



There would be to difficulty about working out the details of a practicable, workable law for the great lakes, if congress only wanted to set about the task seriously. The seamen's project will doubtless be opposed by the vessel owning interests, who will want to keep their present latitude about loading. However, public sentiment should be generally favorable to a load line law, and if the seamen can arouse it they should find it an effective aid in securing the end they have in view.
