The president in his reply calls Mr Bryan's attention to the Democratic leader's speaking of the charges against Governor Haskell as they dealt with his relations with the Standard Oil company in Ohio, but that Mr. Bryan omits the charge as to Haskell's relations with the Standard Oil while governor of Oklahoma this summer, this action being taken while Haskell was at Denver, where, at Bryan's instance, he was made chairman of the platform committee. President Roosevelt says that he purposely made no specific allusion to the Ohio matter.

Queer Procedure in Oklahoma.

In Oklahoma, says the president, Governor Haskell's interest in the Standard Oil is a matter of court record, this record showing that the attorney general of that state had obtained an in junction to prevent the Prairie Oil & Gas company from building a pipe line and that Haskell found this out while he was at Denver, as appears by the representations for the dissolution of the injunction made in his name on behalf of the state before a court of superior jurisdiction to that which issued the injunction. In this the governor states that the acing governtor, in his absence, had asked that the hearing b postponed until he (the governor) might return to have opportunity to investigate the controversy. The governor states in his petition that he is the sole authority to determine such matters, and that the attorney general and the judge of the lower court had no right in the case, and the action of the judge of the lower court represented "an encroach-

ment by the judiciary." The attorney general opposed the dissolution of the injunction, stating that the Prairie Oil & Gas company was a foreign corporation which had not accepted the provisions of the constitution applicable to such corporations, and that without authority of law it was em ploying a great force of men and many teams to dig up, cross and go into vari ous highways of the state for the pur pose of laying its pipe lines. The governor, however, prevailed, the injunction was suspended and the pipe line people were permitted to continue their work without, to use the words of the attorney general, "any color of the law."

Inexcusable and Wanton.

The president says: "I call your at tention to the fact that the question is not whether or not the judge erred, or whether the injunction was proper. The point is, the governor was alert to take out of the hands of the attorney general what was his sworn duty to prevent, namely, an alleged instance of lawbreaking by this particularly great cor-

poration. "As far as I have seen, Governor Haskell has not even attempted anything which can be called a defense of this action of his. It thus appears his action was as 'inexcusable as it was wanton, except on the theory that in defiance of the attorney general of the state and at all hazards he intended for some reasons of his own to protect the interests of the great corporation against the






