















### SECOND RECOUNT TO BE ASKED

RECORDER DANIEL S. DONOVAN WILL ALSO APPEAL TO THE COMMON COUNCIL.

### SERVES NOTICE ON OPPONENT

Alleges Irregularities in First and Fifth Wards—Petition Will Come Up Today When Case of E. J. McCarthy Is Given Attention.

Following in the footsteps of Edward McCarthy, who has demanded and secured a recount of the votes in the Second and Fourth wards on the office of recorder, under an order of the court that the council reconvene as a canvassing board, Mr. Donovan, who has qualified for the office, will endeavor to secure a recount in the First and Fifth wards, and has filed a petition asking it, which will be presented to the council when it meets as a canvassing board this afternoon.

Whether the petition will be granted or not will depend largely on the stand taken by Mr. Hill, who will as advisor to the council, undoubtedly pass upon the legal aspect of the question. A copy of Mr. Donovan's petition was served on Edward McCarthy Saturday evening. Mr. Donovan alleges that he is aggrieved on account of mistakes and errors in the First and Fifth wards in the count on the office of recorder. The petition recites:

"That, as your petitioner is informed and believes, in said First ward four legal ballots cast for this petitioner were not counted for him. That at said election in said ward one or more votes were cast for this petitioner upon ballots which were improperly and erroneously rejected. That in said ward two or more votes were counted upon said ballots, for said Edward McCarthy which were cast upon ballots which were void by having thereon illegal distinguishing marks and should not have been so counted. That at said election more votes were counted, canvassed and returned for said Edward McCarthy than were actually cast for him."

In the Fifth ward the petition recites that one or more votes cast for the petitioner had been erroneously rejected, and that two or more votes counted for Edward McCarthy were void, owing to having been improperly marked.

Was Presented to Court.

The matter of a recount in the First and Fifth wards, as prayed for by Recorder Donovan, was presented to the court Friday, in connection with the proceedings over the petition of Mr. McCarthy for a recount in the Second and Fourth wards. It was represented by the attorney for Mr. Donovan that there would be a certain injustice to him in a recount of two wards, and the petition for a recount in two additional wards was presented. It was not formally acted on, however, not being part and parcel of the case the court was engaged in

hearing. Mr. Button, for Mr. McCarthy, at the conclusion of the hearing, urged the court to act on the petition for the recount in the additional wards, saying that the council was likely to recount them, but the court declined to formally pass on the matter, it not being before him in any legal form.

In this connection Mr. Button said yesterday: "The petition asked for a mandamus against the common council to compel it to recount the ballots in the First and Fifth wards. It was a sort of an alternative petition and was entitled 'In the case of Mr. McCarthy vs. the common council.' Its office was to get a recount in the First and Fifth wards if the court should order a recount in the Second and Fourth wards in the McCarthy case. At the time of rendering its decision in the McCarthy case, the court said in substance that it would not entertain the Donovan petition and upon its suggestion Mr. Hill withdrew it.

It has been claimed that the council has no right to recount the ballots in the First and Fifth wards, as asked for by Mr. Donovan, for the reason that his petition was not presented until long after the last day on which the council sat as a board of canvassers.

### TO CANVASS THIS AFTERNOON.

Dispute Over Recorder's Office to Be Settled at Meeting Today.

The council will reconvene as a canvassing board and recount the votes in the Second and Fourth wards on the office of recorder this afternoon at 2 o'clock, notice to that effect having been served on the aldermen Saturday afternoon. As only one office is involved the matter probably can be disposed of during the afternoon. George P. Brown, who was subpoenaed as a witness in a case at Marquette and is absent from the city, decided not to take the oath of office as city attorney until his return and has left the matter in the hands of Mr. Hill.

### NORMALS NOT DISCOURAGED.

Will Improve Team Work and Secure Other Basketball Games.

Undeterred by their defeat by Crystal Falls Friday night, the Normals have decided to arrange for other basketball games, and will practice hard to perfect themselves in team work. The team is composed of good material, but lack of condition was plainly apparent in Friday night's contest. Had the boys been able to maintain the gait they struck at the opening of the second half they might have overcome the long lead their opponents secured at the start of the game, but the latter's superior form told after a few moments of fast work. The Crystal Falls team showed a condition that could hardly have been expected in a high school team. When they appeared in their gym suits it was apparent that they had been trained to the minute. Their skins glowed a healthy pink and they were in a profuse perspiration before they had worked out five minutes. Perspiration is the best evidence of condition. An athlete who does not throw off moisture freely is not properly trained. Unless a man perspires freely it is impossible for his lungs to work properly and he cannot secure what is commonly referred to as "second wind."

The Crystal Falls boys improved as the game progressed, and were playing faster at the finish than at the outset, while at no period did any of them show the slightest distress. The lack of condition

of the home team was due in a great measure to the fact that their gym have not been in good condition, and they have not enjoyed an opportunity to secure the proper amount of exercise. All show a fair degree of muscular development and should, with the proper amount of training, make a good showing against any team in this region. That the game might be made very popular here is evident from the large attendance and the enthusiasm Friday night.

### BUSINESS BOOMING ON MESABA.

Season Will Be Busiest in Ore Production in History of Range.

Nels P. Flodin, of the Lake Shore Engine works, believes that the present season will be one of the busiest in the history of ore production in the Lake Superior region. Mr. Flodin's conclusions are based on the extensive orders for mining material recently received by his company and his observations during a trip on the Mesaba range, from which he returned but a few days ago. "Everywhere there was exceptional activity," said Mr. Flodin yesterday. "The mines are all running with every man they can secure, and in many of the towns there are veritable booms on. The development work is not confined to any one locality, but appears to be evenly distributed all along the range. A large amount of new mining machinery is being installed in many of the properties, to improve the facilities for handling the output."

According to Mr. Flodin, his own company is being pushed to meet orders. Hardly a day passes that large consignments of diamond drill supplies and drills to be used in exploratory work are not shipped to the mining districts. A carload of machinery, consisting of sheaves, skips and ore hoists, for the new Yawkey mine of the Pickands-Mather company, Virginia, Minn., was shipped a few days ago. Fifty saddleback tram cars were forwarded last week to the St. Paul mine of the Corrigan, McKinney company, near Nashauk; fifty more will soon be shipped to the Stevenson, near Hibbing, and fifty to the St. James at Aurora. The company has now under construction 120 ore cars, and 100 saddleback side-dump cars.

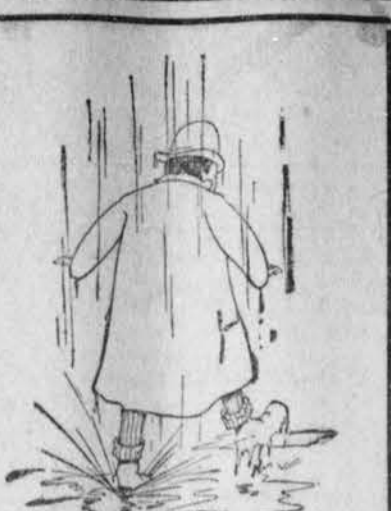
