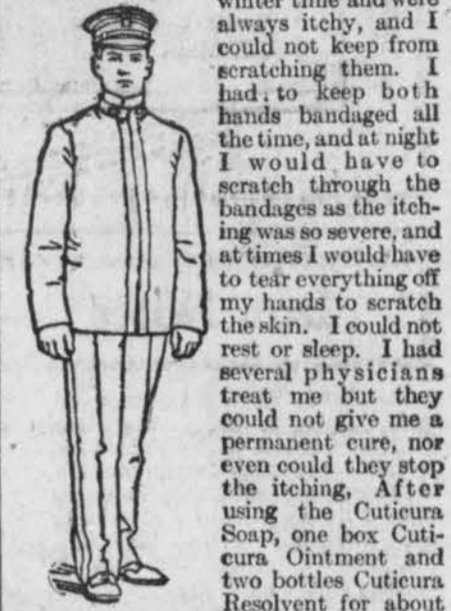

### ODD PROVISIONS IN THE NEW LAWS

#### IS NOW A MISDEMEANOR TO WEAR I. O. F. BADGE WITHOUT BELONGING TO THE ORDER.

#### ACT TO SHIELD EX-CONVICTS

#### Another of the New Laws Is of Direct Interest to Burglars—Is Now Illegal to Give Away Medicine.

The recent session of the legislature was remarkable for the large number of odd, briefly worded acts it passed and some of these acts are odd to a degree. One of these shorts acts which has caused considerable comment among those familiar with the new laws, and one of which but slight mention has been made, is the law which makes it a misdemeanor to wear the badge or emblems of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows unless the wearer is a member of the order. The law which is now in effect is as follows:

#### May Not Wear Badge.

"Any person who shall willfully wear the badge or emblems of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, or who shall use or wear the same to obtain aid or assistance thereby, within this state, unless he shall be entitled to use or wear the same under the laws of the said order, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not to exceed thirty days in the county jail, or a fine not to exceed \$25, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court."

Another of the acts, and one aimed at the manufacturers of medicines, makes it illegal to distribute medicine from house to house. This law reads:

#### Can't Give It Away.

"The free distribution of all medicines of every kind and nature from house to house, or from any vehicle, is hereby prohibited. Any person, firm or corporation, or any servant, agent or employe thereof who violates the provision of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding \$100 or imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court."

Another of the laws is one passed solely for the benefit of ex-convicts. It is one which should, and probably will meet with general approval, for its purpose is to shield unfortunates. It provides that no one may taunt a man who has been in prison. It reads:

#### For Ex-Convicts.

"No person shall taunt or otherwise accuse another of having been a convict or an inmate of any jail, prison or reformatory. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine of not to exceed \$100, or imprisonment in the common jail not to exceed ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court."

In another of the short acts a distinction is made of a certain form of the crime of burglary. It relates to the crime of burglary with explosives and carries with it a penalty of greater severity than the statute by which the crime was formerly defined. This is the law:

#### Of Interest to Burglars.

"Any person who, with intent to commit crime, breaks and enters any building and for the purpose of committing any crime, uses or attempts to use nitroglycerine, dynamite, gunpowder or any other high explosive, shall be deemed guilty of burglary with explosives and upon conviction shall be punished by imprisonment for a term of not less than fifteen years nor more than thirty years."

Another act makes a state offense of a misdemeanor now forbidden by the ordinances of most cities, the throwing of stones at street cars or at trains. This act reads:

#### Now a State Offense.

"Any person who shall throw any stone, brick or other missile at any passenger train, sleeping car, passenger coach, express car, mail car, baggage car, or at any street car or trolley car, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of not to exceed \$100 or by imprisonment in the common jail of not to exceed ninety days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court."

#### DEATH OF YOUNG BOY.

#### Fourteen-Year-Old Frank Perry Died Yesterday Morning at 4 O'Clock.

Frank Perry, the fourteen-year-old son of Charles Perry of 414 West Michigan street, died yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. His death was due to an injury he received a little more than a year ago.

While at play the boy met with an accident by which one of his legs was injured and he never fully recovered. Later it became necessary to amputate the leg and he had been an invalid for some months. His father was out of the city when he died. Besides his parents, he is survived by a brother and sister.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning from the home at 9 o'clock to the French Catholic church. The interment will be in Holy Cross cemetery.

#### MARQUETTE FIRM TO SUSPEND BUSINESS

#### J. J. CARROLL & CO. TO DISCONTINUE BUSINESS IN MARQUETTE, OWING TO THE ILL HEALTH OF MR. D. SEIDENFELD, WHO HAS HAD CHARGE OF THE FIRM'S AFFAIRS HERE.

In an official statement given out last evening the firm of J. J. Carroll & Co. announced that they would retire from the field of active business in Marquette. Although the firm has been straining efforts to "force" business during the past few weeks, the actual official announcement of their retirement comes as a great surprise, and it is to be regretted that Marquette is to lose a firm it has so long and favorably known.

D. Seidenfeld, who has managed the local store, and who himself was in business at the firm's present location for six or eight years, has been gradually failing in health, and has decided to get out of indoor business pursuits altogether to avoid a complete physical collapse. Both Dr. Harkin and Dr. Hornbogen have advised Mr. Seidenfeld to quit indoor work and to take up some light outdoor pursuit if he would desire to recover his health at all. Mr. Seidenfeld has not definitely decided upon the future, but will doubtless visit friends and relatives in the east for many months before again doing active work of any sort. ### LONG COLD WINTER IS THE PREDICTION

#### AMATEUR WEATHER PROPHETS UNITED IN BELIEF THAT MUCH SNOW AND ICE IS DUE.

#### WHAT THE INDIANS SAY

#### Trappers and Woodsmen of the Opinion That There Will Be Cold Winters from North With Much Snow.

All of the amateur weather prophets are united in the opinion that present indications point that we are to have an unusually cold winter, and when it comes to reading the weather signs some of the old time woodsmen and trappers are often more accurate in their predictions than the professional weather man.

#### Plenty of Snow.

There is liable to be plenty of snow, the woodsmen say, although probably not nearly so much as last year, when the last of the white covering did not entirely disappear in the woods till mid-summer. Cold winds from the north-west will prevail and the atmosphere will be clear and sharp, according to the signs of the trappers.

Out in the woods the hunters bring back reports that the partridges now are flying east and are so scarce that one cannot approach within several hundred feet of them. They fly up quickly and make for the tall timber and cannot be driven out into the open. Indians would say this meant a cold winter, but the outlook at present is not in favor of the warm spell.

The muskrats, too, are making unusual preparations for a long, hard siege of cold weather, and are building many houses along the rivers and creeks. It is said they are bringing an unusual supply of grasses and twigs to make their homes strong and secure, and their beds warm and comfortable. These little animals oftentimes neglect to do this, but it is usually only when a mild winter follows. How the muskrats know that is to come is not known, but the hunters depend upon them.

#### Indian Belief.

Another sign which originated with the Indians is one regarding the depths of the water in the creeks and rivers. The Indians say that if the water is unusually low in the creeks during the fall it means a hard winter with plenty of snow. They say, too, if the trees are falling rapidly before the autumn winds it is a sign that "trees are taking time by the forelock," and prefer to die before the more severe storms of the cold winter.

Cruisers and woodsmen put a good deal of stock in the theory that which ever way the wind is blowing at the time the sun "passes the line," that will be the prevailing direction for the rest of the year. Upon this theory one well known lumberman said recently that he looked for a cold winter, as the wind was blowing from the northwest when the sun crossed the equator.

"Most of our cold weather comes from the country to the northwest, and therefore if the prevailing winds are from that direction we are due to have a cold winter," said he.

#### Geese Flying South.

The geese are already flying southward from the Arctic region in great numbers. It is said that is pretty early for the flights of the geese, and this means the birds know a cold winter is coming and wish to get to warmer regions before it sets in. Ducks, too, are said to have made early flights to the southland.

Besides the muskrats numerous other animals seem to have an insight into the future and accordingly are making unusual preparations for a long and cold winter. Squirrels have already laid up a big supply of nuts and are preparing their nests in the trees for a long siege. Bears and wolves are said to have a heavier coat of fur than is usual at this time of the year and all the woodfolk seem to expect some rigid winter months.

It may be that these signs of the character of the coming winter may not count for much, but the Indians and white men who are much in the forest, and many city folks who are a bit superstitious, will take warning of the animals and will also prepare for the winter.

#### MAKING GOOD OUT WEST.

M. J. McKenna, formerly well known in Marquette and prominent in fraternal circles here, is now at Bandon, Ore., and is making a success in the lumber business there according to a recent letter he wrote to a friend here.

The company controls 400,000,000 feet of pine and cedar stumpage and owns a steamer which runs between Bandon and San Francisco.
