MUST RECOUNT VOTES ON RECORDER

COURT ISSUES ORDER TO COUNCIL TO RECONVENE AS CANVASSING BOARD.

ARGUMENTS MADE YESTERDAY

Matter May Be Taken Up This Evening, But More Probably On Monday—Writ Secured By Petitioner Yesterday Afternoon.

In circuit court yesterday morning Judge Stone granted the petition of Edward McCarthy for a recount of the votes in the recent election, in the Second and Fourth wards of the city of Marquette on the office of recorder, and has issued an order commanding the council to reconvene as a canvassing board and canvass the vote in these precincts. In an order issued by the court several days ago the council was commanded either to recount the votes or appear yesterday morning and show cause why it should not do so. It elected to show cause, and George P. Brown, who had been appointed city attorney, refrained from qualifying, in order that W. S. Hill, who had acted as advisor to the council in the matter, might represent it before the court. Mr. Hill's contention was that, as he interpreted the statute, twelve hours written notice of the filing of the petition with the canvassing board should have been given the opposing candidate prior to the adjournment of the board, and that as the petition and copy had been served on both the board and opposing candidate less than six hours prior to adjournment on the last day, this stipulation had not been complied with. Mr. Brown, for the petitioner, contended that service on the defendant at any time prior to the adjournment of the canvassing board was sufficient, so long as all other stipulations had been complied with.

Discussed Matter at Length. Judge Stone, in rendering his decision, went into the matter at considerable length, first reading the following extract from Section 1, Act 3725, compiled states of the state of Michigan: "The people of Michigan enact, that any candidate voted for at any election conveying himself aggrieved by any fraud or mistake by the canvass of the votes in any election or in the returns made, may, within three days after the conclusion of a township canvass, or on or before the close of the last day upon which the board of city canvassers meet, if a city or ward office, present to and file with the clerk of such board a written petition, which shall be sworn to, setting forth, as near as may be, the errors mistakes or frauds complained of. He shall at the same time deposit with the clerk of such board the sum of ten dollars for each and every township, ward or village referred to in his petition. Upon filing such petition, mak-

ing such deposit, and giving at least twelve hours written notice thereof to the opposing candidate by handing such candidate a copy thereof, it shall be the duty of the board of canvassers to proceed to make an investigation of the facts set forth in said petition. For which purpose the clerk, if no meeting be already appointed, shall call a meeting of such board of canvassers, and the said board shall have power to have the ballot boxes used in such election brought before them."

Judge Stone commented that the statute was unquestionably one that would be puzzling to the common people and apt to cause unnecessary complications. The answer of the council, he said, clearly admitted all the facts, and the matter hinged entirely upon whether or it was necessary for the petitioner to serve notice upon the opposing candidate twelve hours prior to the last session of the canvassing board. The law specifically stated that the petition should be served "on or before the last day on which the canvassing board meet." This gave the petitioner the right to serve notice up to the last moment that the board was in session. Such being the case the judge could not see how a petitioner could well be expected to serve a copy of a petition on his opponent prior to the service of the original on the canvassing board. He stated that he should be compelled, under the statute, to issue a writ, on the demand of the petitioner, reconvening the canvassing board, and granting a recount in the wards specified.

Order Served Yesterday Afternoon. The order for the recount was served upon Recorder Daniel Donovan by the contestant, Edward McCarthy, in person yesterday afternoon at 4:15 o'clock. The order specifies that the council "shall herewith resolve itself into a board of canvassers and proceed to the investigation of the vote on said office in the second and fourth ward." Mr. Donovan said that he interpreted "herewith" to mean within such a reasonable period of time as the council could be expected to convene. Today, being Saturday, he said, it might be impossible for all the members to leave their business, and while the meeting might be held this evening, it would more probably be held on Monday.

The recount committee will consist of three members, one chosen by the contestant, one by Mr. Donovan and the third by the council.

RECEIVES PLAT OF ISLAND.

May 21 Designated as Date on Which Application May Be Filed.

The Marquette land office has recently received the official plat of the survey of an island containing about half an acre, located in Lake Huron, section 32, township 42, north of range 1 west. The officials have designated, Tuesday, May 21, at 9 o'clock a. m., as the time for which applications for entry may be made.

The commission of the land office at Washington has affirmed the decision of the register and receiver of the local office in the case of Millie Henry vs. Sigurd Olson, involving thirty-five and one-quarter acres in Baraga county, awarding the right of entry to Millie Henry.

CRYSTAL FALLS DOWNS NORMALS

FAST LITTLE VISITORS SHOW BETTER TEAM WORK AND SUPERIOR CONDITION IN GAME LAST EVENING.



Outclassed in speed and team work but battling gamely from bell to bell, the Normals went down in defeat before the Crystal Falls basketball team at Fraternity Hall last evening by the score of 41 to 21. At no time in the struggle was the outcome other than a forgone conclusion. The visitors jumped into the lead at the start and were never headed. Hardly had the whistle blown when the ball shot down the hall like a flash and the visitors had scored from the field. They repeated inside of ten seconds. Before five minutes of play had passed they had 11 points to their credit while the Normals were still in the 0 division. Then the Normals rallied while the visitors with the game in a pocket let up momentarily, playing just hard enough to keep their lead safe. When the bell rang on the first half the score stood 26 to 11 in favor of Crystal Falls. The Normals started out with a rush in the second half, scoring the first three points. Lack of condition, however, soon told and the visitors forged to the front. The score for the second half was 15 to 10 in favor of the Crystal Falls High.

Due credit must be given the home team for putting up a game fight.
