National Committee Names Colorado Metropolis as Convention City and Fixes July 7, 1908, as the Date of the Meeting.

Question of Accepting More of the \$100,000 Offered Than Is Actually Needed to Pay the Expenses Is Argued at Length, Its Opponents Fighting the Proposition as in the Nature of a Bribe, but It Is Voted to Take the Entire Sum.

Washington, Dec. 12.—After deciding to hold the next Democratic national convention at Denver, Colo., and fixing the date as July 7, 1908, the Democratic national committee late today entered upon a spirited debate on the propriety of accepting more of the \$100,000 offered by Denver for the convention than is actually needed to pay the convention expenses in that city.

Alabama, declining the money not actually needed for convention purposes, but after a long debate the resolution was laid on the table, 31 to 14.

Discussion Is Vigorous. was especially emphatic in saying that the \$100,000 which had been offered to secure the Republican convention, and had been refused, was now about to be accepted by the Democratic committee He said that the Republicans turned down the offer because it was regarded as in the nature of a bribe, and that the Democrats, in view of that circumstace, could not afford to accept it.







In the Chicago Tribune of Dec. 5 apeared an interesting article relating to spelling test in the Chicago public ols, made by Dr. R. A. White, a cominent member of the board of edueation in that city. Dr. White has been penly criticising the results obtained in he Chicago schools and asserts that the ementary branches are not taught adeprepared a list of twenty words in his opinion, the average pupil n the eighth grade or in the high school should be able to spell correctly. "Dr. White," says the Tribune, "visited a ound dozen schools in various parts of the city—two high schools among them—had the words read to the pupils and written by them, and then examined the

The list was as follows: Operation, shoulders, friend, rival, anxiety, lan-guage, probably, length, exercise, pa-tient, experiment, determined, satisfied, ttempted, gradually, intercupt, invinmedium, physician, symptoms.

At the Calumet high school among 500 boys and girls examined, the average given the papers in the test was 83; at the Englewood high school the average

In one eighth grade room of thirty-six hildren an average of only 50 per cent of the words was spelled correctly. In three other similar rooms the averages were, respectively, 65, 68 and 72 per

Superintendent Schurtz, as briefly mentioned in yesterday's issue of The Mining Journal, made the same test in the Negaunee schools. He placed this list of words in the hands of the principal of the high school and the teachers of the seventh and eighth grades and asked that the test be given immediately, which was done, not even the teachers knowing the object in view.
