THREE STRONG MEN.

Though the national convention of the Republican party will not be held for many months, there is already under way considerable discussion of material available for delegates in this and other states.

The Republican voters in the eastern part of the district have manifested a purpose of asking for one of the two district delegates, and to offer as their candidate for the honor Chase S. Osborn.

SNAP LEGISLATION CURBED.

Among the good things to be credited to the constitutional convention is its move to end snap legislation. A section written with that purpose was agreed on in committee of the whole this week, and the attempt of one member to have the vote reconsidered was defeated, showing that the delegates have their minds fairly made up.

CORTELYOU IN DENIAL.

There is no difficulty about understanding Secretary Cortelyou's statement on his status in the presidential race. It is, in effect, a denial that he is a candidate, with the assurance that when he becomes one he will frankly take the country into his confidence. He further denies that he has prompted any political activity in his behalf, and for his friends denies that they have endeavored to influence political movements in his favor.

Early this week the Michigan representatives and Senator Smith met together to talk over the Port Huron postoffice, but while they may have had a pleasant social hour they do not appear to have arrived anywhere. The representatives plainly indicated to the senator that they didn't like the idea of senatorial interference with postoffice appointments. They also showed that they would like to know what dreadful thing, if any, the senator has on Cady, Representative McMorran's candidate for the Port Huron office, but Smith refused to show his cards or to commit himself to anything definite.

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With Senator Jeff Davis and Senator Tillman as its leading and most vociferous exponents, there's precious little to be said for the present plane of statesmanship in the south. A demagogue can travel much farther in Dixieland than he can up north.

Representative Townsend is reported to have expressed himself in favor of the nomination by the Republicans of either Hughes or Cannon. Is this where the Detroit News and Representative Townsend part?

There will be rather general agreement that Secretary Cortelyou stands a better chance of being successful in his candidacy for the confidence of the people than in his candidacy for president.

No, gentle reader, Governor Warner will not be entertained at the home of Senator Charles Smith on the occasion of his forthcoming visit to the copper country.

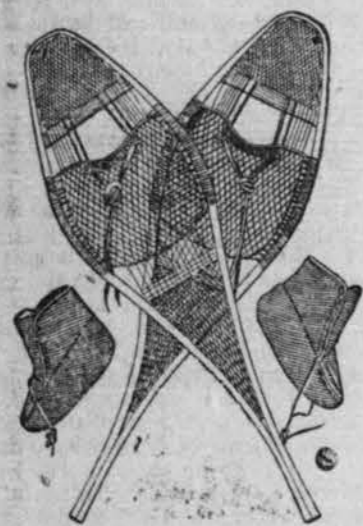

WARSHIP AS A TARGET.

Ancient Ironclad Hero Is Sunk by British Gunners. Washington, Dec. 18.—England's gunners have just completed the unique experiment of shooting at an obsolete battleship as a target. As a result the old Hero lies sunk at the bottom of the North Sea. According to naval experts the principal lesson of the tests is, the vulnerability of the British fire-control system now in use, in which, as a result, great changes will probably be made shortly. The defensive power of even old armor has received a good certificate, while battle practice records are shown to have been rather misleading.

The ship was moored so that she presented her full broadside to the attacking ships. Her guns were trained away from them—which was lucky, for the first hit was scored against the bottom of the turret with a twelve-inch shell which, although it actually did very little damage, would undoubtedly have blown the muzzles of the guns had they been there. The battle squadron steamed past very slowly, closing up to between 5,000 and 800 yards for the firing. The King Edward VII, flagship of Lord Charles Beresford, led, followed by the rest of the ships in pairs. The firing ships were the Hibernia and Dominion, two of the finest ships in the navy.

The first six shots were all misses, and although sparks began to fly from the Hero as soon as the range was found, the shooting was by no means up to the level of battle practice, notwithstanding that the weather conditions were absolutely perfect—a calm, clear day, with the sun behind the firing ships. The upper deck had been blown up by the explosion of a heavy shell underneath it, the after conning tower had been penetrated. Altogether twenty-eight hits had been scored out of about 120 rounds. There was a small hole through the funnel, but, most significant and important of all, a splinter of shell—not a direct hit—had gone through the mast, and, although this still stood, it had severed every control wire in it. This was the most urgent problem of the trial solved in the first two minutes. The ship was fitted with the control apparatus whose maintenance is absolutely essential during battle, and the attacking ships hit their target only once in every four rounds, and the whole control system had been reduced to impotence in two minutes.

The next day the Hero had a list to port of about twenty-five degrees, but a visit to her showed that she was in no immediate danger of sinking, so a second test was carried out. The same ship fired—115 rounds and about twenty-four hits—the Hero appearing to suffer no material damage, except to her upper works, which were reduced to scrap-iron. As a matter of fact, however, she had sunk, and was resting on the shallow bottom when the next examination was made. The third trial was most effective of all, and the shooting far better than in the preceding ones. Quite one-half of the shots went home, and the funnel was sent over by a shell which burst inside.

After the Hero was wrecked above the water-line, huge girders were twisted like pieces of wire, heavy iron plates were torn from their fastenings and hung across the deck, while scarcely a square yard of any of the decks above the armored deck was whole.

## Upper Peninsula

### Her Skull Was Fractured—

Mrs. Charles Backman, wife of a farmer in the Lind settlement of Iron county, is dead, the result of a runaway accident. Driving from Crystal Falls, her horse became unmanageable. The buggy struck a stump and Mrs. Backman was thrown into the roadway with such force as to fracture her skull.

### Ontonagon Boys on the Fleet—

Upper Michigan has at least two representatives aboard the fleet which under the command of Rear Admiral Evans is now enroute to the Western seas. They are Linus Alexander and James Johnson, both young men of Ontonagon. The former is on the battleship Illinois, and the latter is on the Rhode Island. The upper peninsula has others of its young men in the navy, but as far as known only the two sailors mentioned are members of the crews of battleships now headed for the Golden Gate.

### Big Engine for "Pusher"—

Engineer Heplik and Fireman Krolak are all smiles these days, reports the L'Anse Sentinel. This is because of the arrival of a new locomotive which is to do service on the South Shore road this winter as a "pusher." For a long time the company furnished what is commonly known among railroad men as a "dinky." The new locomotive is one of the latest and largest type, and was built by the Baldwin Locomotive works at Pittsburgh. She will do excellent service in helping trains up L'Anse hill.

### Manistique Shooting Justified—

The coroner's jury which investigated the shooting of Gust Nelson at Manistique has returned the following verdict: "That above twelve o'clock the night of Dec. 13-14, between the residence of John Quick and John Hunt on Cedar street, the said Gust Nelson came to his death from a load of No. 6 fine shot fired from a Remington 10-gauge shotgun while in the hands of Herman Victor Quick; and from the evidence, we, the jurors, believe Herman Victor Quick had reason to believe that the said Gust Nelson was there for the purpose of unlawfully carrying away property belonging to his father, John Quick."

### Lumber Concern in Straits—

The South Side Lumber company, with headquarters at Traverse City and which has been operating a mill at Hiawatha, Schoolcraft county, has given a trust mortgage in the sum of \$130,000 for the benefit of its creditors. The failure is the direct result of inability to secure sufficient money to continue operations. The company has a large stock of lumber and logs at its mill which is ample to pay all labor claims. This property has been attached by employees. The company has given work to a large number of men the past year and it has transformed Hiawatha into a prosperous village. Arrangements are pending whereby it is expected operations will be resumed.

### Norway Saloonists in Trouble—

Rev. Mr. Rutledge, of anti-saloon league fame, was in the city the other day, says a Norway correspondent, as a result of which four saloonkeepers were kindly invited in the name of the people to show cause why they should not be punished for violating both the spirit and letter of the law for their

Jenney has been appointed postmaster at Dunham, as the successor of Ed. Graham. Mr. Jenney is superintendent of the Lake Superior Iron & Chemical company's operations at Dunham.

### Big Canning Plant—

"Absolutely the best and most complete canning factory that I have ever seen," said a traveling man after being shown through the big plant of the Michigan Refining & Preserving company in Menominee. "I have been through the finest establishments of this kind in the country," he continued, "but have not found one that can equal in completeness this one in Upper Michigan." Operations at the plant just now are confined to the canning of sour kraut and the manufacture of syrups, extracts, blinings, ammonia, mince meat and other smaller products, but a large force of workmen is still employed in putting the factory in readiness for the big run that it will have next spring. "Financial difficulties do not bother us and it will not curtail output at all for the next year," said one of the foremen. "People have not eaten and we are going to turn out the tables next year in quantities that will be amazing."

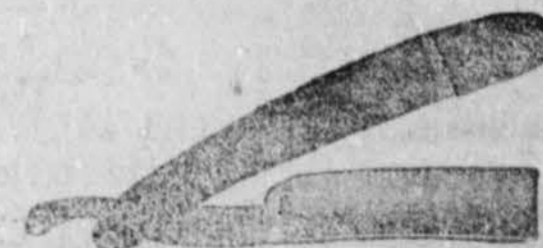

**TOWNSHIP SCHOOL AUTHORITIES FLEECED**

**COMMISSIONER STERNE EXPOSES SUPPLY MAN WHO HAS BEEN WORKING IN THE COUNTY.**

A glib tongued swindler has been reaping a harvest from some of the school authorities in this county by selling book supplies at exorbitant prices. A. E. Sterne, the school commissioner, has exposed the swindle and advised the boards of education in all townships to beware of it. When he visited some of the county schools this week Mr. Sterne found that the man had been doing a good business. In one place he closed a contract for \$180 worth of supplies. Most of the articles were sold for from 30 to 100 per cent more than their regular price. Mr. Sterne has secured some of the contracts, and will endeavor to have them broken, to protect the townships. If it is found that the contracts can be broken without involving the districts in law suits, the goods will be refused. Yesterday Mr. Sterne mailed the following letter to the secretaries of all the township school boards:

"Dear Sir:—There is an agent in the county soliciting orders for suspension globes, Cram's atlas, chart, etc. His quotations have been shown to me and they are nearly 100 per cent higher than the catalog prices of reputable houses. For instance, his price for suspension globes is \$28, when the same globe can be obtained for \$10; his price for Cram's atlas is \$11, and it can be purchased for \$5; he is selling charts for \$15 that can be obtained for less than one-half this price.

"General use of charts is no longer approved, and I do not wish them put in the schools. You need good maps in preference to Cram's atlas; then, if you think you can afford the atlas, I see no objection. You will see by the above prices that he is charging 120 per cent more than the atlas can be obtained for. It is your duty to consider this matter from these points of view. I understand he is in such a hurry to get you personally involved that reference of the matter to me is treated with contempt. I am in a position to advise in these matters and will cheerfully do so if asked.

**GOOD OIL IN UTAH.**

Brother of George R. Persons Aiding in Development of New Industry.

J. K. Persons, who spent the past two days here visiting his brother George R. Persons, left last night for Duluth. Mr. Persons has been engaged in mining work in Utah for a number of years, and he is also interested in the new Virginia River oil district, where a discovery of rich paraffin oil was recently made. He says that the oil industry promises to develop into a big thing, as discoveries have been made in a number of places in the southern and western parts of Washington county. Southern Utah. Geologists are of the opinion that there are three strata of oil sand, with indications of a large flow between each of them. The first oil was discovered at a depth of about 500 feet from surface, but in holes bored later it has been encountered at two other points, the lowest flow being at about 1,300 feet from surface.

The discovery has caused much excitement in Utah, particularly in Washington county. A short time ago five wells were in oil, and equipment had been received for some fifteen more wells. Mr. Persons said that but few Utah people are financially interested, the development work being conducted principally by Nevada and California men.

It was reported just before Mr. Persons left home that the farmers and smelter men were about to reach an agreement whereby the latter will be permitted to resume the operation of their plants. The farmers instituted legal proceedings against the operators on the ground that the smoke and gases had killed vegetation. The court's decision was in their favor and the smelters have been inactive since it was handed down. The farmers now realize that they would be better off with the plants in operation than if they are idle, as the loss of employment to thousands of men has injured them to a greater extent than they anticipated it would.

If the farmers do not yield the smelter men will have to get new locations. The loss would be a serious one for Salt Lake City and the business interests are doing all they can to secure an adjustment of the matter. The Garfield smelter, owned and operated by Samuel Newhouse, operator of valuable properties in Beaver county, is the only one that is out of the farmers' way. It is located twenty miles from Salt Lake.

**Upper Peninsula**

**Buys a \$4,000 Automobile—**

W. S. Carpenter of Menominee has invested in a fine new automobile. The car is a forty-five horsepower, four cylinder machine. It has a limousine body and is equipped with a half gray. The car complete cost \$4,000.

**Club for St. Ignace—**

There is talk of organizing a Men's Social club in St. Ignace to have its home in the bank building. The promoters are five or six in number. These men are to buy two billiard tables and the necessary fixtures, provide reading matter, lounging chairs, etc., and admit members at a stated entrance fee, and at a stated sum per annum for dues. While the club will not be what is termed "exclusive" care will be taken to admit none but gentlemen. There will be no wine-drinking, no stock or other gambling and no pool buying and selling. There will be no charge for a game of billiards.

**Slot Machines Under the Ban—**

At least as far as it has shut off one important source of revenue, the saloon keepers of Alger county are suffering from a clamping-on of the lid. Slot machines have been put under the ban. They have been tabooed by Circuit Judge Steere. Under the instructions of the court notice has been served by the prosecuting attorney and sheriff upon all retail liquor dealers in the county that the operation of gambling devices of any description is strictly forbidden under penalty of confiscation of property and prosecution. The action is the result of complaints by the parents of minors at Munising. Slot machines have disappeared now, and according to the officials the retirement is permanent.

**Upper Michigan Farms—**

Leo D. Giesmar, superintendent of the experiment station at Chatham, states that at present there are 6,595 farms in the upper peninsula, with 235,247 acres of land under cultivation. These farms are worth \$2,217 each, or in all somewhat over \$14,000,000. The land under cultivation comprises 2 per cent of the area of the peninsula. The assessed valuation of the district, including mining properties, is \$263,000,000, he figures. Were all the land under cultivation, the valuation of the peninsula would exceed \$1,000,000,000. In the lower peninsula 36 per cent of all the land is under cultivation. During the past season a large number of farmers from southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois have settled in Upper Michigan.
