AMALGAMATED.

BUTTE COPPER OUTPUT.

GOOD HEADWAY ON SIXTH WARD SEWER

CONTRACTOR HARDING'S MEN HAVE A MOST COMPLETE OUTFIT TO WORK WITH AND HAVE A THOROUGH UNDERSTANDING OF THEIR WORK.

That E. R. Harding and his foremen thoroughly understand sewer construction work is evident from the way they have started on the Sixth ward job. Mr. Harding has everything, even down to the smallest and most temporary article, needed on the job, and his men have gone at the work in a manner that satisfies the members of the board of public works that they will have their contract completed before winter sets in. The time set for finishing it is Nov. 15, but it will be completed by that date if the pipe does not arrive on time. The manufacturers promised to keep the contractor's crew busy, but all the pipe that arrived Monday was in place Wednesday night and the city turned over some that it had on hand in order to keep the full crew working yesterday.

"Every one of the men Mr. Harding brought to the city with him seems to have a thorough understanding of their work," said Superintendent Devine yesterday. "I have seen many ditches dug, but I have never before seen men finish them so well or in such quick time. Their trenches are absolutely straight. An inexperienced shoveler hardly ever digs a straight trench. Some diggers actually can't open a trench six feet without getting it crooked on surface, or in or out at the bottom. But not so with Harding's men. They are not handling any superfluous dirt, and with the fine outfit they have to work with I am satisfied that he will make money on the job. If Johnson & Munson had taken the contract and were obliged to buy one-half the staff that Harding has brought to the city they would surely have seen heavy losers."

The workmen have not yet encountered any difficult ground, nor is it expected that they will have any particular trouble either from quick sand or water, as most of the pipe will pass through territory where, from surface indications, the digging will be easy. There are nearly two miles of main to put in.

A number of the Sixth ward property owners are already preparing to connect their homes with the system. Several have let contracts for the installation of bath tubs and other conveniences. The system is being supplied by burlap in burlap tubs, laboratories, etc., exclusive of the assessments on their property for the construction of the system, will average about \$100.

Mr. Harding, who last week finished a big sewer contract at Peking, Ill., is at present in the city winding up his affairs. His work has been thoroughly inspected and tested and found satisfactory. The Peking council is to meet next Monday to accept the job and order final payment on it. Mr. Harding will come to IshpeMING as soon as he finishes up at Peking, and will probably remain here the greater part of the time until the local job is finished.

HAS A STRONG COMPANY.

The announcement of the appearance at the IshpeMING theater next week of the West-Henry Stock company has aroused much interest among the IshpeMING playgoers. This organization has earned the reputation of being one of the cleverest stock companies on the road and its success has been phenomenal. The company carries a considerable quantity of special scenery and each play is properly mounted, while clever vaudeville acts are introduced between the acts. The play announced for the opening night is "His American Friend." The seat sale for Monday night will open tomorrow morning.

BERRY SEASON ENDED.

Last of Blue Berries Will Probably Be Shipped Before the Close of Week.

The lineberry season, which has been one of the worst of the upper peninsula has had in a number of years, is practically ended, though it is possible that the final shipments may not be made from the districts where pickers have been employed until some day next week. J. Ewald, the box manufacturer and berry buyer, is winding up his affairs in this city, and will return to his home in Minneapolis inside of a week or ten days. Judging from the number of berries supplied by himself as well as those purchased by the buyers from other manufacturers, Mr. Ewald estimates that in the neighborhood of 60,000 have been used in shipments from the upper peninsula this season. He supplied about 40,000. He is now using up the last material of the sixth carload and the boys employed making the boxes and crates will probably complete their work tomorrow. Mr. Ewald had a buyer at Wellsburg, which was the principal shipping point in the upper peninsula, and he alone sent out about 5,000 crates of sixteen boxes each.

More than 50 per cent of the berries shipped from the upper peninsula were sent from Wellsburg and points in that vicinity. The crops along the line of the Chicago & Northwestern railway in the vicinity of Harvey and Sandoz was not as good as usual, and there were fewer pickers there than last year. Many of the pickers became discouraged early in the season and gave up the work as they were unable to earn good wages. Mr. Ewald said that the pickers averaged about \$1 per case after paying for their boxes and crates. The market for blue berries was not very active at any time during the season and many of those who engaged in the business either as pickers or buyers were disappointed.

He formerly lived here, but is now a resident of Negeance, and he comes to the city frequently to sell garden truck.

LINDBERG WITHDRAWS.

Gust A. Lindberg, the Cleveland avenue meat dealer, who a few days ago announced his candidacy for the office of trustee of the school board, has withdrawn. Mr. Lindberg does not give any particular reason for pulling out of the race, but he said yesterday that he had given the matter a good deal of thought since he announced that he would be a candidate and concluded that in the event of his election he would not have the time necessary to devote to the office. With Mr. Lindberg out of the race there are now only two avowed candidates, Messrs. J. G. Welsh and Fred Tomneson, whose names will appear on the same ballot.

DROVE FROM PRINCETON.

Joseph Larchelle and wife, former residents of this city, who have been located at Princeton the past few years, drove up from there yesterday afternoon and will return today. They came by way of Palmer, over the road that had been used by the employees of the Marquette County Telephone company when they were building the line to Princeton a few weeks ago. They covered the distance of twenty-one miles in five hours. Mr. Larchelle said that all of the road, with the exception of about a half mile near Princeton, is in good condition and that the trip can be made easily by team.
