REFORM WINS IN 'FRISCO. Reports received from San Francisco indicate that the majority of the Republican voters in the city favor a continuance of the anti-graft prosecutions and thus, by inference, approve of the vigorous steps taken by District Attorney Langdon, his aides and moral backers, to curb dishonesty in civic government and exact full penalty from the men who have waxed fat off it.

GRAND TRAVERSE & ARIZONA.
 This company is reported to have obtained good results in the past few months' work of development.
 The double shaft at the main workings has reached a depth of 350 feet, and has, it is said, fully uncovered a body of ore larger than the shaft. This ore is sulphide, of a fair value in copper, while both gold and silver appear in considerable values. Water has troubled some, but has been fairly well handled with the "bucket system" until now, when a sinking pump will be installed. A shaft has been sunk in the floor of the "big cut" on New Hope claim No. 1, striking a body of sulphide ore with a few days' work. This cut has yielded carbonates and manganese ores from the "grass roots," which continued to the point where the sulphide was uncovered. Water came in too fast for hand winlass work, and with sulphide showing beyond the "walls" of the shaft, at a depth of about 80 feet, work was discontinued until machinery could be installed.

As the machinery at the double shaft is now inadequate to do the work, it is to be transferred to the New Hope, while an engine and hoist of fifty to sixty horsepower will be purchased and installed at the main workings. The company hopes to have a good crew at work in both shafts by the 15th of September or 1st of October, when the work will be rushed as rapidly as possible.

The company was fortunate in securing the services of George L. Fisher, one of the best mine examiners in the country. Mr. Fisher has had many years experience with Arizona formations and is well qualified to judge the mining properties of that territory. He advised continuing work in the main workings, while also urging the development of New Hope. He predicted the finding of permanent ores in the former, which has been well verified, while his opinion that the cut on the New Hope claim was at the apex of a body of ore seems well founded. Mr. Fisher also recommended the development of the Laura, the Nellie and the Good Hope claims to an extent which would show more fully the nature of the veins uncovered by the prospect work.

Mr. Fisher was in Marquette a few days ago, and told some of the stockholders that the officers of the company did not need to hunt for ores any longer, as plenty were already uncovered; "just go on and look out and mine the ores already shown," he said. He also said, "the property has long since passed the prospect stage, and is now a mine, needing but reduction works to be ready to take its place among the big producers."

The Southern Pacific has bought the Santa Fe line from Phoenix to Ash Forks, together with all its "feeders" and connecting lines. This ensures the quick building of a short line to Phoenix, which must pass within a short distance of this property, if it does not cross it. With money, good standing, no debts and rich ores from permanent beds, whose extent can only be determined after many years of large production, and from this time, the work to be under the immediate supervision of a competent mining engineer, the future of this company seems very bright. In the window of the Stafford Drug company can be seen specimens of ore taken from the property and brought to this city by a man who was on the ground when the shafts began showing sulphides.



FORMER MARQUETTE MAN DIES ON CAR

A. SAMUEL PARKS WAS GENERAL FREIGHT AGENT OF M. H. & O. FIFTEEN YEARS AGO.

DEATH OF BURT WALDO

Succumbs After Illness of a Year—Mother of Chauffeur Roy Clough Dies Suddenly in Chicago.

In a communication received yesterday by Francis Moore, clerk of the United States district court, news is conveyed of the sudden death of A. Samuel Parks, a former Marquette resident who for the past fifteen years has been residing at Los Angeles, Cal.

Mr. Parks was general freight agent of the old M. H. & O. road and lived here many years. His marriage to Miss Kate McConnell, a Marquette girl, took place in October of 1889. In the letter telling of his death it is said he was accompanied by his wife and was on his way to his cottage at Long Beach near Los Angeles when he fell dead in an electric car. In Los Angeles he was connected with the Provident Gold and Copper company, of which he was secretary. The letter was sent to Mr. Moore by W. E. Baxter, an officer of the company.

Mr. Parks' death occurred Aug. 9 last and the letter telling of it is dated August 10. Mr. Baxter states that owing to the telegraphers' strike he had been unable to communicate with Marquette save by letter.

Death of Burt Waldo. After a year's illness, Burt Waldo of 218 Rock street died yesterday morning at his home from liver disease. At the time of his death he was fifty years old and he was widely known in Marquette where he has lived for the past twenty years.

Mr. Waldo came to Marquette from his home in Rome, N. Y., and engaged in the farming implement business. He was a graduate of Hamilton college at Utica, N. Y. For the past year he had been an invalid, gradually growing worse until last Sunday night when he was seized by an attack from which he never rallied. The funeral will be held at the cathedral at 9 o'clock this morning and Saturday morning the body will be shipped to Rome to be buried in the family lot. Mrs. Waldo and the two children will accompany the body.
