

> WIDOWS REMARRIED; PENSIONS WENT ON

Suit Recalls Extensive Scheme by Which the Government Lost Thousands.

Washington, June 12.—The most extensive and successful scheme for swindling the pension bureau that has yet come to light is recalled by an appeal recently filed in the supreme court by the government from a decision of the lower court against its efforts to recover the loss it sustained

The pensions of widows who remarry are supposed to stop as soon as the cere mony has been performed; but William A. Munson, a pension attorney of Provi dence, R. 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#### CUBA NEEDS GOOD ROADS.

#### THESE NECESSARY TO INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

Governor Magoon Has Caused to Be Prepared a Plan to Cover the Island from Coast to Coast-This Done Under Direction of Colonel Black, Who Has Outlined a Skeleton System, Which Can Be Built Up as Money Becomes Available-Poor Classes of People in Need of Work-Nearly Five Million Dollars to Be Expended.

Washington, June 12.-"Cuba's great est need today is good roads," write: Provisional Governor Magoon in a let ter recently received here. In his opin ion the best, the quickest and the cheap est way to promote the industrial de velopment of the island and materially to advance the welfare of its people, is by good roads. It was the recognition of this fact that caused him, soon after he took charge of the provisional government, to direct the department of of public works to prepare a scheme of good roads which would cross the island from coast to coast.

Such a plan has been completed and submitted by Colonel W. M. Black, who as "advisor" of the department of public works is performing the same excellent service that made his administration as secretary of that department during the military regime one of the brilliant achievements of the American occupa tion. Havana is today filled with examples of the work of this engineer of ficer of the army, accomplished while in charge of the department of public works under Governor General Wood In fact the municipal engineering probems in Havana were solved in a way ,hat has since attracted the admiration and the careful study of municipal engineers in this country. Under the provisional government, Judge Magoon has gathered about him a group of army officers who are in reality his military cabinet, but who are assigned to the various departments as "advisors." Thus ColonelBlack has taken up the work of this department where the Cubans left it off, and already the execution of the good roads plan throughout the island is

Instead of drawing up a scheme that would include all of the roads necessary Colonel Black has prepared the skeleton of a system of roads which can subse-quently be added to as the appropriations become available. In brief, the scheme provides for a main line reaching the entire length of the island, with one cross road reaching from coast to coast in each province. Within a short time after the provisional government was esbeen completed to work in each province at the close of the cane cutting season. This work was so distributed that each province will receive substantially the tions were returned for execution. Then followed preparations of specifications and advertisements, the opening of bids, and the letting of contracts. These contracts were let on the basis of unit prices for each class of units of work, as for example per cubic metre of excayation, per cubic metre of fill, per cubic metre of concrete of the various classes. etc. The award was made to the lowest bidder on the aggregate of sums obtained by multiplying these prices by the respective estimated quantities as given in the project. Colonel Black has found the unit method advantageous be cause it is flexible and allows for slight changes, which are always of benefit in carrying out a project no matter how carefully the latter may have been studied in advance.

Although this system provides for very careful work, much time is consumed before actual construction can begin. Should Governor Warner sign the bill, now before him, which would allow mining as well as land companies to buy and hold land ing at the southeast corner of section without limitation, an opportunity would be created for several of the larger iron running in a northerly direction to Dead mining corporations to acquire millions of acres to the practical exclusion of settlers. The three land companies that now own 1,150,000 acres, are the Michigan Land & Iron com pany, with holdings aggregating 40,000 zeres, the Keweenaw association, which has 350,000 acres, and the Detroit, Marquette & Mackinaw Land company, holding 400,000. "'The three iron mining corporations back of this bill are the steel trust, Jones & Laughlin, and the Cleveland-Cliffs company. Jones & Laughlin are probably the largest manufacturers of steel outside of the trust. The Cleveland-Cliffs company are producers of charcoal, pig iron. They have furnaces at Marquette and Gladstone. Mather, of leveland, the head of the company has an ambition to be known as the pig iron king of America.

"It is the well known policy of the steel trust to buy land in unlimited stretches where there is a chance of finding minerals and not sell any of it. There are great stretches of just such lands in the upper peninsula. The steel trust is looking ahead for a cen-

"The pleas that if mining companies are permitted to buy up unlimited stretches they will go into reforesting should be taken with salt. The Longyear companies, with their threequarters of a million or more acres have yet to work out a feasible plan for reforesting. Reforesting can only be profitable for a private corporation when the land is in large blocks. It is quite doubtful if reforesting would pay a company whose lands are in innumer able pieces not connected with each other. In alternate sections, for instance, like much of the Longyear companies' lands. The other alternate sections are reserved for settlers.

"If Governor Warner signs this bill to create a land monopoly for a few great iron mining companies he will have struck a blow at the development in farming and in population in the up-per peninsula, the force of which cannot July I.

WANTS HIGHWAY AND BRIDGE.

Marquette Twp, Proposes That City and County Pay Two-Thirds of Expense.

The county board held a short session

vesterday morning, being called to order

at H o'clock and adjourning at noon. A petition was received from residents of Marquette township relative to the construction of a new highway and bridge across the Dead river. Several weeks ago a strip of road known vari-ously as the Powder mill road, or Sauk's Head road, was vacated by the highway commissioner of Marquette township The highway was discontinued because the road was inconvenient and expensive to repair, and also because it passed through the site of the proposed im provements of the Powder Mill company on the north side of the river. It was thought that a highway to take the place of this one could be obtained by building from a point near the mouth of Dead river west to the Sauk's Head road. A survey, however, showed that the expense of construction along that route would be impracticable. After investigation by the township and city officials a new route was mapped out, commen running in a northerly direction to Dead river. At this point it is proposed by the terms of the petition to build a new county, and one-third by the township and Powder company. The petition was referred to the committee on highways

and bridges A petition asking that the bridge across the Escanaba river eight miles south of Ishpeming, be repaired, was likewise referred to the committee or highways and bridges. The bridge, which was built seven years ago, has been subjected to a great deal of travel and is lleged to be in bad condition.

William J. Andrews, elected by the Ishpeming common council to the vaancy caused by the resignation of John Vivian, of the Fifth ward, was placed on the committees of finance and taxation, supplies and expenditures and su perintendents of the poor.

The board adjourned to meet July 17 at 11 o'clock.

APPROPRIATION BILL SIGNED.

A letter from Representative Gordon was received by a Marquette man yes terday, informing him that Gov. Warner has signed the bill carrying appropriations for special purposes for the Marpany. It is the only one that seeks to quette prison. The prison is perhaps the only institution in the state that was given everything asked for. The bill carries appropriations aggregating a lit-tle over \$10,000, and among other things provides for the purchase of a considerable acreage of ground adjoining the


