ZEAL FOR GOOD PROJECT.
It is gratifying to see shown for a charitable project the degree of enthusiasm that is manifested in the plans for the big inaugural ball to be held in the main building of the Lake Shore Engine Works' new plant the evening of January 3.

It is an undertaking in which everyone should be interested, for the end is planned for one of an essentially public nature. This end is, in brief, to establish the nucleus of a fund for building a new city hospital, or putting it another way, to start a building fund to provide for St. Luke's hospital a new home, where its present work can be carried on with better results than can now be had.

St. Luke's is today a city hospital, though it has not been known as such and has not laid stress on the point. But St. Luke's is an institution without any denominational ties whatsoever.

These matters are referred to here for one thing because there has been existent to some extent the idea that St. Luke's was an Episcopal institution, for which, as pointed out, there is absolutely no basis in fact.

For the reason that St. Luke's is today, and always will be, a city hospital in everything the term usually implies and for the reason that it is managed by an undenominational board of trustees actuated by a desire to have it fill the largest possible place of usefulness in the community, and to do whatever charity work must be done by it.

MAY LIMIT NUMBER OF SALOONS TONIGHT

RUMOR THAT "SOMETHING IS ON" FOR THIS EVENING'S MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

A rumor which appears to be not wholly without foundation and which has been a subject of considerable discussion within the past few days is that there is "something on" for tonight's council meeting. It is stated that the question of limiting the number of saloons in Marquette to twenty-five as provided by the Gordon law, is to come up.

It is known that a number of members of the council are wholly in favor of limiting the number of saloons. Within the past week a petition asking that this be done has been circulated and has received a large number of signatures. There are a number of saloon men also who favor reducing the number of licenses. These are the ones who feel that they will be included in the list of twenty-five favored ones. They are entirely willing to pay the additional \$250 license money and to divide up the business of the twenty-five that will have to go out of business.

Early action by the council, if there is to be any action at all, is desired by all those who are interested in the question. Property owners who are now renting places of business for saloon purposes want to know as soon as possible if they are to lose their tenants. The saloon men also want to have time to dispose of their businesses if there is a chance that they will not be able to obtain new licenses next spring.

The meeting tonight is an adjourned meeting and when the adjournment was taken two weeks ago, two of the aldermen then stated that the adjournment was taken in order that important questions, one of them the liquor question, might be brought into shape for discussion and for action.

ISHPEMING MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

MASS MEETING TONIGHT.
Property Owners of Sixth Ward Will Meet at No. 4 Hose House.

RODY OF OLE R. OIEN, AN OLD RESIDENT, FOUND HANGING FROM A STEAM PIPE IN THE SUPERIOR LUMBER COMPANY'S ENGINE HOUSE.

Ole R. Oien, a pioneer resident of Ishpeeming, committed suicide by hanging yesterday morning in the engine room of the Superior Lumber company on Lake street, where he had been employed for a year or more. Oien was off duty last week and during his absence William Perry, one of the teamsters, looked after the boiler. When Perry went to the plant yesterday morning about 9 o'clock to put in a fresh fire he found Oien's body suspended from the steam pipe connecting the boiler and engine by a piece of electric wire fastened close to the boiler. As it was very hot in the room it was not possible to determine how long Oien had been dead, but the indications were that he had killed himself some hours previously. The body was removed to Swanson & Persons' undertaking rooms. Coroner Prin will decide today whether it will be necessary to hold an inquest.

The deceased was one of Ishpeeming's oldest Scandinavian residents, he having located here about thirty-five years ago, upon his arrival from Norway. He was a good workman, having had a good knowledge of machinery, as well as being handy at several trades. For some years he was employed as meat cutter and sausage maker with S. Johnson & Co. He was about fifty-eight years of age and is survived by his widow and six or seven children, residing on East Vine street.

SKI HILLS COMPARED.
One Constructed Last Winter in Ishpeeming Longest in America.

Since the various ski clubs have begun making arrangements for their annual tournaments, much has been said about their hills. However, expert skiers who saw or tried the new Ishpeeming slide last winter said that it has no equal in America, and that it will be difficult to construct a better hill for jumping. It has been reported that some of the hills, said to be over 600 feet in length, are the longest in the United States, but Ishpeeming's hill is over 800 feet long. From the top of the slide to the bump the distance is over 300 feet. The grade from the top to the bump is uniform.

The work of some of the best riders at last year's tournament in Ishpeeming was perfect and the jumps were made with apparent ease. The longest standing jump was 108 feet, made by Jonninn. Munnings's hill is also over 600 feet in length, and is considerably steeper than the one here.

TURKEYS HIGH ENOUGH.
Dealer Says Poultry Can't Be Sold Below Thanksgiving Prices.

"The retail prices of turkeys and other poultry will not be as low for Christmas as an article in your paper Friday indicated," said an Ishpeeming dealer to the reporter Saturday. "The prices quoted were for undrawn stock. The best grade of drawn turkeys are bringing from eighteen and a half to nineteen cents per pound wholesale, exclusive of freight. This is practically what we paid for the dry picked drawn turkeys at Thanksgiving. We may be able to sell the undrawn stock around twenty cents per pound, but the other kind will bring twenty-two cents. Chickens should sell for thirteen or fourteen cents, geese and ducks from fifteen to seventeen.

"Poultry of all kinds seems more plentiful than it was before Thanksgiving, but we are not getting any better prices than we did then, especially for the choice stock. Turkeys are more plentiful in Wisconsin than in any of the other states from which the dealers here are supplied. There will be a big demand for poultry of all kinds for Christmas."

Extra. Preparations for the big dance are actively and rapidly going forward. An unusual degree of interest has been awakened in connection with the big affair and it is certain that not less than three thousand and more likely five thousand will be on the floor of the ball room when the grand march opens.

Workmen have already begun the decorating of the buildings which are to be used on the night of the ball. These are the machine shop as the ball room; the foundry in which the trains and conveyances will arrive under cover; the pattern shop where supper is to be served and the office buildings where the ladies' retiring rooms will be located.

Twenty-Five Boxes. All of the four buildings are to be connected by means of covered ways and the dancers may go from one to the other without exposure to the night air. In the big hall room from twenty to twenty-five boxes are to be built.

Already the work of the advertising committee is being observed and a number of newspapers throughout the upper peninsula have published notices of the approaching ball.

COMMISSIONERS ARE BUYING BACK BONDS

HISTORY OF CITY'S LIGHT AND POWER PROPERTIES STORY OF CONTINUED SUCCESS.

MAKING INTEREST BY SAVING IT

Marquette Electric Light and Power Bonds Command Bigger Premium Than Do United States Bonds.

Probably in all Marquette there is no more prosperous institution than the city's electric light and power property and the history of this municipal institution, now eighteen years old, is a story of continued success. Marquette electric light and power bonds are as safe as United States government bonds and they command a higher premium. There are now outstanding \$66,000 in bonds and a conservative estimate of the value of the properties is \$200,000.

A Record.

Within the past year the electric light and power commission has paid off \$19,000 worth of bonds none of which had matured, and within the past three days, the commission has bought in \$9,000 worth of bonds which had yet five years to run. They were bought at 104 and as the interest on them is 5 per cent, the commission saved something like \$2,500 by the transaction. The department is not only making money and saving money, but also it is selling power and light at lower rates than it is sold anywhere in the country.

In 1889 when the plant was built the first bonds were issued. This was an issue of \$60,000. In March of 1898 after the rebuilding of the plant there was another issue of \$25,000, and a year later a third issue of \$10,000, making \$95,000 in all. Within the past eight years not only have a number of improvements been put into the plant, but a constantly growing surplus has accrued and as the commission found themselves unable to place this money where it would draw interest, they have accomplished the same result by the purchase of their bonds. Instead of making interest they are saving it, but with this difference. Had the cash been banked, it would not have yielded more than 3 per cent. The interest saved was 5 per cent as the bonds paid that much and the premium paid was \$4.

Now Worth \$200,000.

In March of 1900 the total valuation of the properties was \$130,892. Since then \$29,000 worth of bonds have been bought back and besides \$38,246 in equipment has been added to the properties bringing its present valuation up to a little less than \$200,000. Marquette electric light and power bonds are secure and this the commission knows for the commission is in the market for more of them if they can

bought at anything like a reasonable figure. People who have invested in the bonds are holding on to them or asking from 106 to 108. One solid conservative institution here in the city has \$20,000 of the bonds and is holding on, for these holdings are not for sale.

Making \$139 a Day.

Figures recently compiled show that the month of November last was the most prosperous that the electrical department has ever had. The income for the month from current was \$5,928.06, from material and labor, \$1,190.85, a total of \$7,118.91. The outlay for the month was \$5,841.19, the net profit being \$4,177.72, just a little more than \$139 for every day in the month, including Sundays.

LIBRARY BOARD MEETING.

No Action Taken Upon Appointment of Successor to Miss Hewitt.

A meeting of the library board was held Saturday but no action regarding the appointment of a successor to Miss Mae Hewitt as librarian was taken. Another meeting of the board is to be held some time this week when the matter is to receive further discussion. Miss Hewitt has left the city. She has gone to her home in Kenosha. Her resignation was accepted two weeks ago by the board and became effective Saturday. Until a librarian is appointed, Miss Hannah Bennett, who has been assistant librarian under Miss Hewitt, is to be in charge of the library.

St. Luke's Hospital

Not a Denominational Institution, It Is Conducted by Board of Citizens and Is Free of Debt.

In connection with the project of holding an inaugural ball in the machine shop of the new Lake Shore Engine works' plant, the proceeds to be used to form the nucleus of a fund for providing St. Luke's hospital with a new building, it has developed that there is some misunderstanding of the status of St. Luke's. The idea prevails to some extent that it is a denominational institution, with ties binding it to the Episcopal church, and it has also been understood by some people that there was a debt standing against the institution. With the purpose of clearing up these points The Mining Journal has obtained from the directors and officials of the hospital information that shows both impressions to be groundless and that St. Luke's today is a "city hospital" in everything that the term ordinarily implies, and therefore a proper object of the united efforts of the people of the community to get together a substantial building fund.

St. Luke's has no connection, direct or indirect, with the Episcopal church. It was founded some ten years ago, in 1897. Dr. A. A. Foster, at that time a prominent physician in the city, is credited with having been one of the biggest influences in securing its establishment. Dr. Foster was the prime mover in a city, or physicians' hospital located in the building formerly occupying the site of the library, at the corner of Ridge and Front street. This building was not well adapted for hospital purposes and Dr. Foster constantly urged Mr. White and other prominent Marquette men to provide a public hospital.

The result was that Mr. White deeded to a non-denominational board of trustees the present hospital property on Ridge street for that purpose. The deed of gift specifies that the property was deeded "in trust, however, for the purpose of founding a hospital of said city of Marquette for the care and relief of indigent and other sick and infirm persons." No denomination is in any way referred to in the deed of gift. Mr. White later defrayed the expense of remodeling the building on the site.

Control of the institution, which was duly incorporated, was invested in a board of seven trustees, made self-perpetuating by the provision that its remaining members should fill all vacancies caused by the death or resignation. The constitution and by-laws, as is the case with the deed of gift, contain no reference to any denomination. Since the hospital was incorporated there have been three changes in the board of trustees, which is at present composed of Peter White, Hon. J. W. Stone, A. E. Miller, Bishop G. Mott Williams, Rev. J. M. Rogers, D. W. Powell and A. F. Koepcke. Mr. Koepcke is the managing director.

The hospital is today free of all indebtedness. It is self-supporting. No money is made, but it manages to come out about even each year. It does a considerable amount of charity work, and is conducted as a public enterprise and in an essentially public spirited manner.
