROVE PLANT.

Steam Turbine Generating Set Will Be Installed at Lighting Station.

Members of the board of public works and the electric light committee inspected the machinery at the municipal power station yesterday. Last week the council committee on lighting called attention to the fact that the present engine is not large enough to meet the city's demands, and recommended that a new one be installed. The matter was referred to the committee and the board of public works, with instructions to submit a recommendation at the next session of the aldermen. It is possible that recommendation will be made at the annual meeting this evening.

A steam turbine generating set, with a capacity of 300 kilowatts, will be installed. This will give the plant an increased capacity of 100 kilowatts. The new equipment can be installed without any addition or alterations to the building, so that the cost will be largely confined to the price of the machinery and the expense of installing it.

The new equipment will give the board of public works an opportunity to greatly increase the business of the plant, which has now almost reached the limit of the engine's capacity. With an additional capacity of 100 kilowatts, or an increase of one-third, between 1,500 and 2,000 additional incandescent lights can be placed on the circuit. The increase in the business of the lighting plant has continued monthly for nearly two years past, ever since its inauguration was placed under the board of public works, and there is reason to believe that even more additional patronage can be obtained. A number here are now planning on installing the light at their homes, and prospects for an increase in the patronage from the business houses are favorable.
