It is stated that many of these are memorandum loans.

"This undesirable feature of the bank' condition was severely criticised at the time of the last examination, and the examiner reports that while some of the items have been cut down since that time, others have taken their place.

Paris, Dec. 15.-Gales of the violence f hurricanes are raging over Spain and be Mediterranean. The cruiser Isly has een driven ashore at L'Orient, and the three-master Padousa went to pieces on the rocks at Barritz. Four of the crew were drowned. A number of fishing craft were lost in the English channel and the storm drove shipping to the chelter of ports.

As Commander-in-Chief of the disturbed by the recent war. Navy, He Will Send the Fleet Away This Morning on Its Voyage to the Pacific.

Old Point Comfort, Va., Dec. 15 .- The Pacific-bound Atlantic fleet leaves to morrow morning on its journey through the straits of Magellan, enroute, as the official order reads, "for the west coast of the United States." The president is expected to arrive in Hampton Roads on

From the time the president's yacht casts anchor in the center of the fleet, the events of the departure will move rapidly, Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans of the Mayflower and pay his respects to the president, and will be immediately followed by the other flag and the commanding officers of the fleet. The reception on the Mayflower will last about an hour. Half an hour more will be consumed in lifting anchors and getting the ships in position for the start, which, it is expected, will be made about 10 o'clock. Two hours later the first of the long line of fighting vessels should have cleared the Virginian capes and turned her course to the southward. The review of the fleet by the president should be ended by 11:30 o'clock a. m.

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
