

Unmistakable Trend Toward Open-Hearth Steel for Track Purposes.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 22 .- There is not much room for doubt that the develop-Task of Selecting the Schmitz Jurors in ments of the past week or two mark the passing of Bessenier steel as material out of which to manufacture stee rails for the larger railroads, although there is a likelihood that smaller road will continue using them for some time This trend has been forecasted in the press on several occasions. 11 reason will be the superior adaptability of open-hearth steel for track purposes and the fact that there is a difference in the chemical composition of openhearth that compares with the Bessemer unfavorably to the latter.

The statement that the productio of open-hearth steel would pass that of Bossemer next year is assured by th developments now under way. The Carnegie Steel company is rebuilding its Ohio steel works, at Youngstown, O., for the making of open-hearth stee rails exclusively, and in the latter par of 1908 will have the steel rail mills at Gary, Ind., in operation, which will make open-hearth rails exclusively. In addition, plans, are being considered for the conversion of the great Edgar Thomson steel works at Braddock, into an
