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Why didn't Mr. Bryan address his telegram to Mr. Hearst? Didn't Hearst start the ball?

In other words Mr. Bryan does not propose to have his national treasurer muckraked without filing a protest.

The question remains open whether our unusual September weather is the result of the forest fires or the cause of them.

The campaign of 1908 promises to be known as the "campaign of correspondence." President Roosevelt's statements, Mr. Bryan's telegrams and Mr. Hearst's contributions of other people's letters make it one altogether exceptional.

Governor Haskell has left the Democratic headquarters for Oklahoma, and the word has gone out that he will remain in comparative seclusion for a few weeks.

Mr. Taft evidently proposes to answer Mr. Bryan's aggression with counter-aggression. In his Cincinnati address Tuesday he discussed Mr. Bryan in frank language, "going right after him," as the phrase runs.

In Fond du Lac, Wis., the Bulletin, a paper started a few years ago by people who couldn't reconcile themselves to the way the existing papers were being conducted, has failed for \$30,000.

What's Mr. Bird going to do about the attorney generalship? That is one of the questions current before the straits. Is he going to be a third term candidate? Is he going to seek nomination as a supreme judge, or is he going to retire into private life? Mr. Bird is a secretive gentleman.

The most destructive fire of more recent years was that which started near Hinckley, Minn., Sept. 1, 1894. While the area burned over was less than in some other great fires, the loss of life and property was very heavy.

This fire was all the more deplorable because it was wholly unnecessary. For many days before the high wind came and drove it into uncontrollable fury it was burning slowly close to the town of Hinckley and could have been put out.

BEAR CREATED MUCH REAL EXCITEMENT

ANIMAL'S FIRST MOVE AFTER REACHING BUSINESS DISTRICT WAS TO ENTER A BARBER SHOP, GOING FROM THERE TO THE EAST END OF THE CITY. The bear shot Tuesday evening by Mayor J. H. Winter and Al Maitland in the former's yard on East Main street created much excitement in Negaunee and yesterday hundreds of people called at Winter & Snes's market to view the carcass. The bear had evidently been driven from the woods nearby by the forest fires, and it made no attempt to fight. In its ramblings it covered the greater part of the eastern residence district, and hundreds of men, women and children saw it at one place or another, as it was making its way through the streets, alleys, and yards. Ed Bernard, who works in his father's barber shop on East Iron street, will not soon forget the bear. It came into Iron street from Lincoln, near the Breiting House, and walked down as far as Bernard's place. Ed and three small children were sitting in front of the barber shop when the bear came toward them. The smoke was heavy at the time and they supposed it was a dog, until it came almost in reach of them. The door of the barber shop was open and young Bernard ducked in just in time to slam the door in the bear's face. About this time the attention of a number of people was attracted, and they started in pursuit of the animal, which ran through the alley between the Breiting House and the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company's land office. On Mackenzie avenue Joe Curtis, chauffeur for Dr. W. H. Sheldon, ran over the animal with the automobile. This bear was apparently not injured, as it immediately started to run toward T. M. Wells' residence. Mrs. Wells was in the front yard at the time and the animal passed within six or seven feet of her. A number of the other women in the neighborhood, including Mrs. Winter and the Misses Quinn, also were almost within reaching distance of the unwelcome visitor. When the bear got into Al Maitland's yard it seemed bewildered. It entered through an open gate and went from there to M. C. Quinn's yard, and then to Mayor Winter's yard. The latter was in the house reading when his wife told him that there was a bear in the yard. His horse went for his gun and in the meantime Al Maitland came out with a rifle, and spot light. They searched for some time at the back of the houses before they got a glimpse of the bear. Finally Mr. Winter found it in one corner of his yard, trying to get through the fence. It was quickly killed. Many amusing incidents were related yesterday by people who chased the bear during the thirty or forty minutes it was in the residential district. Some of the women who children were almost hysterical, and some of the men were also looking for safe quarters. More than two dozen men had their guns in hand. The thick smoke made it almost impossible for a person to see the bear more than two or three feet distant. By the time the carcass reached Winter & Snes's market fully 1,000 people had congregated, many of whom had exciting stories to tell concerning their experiences. It was reported in the city yesterday that the bear was found in one corner of the Negaunee nursery. It is assumed that the one killed was one of them. M. C. Quinn relates that he had the novel experience of having a bear and two cubs come up to his back door while he was living at Beacon. The animals appeared to be perfectly harmless and when they saw Mr. Quinn and other members of his family, they immediately returned to the woods, which extended up to the rear of the yard. USING ICE SPARINGLY. Demand As Great As During Any Time in the Past Three Months. Richard Kappes, the ice dealer, yesterday said that if the warm weather continues much longer his supply will not last out the season. For this reason he is using the ice sparingly and will not supply any but the regular customers. Some of the saloon men he said, have been calling for quantities in excess of what they are entitled to under their contracts, but the extra demand will not be supplied. A greater quantity of ice will be used here this season than during any previous year, though both dealers expect to pull through without a shortage if their customers are not wasteful. Mr. Kappes said that he will protect his patrons as much as possible, but in doing so he must be obliged to refuse to supply those whom he is not under contract to furnish. The present year will be a banner one for the ice dealers everywhere, and it is doubtful if there will be much ice on hand anywhere when the season closes. It is reported from several places that the stocks are running low and that the dealers are adopting the same method as Mr. Kappes proposes to enforce, in order to protect their regular patrons. DEBS HERE YESTERDAY.

Socialist Candidate's "Red Special," in Negaunee for a Few Hours. "The Red Special," in which Eugene V. Debs, candidate for president of the United States on the Socialist ticket, and his party, are making a tour, arrived in Negaunee yesterday morning about 6-30 o'clock, remaining here until 9, when it left for Green Bay ahead of the regular on the Chicago & Northwestern line. It was not expected that the special would stop in Negaunee, so that the presence here of Debs and his party did not attract much attention, though in the neighborhood of 100 people were at the Iron street crossing when it pulled out. A number of the crowd came over from Ishpeming where Debs and A. M. Storton, socialist candidate for governor, gave a talk. He was asked to speak here, but the crowd was advised that there was too much noise from the trains and locomotives nearby for him to make himself heard. A young man in the party, who stood on the rear platform, attempted to make a talk, but his remarks were not taken seriously by the crowd, a number of whom joshed him. His talk was an appeal to the workmen to vote for Debs. He said that while Mr. Debs might not be elected president of the United States at this time, the socialist party is nevertheless gaining ground and that in time it will be the party in control of the national government. He said that the seed of socialism was being planted everywhere, through Mr. Debs and the other leading spirits in the party did not expect it to grow immediately. The Debs party is accompanied by a band of eighteen or twenty pieces, but it did not play here. A dozen or more Negaunee men went over to Ishpeming to hear the speeches.

ATTENTION HUNTERS!

Affected by the excitement of the dispatching of a large bear which had been driven into town by the forest fires raging in this vicinity last Tuesday, and which was run down and killed after an exciting chase, George Chellev, residing on Ann street in the outskirts of the city, retired in the evening, a dread of brown, black, cinnamon and grizzly bears. Haunted by the remembrance of his visions of the night before, Mr. Chellev, returning home to luncheon yesterday evening, was startled to see one of the characters of his dream standing on his door step. Convinced himself that it was a real bear and not a fantasy, he procured a gun and shot the animal. The bear weighed about 150 pounds. Still another bruin was seen yesterday near the Gaffney hill, this morning a party of hunters will go after it. LOCAL LACONICS. Mr. and Mrs. Andy Seass are the parents of a daughter. Thermometers registered from sixty-five to sixty-seven degrees yesterday morning at 9 a. m. The funeral of the late Mrs. R. W. Mather, president of the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company, and several other officials, passed through Negaunee yesterday. Mr. Mather's private car is on route from Ishpeming to points down the line of the Chicago & Northwestern railway. Colonel C. H. French, who is well known throughout the country as a lecturer, will speak in Negaunee next Monday evening under high school auspices. Japan will probably be his subject and his lecture will be illustrated with interesting views. M. E. Brackett, grand high priest, and J. S. Mayne, grand lecturer, of the Masonic fraternity of Michigan, were guests of the Negaunee lodge at its meeting Tuesday evening. There was a large attendance of members from this city, also Ishpeming.

FINED FOR OVERSIGHT.

A Negaunee joker yesterday circulated the story that the bear shot Tuesday night by Mayor Winter and Al Maitland was a tame animal that had been raised by a Princeton man and that it had strayed from the location. The bear weighed about 150 pounds dressed. The workmen at the new high school are making excellent progress. OHIO FOR TAFT BY 50,000.

Foraker Revelations Haven't Hurt Republican Candidate's Chances. Cleveland, O., Sept. 23.—It is not difficult to analyze the vote of Ohio, and neither is it necessary to hark back a dozen campaigns to make it plain that the commonwealth, after episodes of greenbackism and other isms, now rests upon the solid foundations of Republicanism, tariff, sound money and the fundamentals of the Republican party. As an evidence of the truth of this statement it is only necessary to recite that for twenty-two years the total Republican pluralities in state and national campaigns aggregate 1,077,902, while the Democrats in all those years won in but one campaign by 42,647, leaving the Republicans in the van by a total of 1,035,255 in pluralities. Ohio is as Republican as Philadelphia or Vermont, and there can be no stronger comparisons in the political catalogue. They will tell you that there is to be a big socialist vote in the state this year. It won't amount to a fly on a wheel in determining the result, no more than the greenback did in former years. The state is solidly Republican, and in the conclusions of these interviewers are to be accepted in full faith, Taft will carry it by from 50,000 to 75,000 and Harry Republican candidate for governor, will retain his seat in the executive chamber at Columbus by about the same figure. What about the Foraker-Archbold-Standard Oil disclosures and their effect? Only an incident, merely an episode, is the answer heard on all sides. For half a dozen years Taft and Foraker have not been friendly. The first effect of the disclosures in the judgment of those competent to speak on the subject, will be the retirement of Senator Foraker to private life. The knowledge that Senator Foraker had been an attorney for the Standard Oil company was one of the reasons why President Roosevelt broke with Foraker. The knowledge of the senator's friendly relations with the Standard Oil company was the principal reason why Foraker was not invited to participate in the great meeting at Youngstown, which was the opening of the national campaign in the state. The disclosures of the Foraker-Archbold Standard Oil affair will not, it is asserted, in view of the unhappy relations which have existed between Taft and Foraker for a number of years, injure Taft a particle in the state or elsewhere, and for that matter the Democrats in Buckeye land, while professing to be gloeful over the sensation, are really more concerned over the hampering and ripping that Hearst is dealing out to Bryan. The Republican voters are calm enough under the Hearst exposure and point to the fact that Hearst has bombarded only Foraker, Bryan and Governor Haskell of Oklahoma. Bryan's national campaign treasurer, Hearst has not fired anything, these voters add, against Roosevelt, the prosecutor of the Standard Oil company, or against Taft, the Republican candidate for president. The rank and file stand upon solid ground and they are convinced that Hearst cannot injure Roosevelt or Taft. In all the McKinley battiebacks the Republicans are solidly aligned for Taft and, in addition, there are still the anti-Bryan Democrats, who refuse to be coerced by his stump speeches or plaudits oratory. These Democrats remember him as the advocate of a dishonest silver ratio, the exponent of anti-imperialistic doctrines which, if adopted, would have been dishonorable to his country, and finally the anti-Bryan Democrats or conservatives who were won by Bryan in 1896 and 1900 and betrayed by Bryan's followers in 1904, decline to return to the fold. The Gompers' and Bryan influences on the labor vote is to be offset by the better already expressed in many working men that Taft's election would mean a sure return of prosperity, while the result of Bryan's election would be highly prohibitional. Take the congressional situation in the state next under consideration. The campaign has progressed far enough to warrant the assertion, based upon investigation, that the Republicans will retain their present membership in the next house. CAN YOU SLEEP? A German physician, Dr. Hirscheield, has been computing the quantity of alcoholic drink consumed in Berlin. Three years ago Berlin possessed 12,892 drinking shops—one for every 619 inhabitants—in addition to 301 where wine only was served. During the period the Berliners consumed 438,939,532 liters of beer, 24,704,525 liters of brandy and 19,956,962 liters of wine. This amounts to an average annual consumption per head of population of 230 1/2 liters of alcoholic drink, at a cost of 100 marks—a mark being one shilling. At the average income of the Berliners, including women and children, is about 688 marks, it may be said that the Berliner spends a seventh part of his income in intoxicating drinks—London Globe. ### TO INSTALL ROCK CRUSHING PLANT

F. B. SPEAR & SONS WILL TURN OUT MATERIAL FOR HIGHWAY AND CONCRETE WORK.

### TWO CRUSHERS PURCHASED

Will Be Located Just Beyond City Limits on the South-Railroad Spur Will Lead Directly to the Site.

F. B. Spear & Sons have completed plans for a large commercial crushing plant that will be installed just outside the city limits on the south. Its location will be beyond the second point of rocks on the road leading to the Chocoma location, some distance from the highway. The grading for a 1,500 foot spur track into the site of the plant has been completed.

The contract for the crushers has been let to the Chalmers-Allis company of Milwaukee, which has promised delivery in three weeks. There will be two crushers, the larger weighing sixteen tons. The smaller will be used to crush the rejections, or rock not crushed fine enough, from the larger, and they will be operated together. The output of the plant will be from 300 to 450 tons of rock a day, according to the size that is desired.

means of the elevator the crushed rock will be lifted to the screens, above the storage bins, and the rock will then be screened and placed in bins according to its size. From the bins it will be loaded through chutes directly into the cars. The plant will be installed with a view to securing economical operation and considering the output comparatively few men men will be employed about the plant proper.

The supply of rock will be drawn from a towering bluff of trap rock near the location of the plant. The supply of rock is practically inexhaustible, and its quality is said to be unusually good for all kinds of street and concrete work. Spear & Sons have had three reports from the federal good roads department in Washington and in each case the qualities of the rock were unhesitatingly endorsed. It was found by the government tests to be hard, tough, not absorbent of water and its cementing qualities are said to be excellent. State Highway Commissioner Earle has assured Spear & Sons that in the light of these reports he will have no hesitancy about recommending the material for road building.

Will Do General Business. It is Spear & Sons purpose, in building the plant, to enter the market to supply orders for rock for street and concrete work. With the great increase in the amount of concrete work being done and the pronounced interest in highway improvement that has been stirred up by the good roads movement there is coming to be a big demand for crushed rock, and it is a business that is expected to develop rapidly.

Many parts of Michigan have no rock close at hand that can be used either for roadbuilding or concrete work, and they have to have that material shipped in. A number of upper peninsula towns also buy crushed rock on the open market and have it shipped in.

Lipsett & Sinclair were the pioneers in this industry in Marquette and the upper peninsula. Their plant in the northern part of the city has been in operation for several years, during which time they have crushed and sold thousands of yards of rock, and they have made shipments as far distant as Cleveland. They have sold much rock in Detroit, and have also shipped to upper peninsula cities, besides doing considerable local business. Lipsett & Sinclair finish their operations at their present site this year, as they have used up all the available rock, and incidentally cleared a large number of desirable lots in the heart of the residence district.

The plant that has been operated by Lipsett & Sinclair is a much smaller

one than Spear & Sons propose to install, and it has been necessary to tear all the rock shipped to the cars, which has added greatly to the costs. Lipsett & Sinclair are considering the installation of a new plant, at a point where they can have direct shipping service from the railroads.

Spear & Sons expect to have their plant complete in about six weeks. The work will be pushed this fall with the idea of having the plant ready for a full season's run next year.

ROSS AND ROCHE, WHO ROBBED POSTOFFICE AT KOSS, SENTENCED TO DETROIT HOUSE OF CORRECTION.
