BEIDLER AND CO. WIN THEIR CASE
JURY, IN SUIT BROUGHT BY MENA ZIPPE PERRON IN U. S. COURT, DECLARES "NO CAUSE FOR ACTION."

"No cause for action," was the verdict of the jury in the federal court yesterday before Judge Knappen, in the case of Mena Zippe Perron, against Francis Beidler & Co., for breach of contract.
On motion, the court gave the attorneys for the plaintiff sixty days in which to move for a new trial, or settle bill of exceptions. After twenty days, they must file a bond of \$500.
The lead and heretofore filed by the defendant for the issue of forest products and property was ordered cancelled, and the bondsmen discharged.
The case of the National Union bank, of Oshkosh, against John O. Maxey, for trespass on the case, was decided by a judgment for the plaintiff, for \$5,921, and the defendant was granted sixty days in which to settle bill of exceptions.
This cleans up the regular docket for the term, and after the consideration of a few minor matters today, the court will probably adjourn.
In the circuit court yesterday, the chancery case of Thomas Ryan against Craig was closed and will be submitted on briefs later.
The court will continue to hear motions and ex parte matters until the end of the month, when it will probably adjourn. Its scheduled sessions are, Iron county, Oct. 5; Dickinson, on Oct. 12, and Delta county on Oct. 26.

MARQUETTE WILL RETAIN MR. MAYWOOD

M. E. CHURCH SECURES THE RETENTION OF ITS POPULAR PASTOR, WHO HAD BEEN RE-ASSIGNED TO DETROIT.
Following the recent annual meeting of the Detroit conference of the Methodist church, held at Calumet, at which the Reverend Amos Maywood was re-appointed to his charge in this city, came the disquieting news that the presiding bishop of the conference contemplated a rearrangement of assignments, and the placing of Rev. Maywood in the Tabernacle church of Detroit. Now comes the assurance that the contemplated change will not be made, except by Mr. Maywood's volition, and the board of trustees and laity of the church are jubilant.
After the appointment of Rev. Maywood to the Marquette charge, a call was extended to him to accept the pastorate of the Tabernacle church, and Superintendent Sweet of the Detroit district got the conditional promise of Bishop Hamilton of San Francisco, presiding, that the reassignment would be made.
The Methodist church board became alarmed at the thought of losing a pastor who had been eminently successful in his work here, especially in the matter of cementing the factions tending to higher criticism or strict orthodoxy into a harmonious whole, and, besides filing an official protest, they brought pressure to bear upon the bishop in an informal way, which resulted in his assurance that Mr. Maywood himself would be given the choice. The bishop's assurance followed the intercession of Judge Brown of this city, who was requested by the members of the board, to call upon his old time friend, and express the desire of the church here.
Yesterday morning, Mr. Maywood, to whom the activity of the church in the matter came as a surprise, expressed his thanks to the members of the board for their desire for his retention, and said that there was only one use that he could make of the prerogative bestowed by the bishop, and that was to remain in Marquette.

NEW POWER PLANT IS WELL ADVANCED

VACUUM HEATING APPARATUS FOR STATE NORMAL SCHOOL READY IN THIRTY DAYS.

CHIMNEY A WORK OF ART

Symmetrical Structure Which Towers 110 Feet Above Its Base Displays Beauty and Grace of a Monument—Is Wholly Built.

Seldom are utility and art combined to such extent as in the case of the mammoth circular chimney, which is part of the heating and power house equipment for the Northern State Normal school, designed by Charlton & Kuenzli architects, the general construction of which will be completed in thirty days by Lippsett & Sinclair, and the Lake Superior Steam Heating company, contractors.

The power house proper is located to the left of a central axis line in the rear of the main buildings, and from it emerge concrete tunnels in the form of a T square, with suitable angles to connect with the left and right wings of the schools as originally planned.

The tunnels, which are heavily lined with concrete, are walled with the same material in circular top form, displaying a central diameter of six feet, three inches by five feet, and affording space for the return water pipes, electric wires and water mains, as well as the heating main, with a length over all of 400 feet.

In the power house, which is designed for the left wing of a completed structure, will be installed two 135 horse power Parker boilers, space being reserved for the placing of three more should future requirements demand them. Special equipment designed by the architects will be put in place for the receiving of fuel, and the disposition of slag and ashes. The heating system to be used is known as the "Warren-Webster"

vacuum, and will supersede the radiator system formerly in use in the schools. Though designed for a conduit of smooth and grime, the chimney, standing on a base of thirty feet, five-sixths of which is sunk below grade, has the graceful lines of a monument, rising in perfect symmetry to a height above grade of 115 feet. The construction for the first thirty feet shows vitrified brick above a concrete base, and the different batters, which give to the stack its pleasing lines, in their range of from three inches in thirty-two feet, to eleven inches in twenty-four feet, encircle, in the first third, a lining of fire brick. Four buttresses rise from the base and merge into the stack, thus serving to distribute the weight of the structure evenly, and the whole is crowned with a spreading cornice cap of brick and concrete.

CONVICT BREAKS JAIL

If Charles Brown, convicted of grand larceny, who escaped from the Soo jail, on Saturday night, Sept. 19, comes this way, there will be some easy money for Sheriff Lippsett of Chippewa county. Brown weighs 200 pounds, and is something over six feet in height, and the reward is offered for his arrest and detention. The escaped convict is further described as swarthy, raven-haired, high shouldered, of medium complexion, small light colored mustache, prominent nose, brown checked coat and trousers, no vest, light colored collarless shirt, and shoes of a tan, or green color. It gives his age as between 25 and 30 years.
