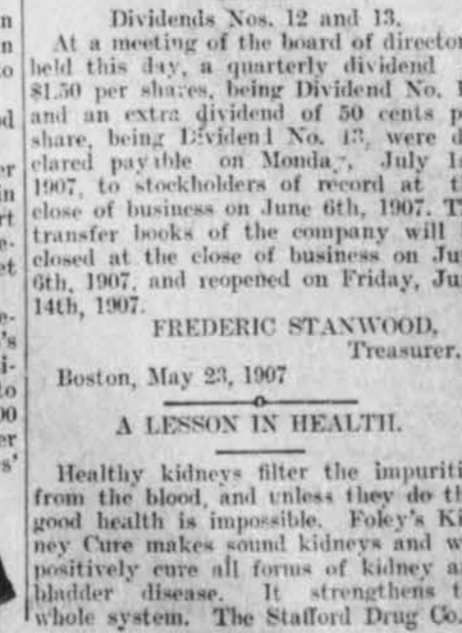

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"LOST" LAND DISCOVERED.

Once Connected Scandinavia and British Isles, Savant Says.

Washington, May 31.—Dr. Leonard Stejneger, a curator of the United States National museum, as a result of thorough studies into the animal and plant life of Norway and Sweden, has brought forward strong evidence that not very long ago, as geologists reckon time, there must have been land connection between the Scandinavian peninsula and the British Isles.

If the proposition that there was land between Scandinavia and Scotland is true, and Dr. Stejneger goes far towards establishing it, a vital step in the geologic history of Europe has been proven. Many problems of the migration of prehistoric man and animals which have puzzled students ever since people began to wonder about their remote ancestors, are now solved.

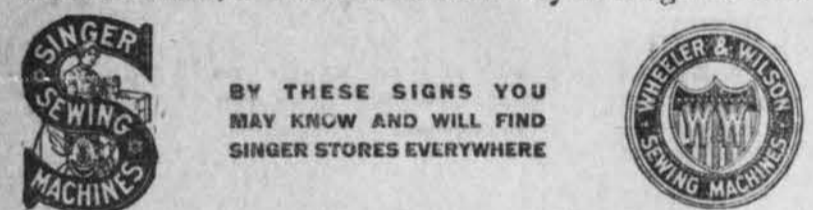

BLACK MOUNTAIN.

Short of Labor, Company Is Importing Workers from Japan.

The directors of the Black Mountain Mining Company submit the following report of operations, future plans, betterments in course of construction, and financial statement:
The main tunnel, now seven feet by eleven feet, has been driven 2,000 feet on the vein and continues in ore unbroken. Tunnels Nos. 4 and 6 have been driven until they are nearly over the heading of No. 8. The ore is broken from the solid overhead, and allowed to drop by gravity to tunnel No. 8, or working tunnel. No timber is used in the mine.

The vein holds its identity and strength unchanged. It is, if anything, somewhat larger than nearer the surface, and ranges in width from seven feet to forty feet. The average assay value of all ore milled, including old tailings, shows a yield of \$3.30 per ton, consisting of \$4.70 gold and sixty cents silver. Up to March 1, 1907, 104,546 tons of ore and tailings have been treated, there being between six and ten thousand tons of the latter. The ore handled has as yet at no time reached the capacity of the mill.

In the stopes the vein holds its own, varying but maintaining an average thickness up to our former estimates. In the workings of tunnel No. 8 the vein is developing the good body of ore of average thickness and grade which was found in some of the crosscuts. About half a million tons of ore are developed above the main tunnel, and from forty to fifty thousand tons are broken in the mine.

A 120 stamp mill, exterior construction of iron, with ore bins of 2,000 tons capacity has been constructed. The stamp capacity, with ore crushed to thirty mesh, is 450 tons per day. Three ore crushers are in commission doing excellent work. The stamp mill is working admirably. The amalgamating plates originally installed have been entirely removed and the mill will therefore crush in cyanide solution. This is giving satisfactory results, by reducing the consumption of cyanide and by better extraction. A cyanide plant of 500 tons daily capacity is complete. Each month's experience in cyaniding shows a continued improvement in the recovery of gold values. A greater percentage of silver per ton will also be saved; 20 per cent of the values have so far been recovered.

A pumping station has been constructed at the San Domingo river, three and one-half miles from the mine and mill, furnishing water through an 8-inch iron pipe to the reservoir at the mill. A concrete dam at the mine, forming a natural reservoir, of a capacity of 27,000,000 gallons of water storage, has also been constructed. The power for all purposes, including the light for the village at the mine, now containing some 2,500 persons, is furnished by an electric power plant, located at Magdalena, and driven over a well constructed transmission line, twenty-six miles in length.

Village improvements, for the accommodation and general convenience of the employees, consist in part of the following: To date, upwards of 120 dwelling houses for miners have been constructed; also one large modern store building,

two warehouses, hospitals, and a residence for doctor and mine superintendent. There are, in course of construction and nearing completion, a cold-storage plant, public laundry, club and reading room, large school facilities, a church and office and a modern office building.

In January last year directors arranged to increase the capacity of the present plant to approximately 900 tons per day, and the introduction of tube mills was determined upon. By this addition the 120 stamps will be relieved of fine crushing and the tonnage per stamp per day practically doubled. Contracts have been placed for equipment necessary for these changes. It is expected that if delivery is made according to contract, the added equipment will be in place by Jan 1st, next.

The labor question still remains unsatisfactory. The scarcity of miners is very acute. There are now employed in all departments, including power plant, over 400 men, of whom only 120 are miners, while there are working places in the mine ready for men more than double that number. A first instalment of 150 Japanese have arrived, and are so far serving admirably. One hundred more from Japan have been contracted for.

As always, in inaugurating an enterprise of such size, there has been starting adjustments and irregularities adding to the expected costs, which have proved higher than anticipated, beginning at about three dollars per ton but gradually reducing until April, when they were but \$2.43 per ton of ore milled.

NOTES OF COPPER NEWS.

Within a few days diamond drill operations will commence underground at the Erie-Ontario property on the south range. The Erie-Ontario is located half way between the Champion and Winona mines.

The Wolvestone & Arizona company has issued its annual statement. Five assessments, totalling \$138,801, have been paid in. Fifteen thousand dollars is due on the property to secure full ownership. The company has a cash balance of \$12,500 on hand.

The Old Dominion smelter has been running at its full capacity, with four furnaces in blast, since May 1, and the output of copper has averaged better than fifty tons per day, which means a production for the month of more than 3,000,000 pounds, barring any interruption to smelting. Receipts of coke have increased and a reserve is being slowly accumulated.

The electric plant which the Tamarack Mining company has been installing at its No. 5 branch is now in operation. The current generated at this point will be transmitted to all three branches of the mine. There is also a plant in process of installation at the Osceola branch of the Osceola Consolidated and another at the North Kearsarge branch of the same company.

The Calumet & Butte company is engaged in cutting a station at the 500-foot point of the Richlieu shaft for the accommodation of a large pump, which has been delivered at the mine. The shaft is 515 feet deep. Crosscuts will be run north and south at the 500-foot level to ascertain what there is in the vein that was cut on the 300-foot level. The company owns eleven full claims just east of the property of the Amman-Butte company.

The New York Sun says: A German copper consuming interest, which profited 2 1/2 cents per pound for a superior grade of Lake copper, was informed by the producers that no such price will be acceptable during this year when demands are running even with if not ahead of output. A cable proffer from Germany of 2 1/2 cents for several million pounds of electrolytic for July was refused by producers. There is no record of any business at less than 2 1/2 cents for electrolytic and 2 3/4 cents for Lake.

Operations at the Arizona Commercial are now on a larger scale at the Copper Hill mine, and ore shipments have been increased to 300 tons per day. Of this amount 120 tons are sulphides, which go to the Old Dominion, and seventy tons of silicious ore, shipped to the Douglas smelters. Only three cars of ore have been shipped from the Black Hawk mine thus far. The sulphide ore bodies in the Copper Hill look well, and considerable development work is being carried on. Two new boilers for the mine have been shipped from the East.

EARLE'S MEASURE CARRIES \$100,000

THAT SUM PROPOSED FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF CRUSHED ROCK INDUSTRY HERE.

KEWEENAW IDEA GIVEN UP

Deputy Rogers' Visit to Marquette Believed to Have Had Something to Do With the Change—Copper Country Disappointed.

Considerable interest has been manifested here in Commissioner Earle's plan for the production of crushed rock by prison labor in the upper peninsula, and it has probably been intensified since the road commissioner has introduced a substitute bill specifically mentioning Marquette as the source of the proposed crushed rock supply.

According to Lansing advices, Mr. Earle's substitute bill carries an appropriation of \$100,000 to be used in carrying out his ideas at the Marquette prison. His original bill called for \$200,000. In this bill there was no explicit mention of the location of the new prison it was proposed to build, but it was generally accepted that it was planned to erect it in Keweenaw county, where the supply of trap rock is inexhaustible.

Deputy State Road Commissioner Rogers visited Marquette last week in connection with this legislation, and it is supposed that his report to Mr. Earle had something to do with the introduction of the substitute bill. Mr. Rogers did not have time enough to make a thorough survey of the various outcrops and ledges of rock near the prison, but it is presumed he satisfied himself that the conditions thereabouts were such as to justify a trial of his chief's proposed new prison industry there.

decide to establish a crushed rock plant there would be no trouble over getting the labor requisite to operate it.

Copper Country Disappointed. In the copper country some disappointment is shown because Mr. Earle has dropped his original bill.

The proposed Keweenaw county prison will not be built. At least no action concerning it will be taken by the present legislature. Lansing advices state that Commissioner Earle, who has fathered a bill for the purpose of establishing a state penitentiary in the far northern county, has substituted the name of Marquette in the place of Keweenaw, and the trap rock it was proposed to have convict labor quarry in Keweenaw county for road making purposes will now be secured in the vicinity of the Marquette prison, if the revised bill is passed.

"Copper country people will learn with regret of the dropping of the original bill. Marquette is now mentioned directly in Commissioner Earle's new bill, the regular prison being substituted in the bill for the proposed Keweenaw penitentiary. The change has primarily been brought about by those who have claimed all along that it would only be an experiment to erect a prison in Keweenaw, at an estimated cost of almost a quarter of a million dollars.

The substitute of course means a decrease in the amount of money originally asked. It is believed locally that the bill will be passed in short order. It seemingly is a simple way out of the difficulty, and will smooth the way for the passing of Governor Warner's binder twine plant bill for Jackson prison. If Marquette can supply all the trap rock needed for the making of good roads with its present convict labor it has been argued there is no need of spending at least \$200,000 in the erection of a state prison in Keweenaw county."

GET \$100 RAISE. Guards and Keepers at Marquette Prison Given Larger Salaries. At a meeting of the board of control of the Marquette prison Thursday night a resolution was passed to the effect that in the future the salaries of guards shall be \$800 instead of \$700 and of keepers \$900 instead of \$800. This amounts to considerably more than a 10 per cent increase, and will be welcomed by the men affected, who number all but a few of the men employed at the prison. The increase was made possible by the enactment by the present legislature of a law permitting the boards of control of state institutions to take such action.

CONVICTED MEN ARE SENTENCED

COURT TEMPERED JUSTICE WITH MERCY IN CASE OF THOMAS HICKEY, ISHPEMING MAN WHO STOLE WHILE INTOXICATED.

Matthew Hickey and John Paquette, convicted of larceny, and David Moran and Peter Morin, convicted of burglary, were arraigned before Judge Stone for sentence yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Sentence was suspended in the case of Hickey, with the understanding that he take the pledge for a period of twelve months and report at the next term of circuit court, September 3, to answer to his good conduct. He is at liberty under a bench warrant, and will be taken into custody immediately upon his violation of the terms of his release. There were several reasons for the action of the court in tempering justice with mercy in the Hickey case. The young man entered a residence in broad daylight in his home city of Ishpeping and stole \$75. He was under the influence of liquor at the time. It was his first criminal offense and he had previously borne a good reputation. The money was subsequently returned by friends. Hickey pleaded guilty and threw himself upon the mercy of the court. The impression is general that he would not have committed the crime had he been sober.

Paquette was given from one to five years, with a recommendation of two. The man will find himself among familiar surroundings on his return to the Marquette prison. His case presents several features somewhat out of the ordinary. He was sent from Houghton county January 4, 1902 for larceny. He earned good time and was made a trusty about five weeks before his sentence expired. With little more than a month to serve he stole a suit of clothes from one of the guards, Robert Crackle, and escaped. He was identified while being held on a minor charge and returned to the prison December 2, 1906. Refusing to make good the price of the clothes through his earnings at overtime, he was arrested at the expiration of his sentence and arraigned at the present term of circuit court. Peter Morin, who pleaded guilty to having been implicated in the burglary of the Peter Boyer's saloon here several weeks ago, was given from one to fifteen years, with a recommendation of two. David Moran, charged with the same offense, but who was convicted after pleading not guilty and standing trial, was sentenced to from one and one-half to fifteen years, with a recommendation of two and one-half. Subsequent to committing the crime the men went to Negaunee, where they were arrested by Chief of Police Grubbs. A revolver identified as having been stolen from the saloon was found in their possession. Morin made a confession implicating Moran, but the latter protested his innocence to the last.

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
