The United States attorneys who have n charge the rehearing of the case against the Standard Oil that resulted n Judge Landis imposing the now fanous \$29,000,000 fine, and which has ocen remanded for a new trial, will doubtless derive some measure of enouragement from the federal suprem ourt's affirmation of the Texas stat ourts' decision assessing a fine of \$1 323,600 against the Waters-Pierce Oil ompany-a subsidiary of the Standard and custing it from that state.

The decision of the supreme court is clean victory for Texas, on all points. Justice Day, writing the opinion, accentthe right of state legislatures to pass laws governing the conduct of corporate business within their borders, and be prescribe such regulations therefor as hey see fit, always assuming that they seep within their constitutional rights.

n the Waters-Pierce case the court finds that none of the constitutional rights of the defendants were invaded. On the score of the size of the fine which the defendants asserted to be exerbitant, the supreme court rules that considering the great value of the plant of the Waters-Pierce company, and the profits that were derived from its busiress, the fine does not appear to be excessive.

The disposition made of this case by which there is no appeal-cannot but have a marked influence on the general policy of state regulation, as it carries a plain intimation that any state can count confidently on being upheld in the enforcement of reasonable laws for the egulation of the subsidiary arms of the Standard Oil company, or any other great corporation that may see fit to es say the experiment of disregarding such laws. Furthermore it is shown that the supreme court is ready and willing sustain a fine that is reasonable from the point of view of the business done by the offending corporation, even if i is a staggering one in the eyes of the Thus the supreme court's decision

COST OF CRUSHED

COMPRESSOR AND POWER DRILLS AT CITY QUARRY.

STREET COMMISSION'S REPORT

Many Facts of Interest to Taxpayers produced at the city plant was used: Contained in Detailed Summary of Year's Work.

The annual report of the park, cen tery and street commission, which w be published next March, will show that the cost of quarrying and crushing th rock used on the streets of this city has been reduced from \$1.101/2 per cubic yard to seventy-nine cents a cubic yard by the use of the compressor plant and power drills installed last spring. During the summer, 15,404.5 cubic yards of rock were produced at the quarry, on which the city saved, as compared with a year ago, \$4,155,95 by the installation of the new drills. The entire cost of the compressor plant and drills was \$2,289.77, and if this amount were subtracted from the amount saved by the installation of the drills, the city would still be \$1,-866.18 ahead on the investment. However, it is manifestly unfair to charge the whole expense of installing the new machinery to one year's output, as the machinery may be used for years to

Report Is Complete and Exact.

It was only after many years of agitation that it was decided best to install the power drills, but the figures of last year show in a striking manner the wisdom of the commission in installing the new machinery. The report of the commission is made out in the same complete and careful way as that of a year ago, and is figured on exactly the same basis, so there can be no doubt that the figures show the actual gain from the use of power instead of hand

The actual cost of the crushed rock at the plant is somewhat higher than the seventy-nine cents per cubic yard shown by the report, as no allowance has been made for the cost of superintendence or the general depreciation of the plant. This fact, however, does not affect the relative figures of 1907 and 1908, as both reports are figured on the same basis. Allowing 20 per cent for superintendence and depreciation of the plant, the city has still obtained crushed rock for its streets at a considerably lower cost than would have to have been paid in the
