New York, Dec. 30.—The year 1907 has been one in which there has been much making of financial history. will go down with 1857, 1873 and 1893 as one of the panic years in American It is said that the murderers got away finance, yet despite the remarkable stress with a large sum of money. and strain to which the financial structure has been subject the year closes with conditions stronger and safer than

they were when the year began. The year opened with a feeling that speculation had been carried to unwarranted heights, and that prudence was imposed upon bankers and capitalists. That this feeling operated to some extent throughout the year, and that there was scarcity of capital for absorbing new securities, was indicated by the diminished transactions in stocks and

bonds on the New York stock exchange The banner year prior to 1902 was 1901, when the number of shares dealt in was 265,577,354. There was a decline to 160,748,368 shares in the depression of 1903, and a recovery to 263,040,993 in 1905 and 288,424,234 in 1906. The num ber of shares dealt in during 1907 fell to 195,169,192. Bonds in 1901 showed sales of \$999,404,920, which fell in 1903 to \$684,200,850. The maximum was in 1904, when the sales were \$1,030,810,560, while in 1905 the sales stood at \$1,018, 590,420. Signs of the exhaustion of capital were already afforded in 1906 by the finally to \$561,651,500 in 1907.

### Capital Resources Strained.

The national banks have stood up under the pressure much better than in the early stages of the crisis in 1893. The suspensions at that time were about 160 in June, July and August, although eighty-four of the banks afterwards resumed business. The number of national bank suspensions hardly equalled a dozen during the recent panic. ### LEGISLATIVE ACTION COSTLY TO STATE

Important Suit Brought by Attorney General Bird Against the Crucible Steel Company of America Is Thrown Out.

Because of Failure to File Articles of Incorporation in Michigan, Supreme Court Holds the Amendment Enacted at Recent Regular Session Has So Altered Statute That Clause in Question Cannot Be Enforced.

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 30.-By its action in amending the corporation laws of the lar session defeated the action commenced by Attorney General Bird against the Crucible Steel company of America to recover \$61,000 in penalties for the company's failure to file articles of incorporation in Michigan while doing business in the state. A decision sustaining the company's demurrers was filed by the supreme court this afternoon. In amending the law the legislature so altered it that the penalty clause can-not be made to apply to the failure of a company to file its articles of incorporation. 

The prevailing vinds have been from the southwest The highest velocity of the wind record ed was fifty-four miles from the southwest on January 24, 1890. The above record was compiled by Henry R. The aldermen expect the report on the ghting plant to be favorable, despite fact that a considerable sum was exended during the year on improve The new plant is to be tested tolay or Thursday, to ascertain the quantity of steam consumed compared with the old plant. The new plant has not been in operation long enough to permit of a complete estimate of the operating expenses, but it is now thought that here will be no increase to speak of. The committee on streets and highvays will present its report for December. It will show the smallest outlay for any winter month in many years. The charge for labor was only \$73.25. The plow was out only once, the rest of ippery walks.
