PRESIDENT STANDS PAT.

President Roosevelt's speech at Provincetown, Mass., has by this time had an attentive reading by millions of Americans, and has not passed without attracting attention in foreign lands.

The president's speech is the speech of a man who is firmly convinced that he has been following the only course of conduct open to a conscientious and fearless public servant and who, when his term of office is finished, proposes to be at peace with himself, in the thought that he fearlessly did his duty as he saw it.

In the way of constructive statesmanship the president dwells at some length on the subject of national incorporation of corporations doing an interstate business as one step in the further regulation of these great business organizations.

As for the present situation in the stock markets, the president holds that it was precipitated by the efforts of his enemies in Wall street, "to teach the country a lesson" and possibly to discourage him from following out his chosen line of action.

Taken all in all President Roosevelt's speech was about what might have been expected. There was no warrant for believing that he would, in any measure, retrace his steps in the matter of trust prosecutions.

THE STATES AND THE NATION.

Text of the Statement of Representative J. J. Jenkins Which Has Awakened Widespread Comment.

Congressman J. J. Jenkins of Chipewea Falls says that the extracts as printed from his statement regarding North Carolina trouble, did not completely express his views; that the selection of the more sensational parts of the statement might give the reader an impression of his opinions which was not intended.

"I would not intrude my views upon the public, but as long as you have asked the question, I am willing to answer it, and what I will say will not be by way of criticism of any other person, but in condemnation of the law breaking spirit so dangerous to the success of the nation.

"During the Civil war, it cost the people of this nation an immense amount of blood and treasure to settle among themselves what was provided for and settled by the constitution. The Civil war was the result of seventy-four years of just such agitation as to the limited power of the nation and their supreme power of the states, and when the proper time came, considering events, the effect was realized.

"It is not to be denied that we live in the midst of strong agitations and are surrounded by very considerable danger to our institutions and government. The impending crisis are 'his losses.' The east, the north, and the south combine to throw the whole sea into commotion, to toss its billows to the skies, and to disclose its profoundest depths.

"While we shall never have another war of secession, we may have earlier than we want another Civil war. To avert such calamity and preserve the nation we must conform to the law, obey the law and have the law enforced according to the framework provided in the constitution. This constitution was adopted by the people, and if we live up to its provisions, there will be no trouble or difficulty.

"We not only have the extent of judicial power, but the supremacy of the constitution as well. This constitution, and the laws of the United States, which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and of treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme laws of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state notwithstanding.

"The civil war sustained Webster who contended that the constitution of the United States is not a league, confederacy or compact between the people of the several states in their sovereign capacities; but a government proper, founded on the adoption of the people, and creating direct relations between self and individuals.

"I speak as a believer in state governments. I am a firm friend of our dual system of government. As I have often said, we will protect both state and nation. Neither impair the one nor invade the other. I would never weaken the police power of the states. I am absolutely opposed to transferring to the national government any part of the police power of the states. Hence as a friend of the states, I have a right to speak for the welfare of the nation. State governments are not in danger. If congress should exceed its power, the supreme court is present to check its legislative usurpations.

This is an unlawful attempt to oppose lawful efforts. This continual talk about state authorities resisting federal power by armed force will, sooner or later, end in bloodshed; possibly the disruption of the union. In any event it creates a dangerous feeling not beneficial to the perpetuity of the union.

"In the early history of the nation, it was quite difficult to get the people of the states to submit to federal interference. The state of Maryland insisted upon taxing foreign commerce. Naturally enough the courts of that state upheld the state law, and the party punished for the violation of the state law had to go to the federal court for the protection afforded by the constitution of the United States. It was a case that helped to make the reputation of the great Chief Justice Marshall. The opinion of the court was unanimous that the state law was absolutely and utterly void. It was a question between state and federal law and the opinion of the court has met the approval of the country ever since it was decided.

Marshall was a great jurist and fully agreed with the views so ably expressed by Webster. Taney was the attorney general of the state of Maryland, and argued the case in the supreme court of the United States for the state of Maryland. He did it as a lawyer very ably and tried to satisfy the court that the power of the state was paramount. Afterwards he became the chief justice of the supreme court of the United States, and a similar question came before the court at that time, in the so-called license cases; and in writing the opinion in this latter case, Chief Justice Taney says: 'I argued the former case in behalf of the state of Maryland and thought at the time of the decision that it was wrong, but further and more mature reflection convinced me that the ruling laid down in that case by Chief Justice Marshall was a just and safe one, and perhaps the best that could be adopted for the preservation of the United States, on the one hand, and of the states on the other, and prevent collision between them.'

"The supreme court of the United States may err. It may differ from the views of a great majority of the people, but however that may be, the constitution of the United States says the decision is final and must be regarded as the supreme law of the land and that is what must govern us. Better live under a wrong decision even than amidst the anarchy that must prevail in this country if each state authority is going to disregard the constitution of the United States, and assert its own power, right or wrong, in defiance of national power, thereby weakening and absolutely destroying this great government that has cost so many generations so much to make and preserve it."

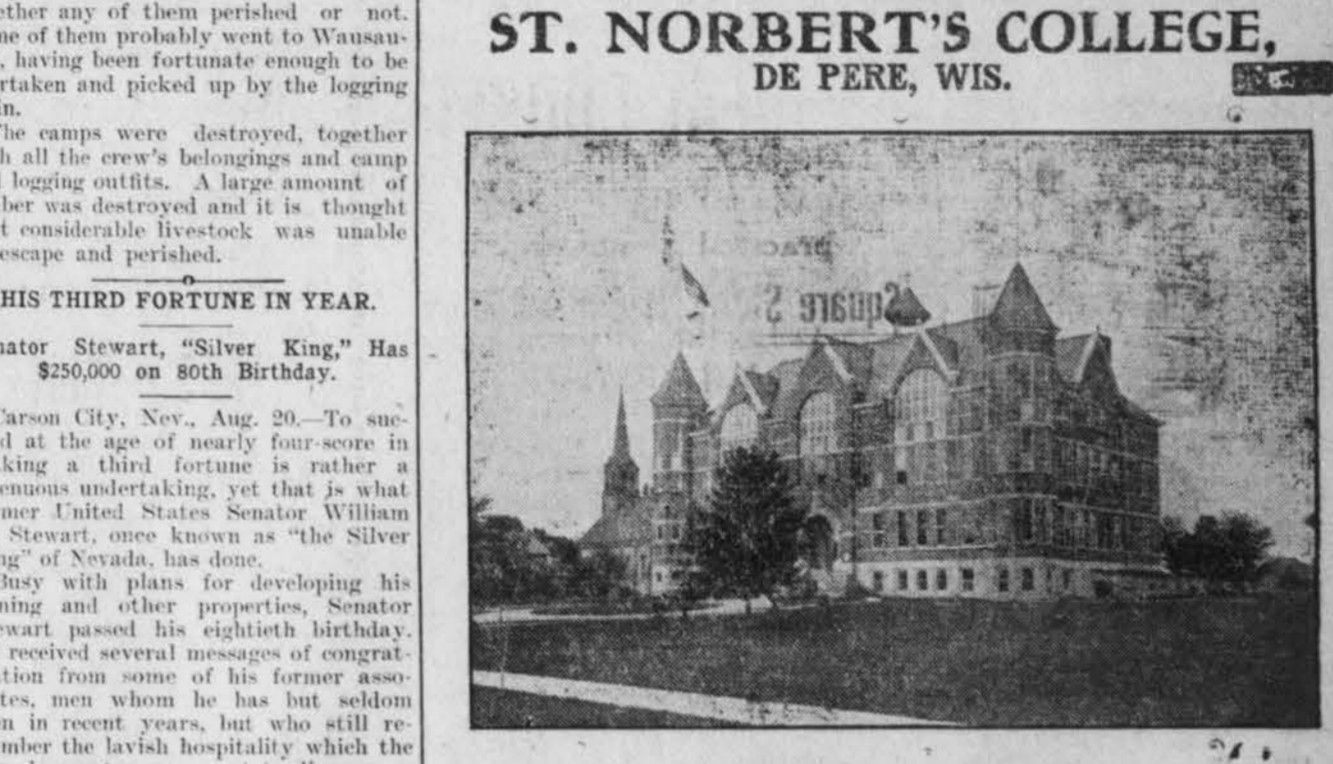

**FINNS OF NORTHWEST ASKED TO RETURN HOME**

PROMINENT NEWSPAPER MAN OF HELSINGFORS IN AMERICA OFFERING INDUCEMENTS TO COUNTRYMEN TO AGAIN LOCATE IN FINLAND.

Matt Kurikka, of Helsingfors, editor of Elama, Finland's most influential newspaper, is touring the Northwest on a mission that may result in reducing the Finnish population of this region. He is in America for the Finnish government, which desires natives of that country to return to their former homes. It is now thought that Finland is well able to take care not only of the people in that country but of the Finns in America as well. It is said that there are many Finns in this country, particularly in certain parts of the northwest, who are prepared to return to their former home, provided they are assured an opportunity to make a good living. Mr. Kurikka is telling his country people of the government's plans to aid them, and as the Finns of America have unbounded faith in the Helsingfors newspaper man it is thought that a large number will follow his advice and return to their native country.

Mr. Kurikka has been in America before, and on the occasion of his last visit spent a few days in the upper peninsula. While here he was prominent before the public by reason of efforts made to establish a Finnish colony in British Columbia, on a co-operative plan. He was successful in inducing about 300 Finns from various parts of the northwest to accompany him to British Columbia, and it is said that none of those who located there have ever regretted their action, despite the fact that the plans outlined by Kurikka did not work out exactly as he expected. Mr. Kurikka remained in the colony for some time before he returned to Helsingfors.

**AWARDED BIG CONTRACT.**

Milwaukee Concern Successful Bidder for Big Job at Newberry.

D. T. Morgan, a member of the Newberry asylum board, arrived home last evening from the institution, where he and other members of the board had spent a few days. The board has awarded the contract for the erection of one new cottage and the administration building and two cloisters to the Foster Construction company of Milwaukee, the contract price being in the neighborhood of \$200,000. This is exclusive of the construction of the foundations, which will be put in by day labor under direction of the board. The Foster company has already begun to assemble its material and it is expected that the construction work will be started within a few days.

The new buildings at the asylum have been badly needed for some time past. There are at present 675 inmates, over fifty more than there are desirable quarters for. The institution has been overcrowded for more than a year, it having recently been necessary to convert the administration building into quarters for the inmates. The new cottage will accommodate sixty persons and a similar number will be accommodated in the building at present used for administrative purposes. If the number of patients sent to the institution continues as large as during the past few years all the buildings, including the new ones will be taxed to their capacity in less than two years, and it will again become necessary to build more cottages.
