GREAT COAL STRIKE FEARED

Crisis Reached in the Old Fight Between the Operators and Their Employes.

New York, March 3.—Financial circles are troubled over the situation in the anthracite coal fields. The "peace agreement" that has been in effect since 1905 expires within the present month. It is not renewed the hard coal district is likely to again be tied up, and the fight between the mine owners and their employes will be rekindled.

All Demands Are Rejected. The miners have framed their demands and submitted them unofficially and unofficially they have been rejected in toto. The owners intimate that they may have to reduce wages, the men declare they will have to increase them. The mine owners say they are not making arrangements to be made for work during the miners' strike which they will concede an eight-hour day.

Both Sides Expect Trouble.

The workers and their employers are today as far apart as they were when the original strike was ordered in May 1905. Both sides are openly preparing for trouble, while denying that they expect it. From Indianapolis comes the word that officials of the United Mine Workers of America have taken stock of resources and are putting their treasury on a war basis.

John Mitchell Much Concerned.

One man here greatly concerned over the outlook is John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers. He admitted that the fact that the operators have agreed to refuse all of the demands of the men has a sinister outlook.

PUTS LIMIT ON EARNINGS.

Interstate Commerce Commission's Decision in the Spokane Rate Case a Most Important Ruling. Washington, March 3.—The interstate commerce commission's decision in the Spokane rate case is declared the most important that body ever produced. It presages a complete revolution in the whole scheme of rates from the Mississippi to the western coast, with startling reductions in the near future.

### NO LARGE BUILDING CONTRACTS IN SIGHT

HOWEVER, IT IS EXPECTED THAT THERE WILL BE CONSIDERABLE WORK THE COMING SEASON—ACTIVITY AT DIORITE.

"In spite of the fact that we have no large building contracts in sight we expect a fairly good season in 1909," said J. S. Wahlman, of the contracting firm of J. Wahlman & Son, yesterday. "Wide we had no particular rush at any time last season we worked a large force throughout the entire year and most of our men have had steady employment during the winter. They have been busy large repair jobs since the active building season closed in the fall and we expect to keep a number of men busy on this line of work throughout the coming season.

"We expect that there will be considerable building on the new range west of here, particularly at Diorite. It is believed that there will be at least thirty buildings erected there this year, in addition to those now being completed. It is also possible that the Cleveland Cliff Iron company will erect several structures at its North Lake mine, where the Foundation company of New York a few days ago started to sink a concrete shaft. The boarding house we finished last fall at this mine will not accommodate all of the company's workmen after development operations are started."

Wahlman & Son will this week complete Henry Rosenblum's new business block at Gwinn. It is a one story solid brick structure, with a large store room in which the owner is to conduct a clothing and men's furnishings goods business. Mr. Rosenblum was on the range Tuesday and gave Wahlman & Son a contract for the shelves and other fixtures. The goods have been purchased and the store will be opened for business before the close of next week. The block is on the lot adjoining Richard Quayle's new building. Mr. Quayle has completed moving his stock from his two stores at Princeton, and is occupying all of the four rooms in the new block. Mr. Quayle will have one of the most attractive stores in the county.

John Nelson, who has been in the employ of Wahlman & Son at Gwinn, is building a dwelling on Pine street, one block from the Quayle building. On Tuesday he awarded the plumbing contract to J. A. Blackney of this city, who will also do the plumbing in Victor Carlson's new dwelling, which is now ready for plastering. Mr. Carlson is Wahlman's foreman on the range. His dwelling is located one block from the bank building.
