It is further provided that the commission shall hold at least three sessions annually, and such others as it may deem necessary, and shall recommend to the legislature every second year such measures as it considers would advance the economical administration of state affairs.

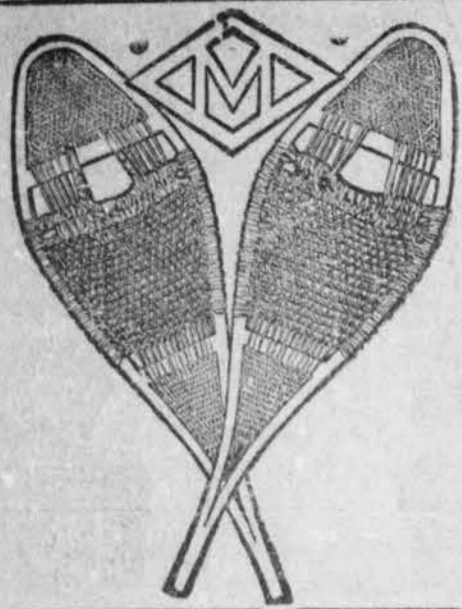

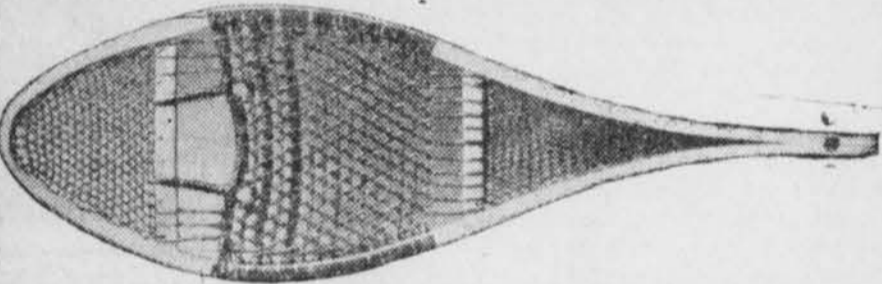

LAW NEEDS REVISION.

Attorney Would Allow Cites to Go Before Board of Equalization. While talking about the work of the committee appointed by the president of the Commercial club to investigate the relative rates of taxation in Marquette, Negaunee and Ishpeming, a well known attorney gave it as his opinion that the committee should accomplish more by working through the legislature than by laboring with the county supervisors.

There is no question in my mind," he stated, "but that the city of Marquette is paying a good deal more than its just share of the state and county taxes, but as we are outnumbered by the supervisors on the road, the city is powerless and must suffer the consequences in years past the supervisors from this city have ably argued at the annual meeting for a more just equalization, but their righteous and reasonable protests have been unheeded.

The exceeding fitness of the members of the committee appointed by President Saladin to investigate the taxation problem was a matter of general comment in the city yesterday.

Field in Lake Superior Has Increased During the Week.

The reports from the regular and dispatch stations of the weather bureau indicate that there has been an increase in the area of ice fields over Lake Superior, but the ice is light and much broken up.

Green Bay—The ice is solid and no change has occurred. Some small fields are reported over the north end of the lake; there has been no change in the condition of ice in St. Mary's river.

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thickness; the ice is becoming soft with 4 inches of snow crust on top. Green Bay—Harbor ice about 8 inches in thickness; river ice solid. Mackinaw—The ice in the Straits averages about 20 inches; no change during the week. Mackinaw Island—The ice about the island is about 12 inches thick; open water one-half mile east of the island. Port Huron—The ice fields which moved in during the week moved out Monday morning and only small fields are visible with much open water; no ice running in St. Clair river. Lake St. Clair ice averages about 8 inches; the field is broken and moving with the wind with some open water over the southern portion. The Detroit river is open to Lake Erie; some ice has been running in the river during the week. The Detroit, Belle Isle and Windsor ferry steamer "Pleasure" made a trip to Bois Blanc island on the 7th. No ice encountered. Lorain—No ice in the harbor; the fields in the lake extend beyond vision. Cleveland—The floating fields of wind-rowsed ice along shore of lake extend out about four to five miles; the thickness ranges from 3 to 12 feet. Conneaut Harbor—No ice in the harbor; some ice formed during the week; the ice fields shift with the wind; some open water visible. Erie—Harbor ice about two inches in thickness; the harbor is partly open; the north and west winds have moved the fields in on the shore; the fields are not continuous nor of much thickness. Buffalo—The harbor is practically clear of ice. The ice fields in the lake extend beyond vision; the conditions have not changed, except there is more open water about the intake and head of the river.

ISHPeming PEOPLE PATRONIZED HEALER

ONE HUNDRED MEN AND WOMEN, ALSO MANY FROM NEGAUNEE, HAVE GIVEN THEIR GOOD MONEY TO WISCONSIN MAN.

John Till, the "specialist" of Almena, Wis., whose "healing" methods were told of in a dispatch in yesterday's issue of The Mining Journal, has secured a good deal of "easy money" from Ishpeming and Negaunee people during the past three or four months. Practically all of his patients from these two cities were Finns. Till's patients have been going from here in both large and small parties. A week ago tonight a party of twenty-four Ishpeming men and women went down and last Sunday night nineteen went from Negaunee to receive treatment.

A local man, who is acquainted with several of the parties that have gone from here, said that he has heard a number express themselves as having been pleased with the treatment they received, and some of them believe they had had done him a great deal of good. If the fellow hadn't been shown up, it is thought that his practice from this county would have increased, as another large party had planned to leave for Almena next Sunday night.

It is estimated that at least 100 Ishpeming people have visited Almena during the past three months, and about forty-five have gone from Negaunee in a little over a month past. Till's business in the two cities has increased considerably during the past two or three weeks. A railroad man, whose home is at Barron, Wis., is well acquainted with Till. He said that the fellow has been doing an enormous business and that people have been coming to him from various parts of the country. Till, he said, is not a Finn, though he talks some of the foreign languages. He stated that the fellow's operations have attracted a good deal of attention in the towns near Almena and for over a year past many people have visited him weekly. It is said that a great many of the foreigners in Minnesota have been going there and the number from the Mesaba range has exceeded that from any other point in the state.

MANY SONG HITS.

FEW CHILDREN IN SCHOOLS.

Storm Yesterday Almost Put Ishpeming Schools Out of Business.

Outside of the high school, there were less than 10 per cent of the pupils in attendance in the schools of the city yesterday. A greater number of children remained at home than during any storm in several years. In a few of the lower grade rooms none of the pupils came out either in the morning or afternoon and some of the teachers were also unable to reach the schools.

Out of the 450 enrolled at the Ridge street building about ninety attended both sessions. In the first grade room there were four pupils in the morning and three in the afternoon, while other rooms had from six to a dozen, fifteen being the largest number in any one room.

In the grammar school on North First street, where over 600 are enrolled, there were less than 100. In three of the seventh and eighth grade rooms, composed principally of children from the Salisbury and Lake Angelina locations, less than 5 per cent of the pupils were present. In one room there were only four, in other there were less than a dozen and one of the eighth grade rooms had fifteen in the morning and eighteen in the afternoon.

At the High street school, where about 400 are enrolled, there were forty-eight in the morning and forty-one in the afternoon. There were only two pupils in one room and none of the children in the kindergarten came out. Another room had five and another six in attendance in the morning.

At the Salisbury school, where the enrollment is 283, there were fifty-three in the morning and sixty in the afternoon. There are seven rooms in the building, the grades ranging from one to six, also a kindergarten department. One little tot reached school in the morning and there were two in the kindergarten in the afternoon. At the Cleveland school, where there are four grades and a kindergarten, less than a dozen attended in the morning and about fifteen were present in the afternoon. The first grade teacher had one pupil in the forenoon and none in the afternoon, while none of the kindergarten children came for either session.

At the Central building, where 420 are enrolled, about fifty attended both sessions. One of the rooms had but one pupil, another two, and several of them had from five to a dozen.

About 50 per cent of the high school students were present at both sessions, and one little girl, who lives near the building, came to the kindergarten in the morning.

The falling off at the Convent school was proportionately as large as at the other schools in the city.

There are about 750 camps in the state and fully half of the number have degree teams.

The encampment will probably be held in the East Side park at Lansing, and it is expected that not less than from 700 to 800 uniformed foresters will be present. Lansing has one of the best drilled teams in the society's jurisdiction. It won one of the principal prizes at the national encampment at Peoria, Ill., last June.

It is likely that the state encampments will be held every year in the future with possibly the exception of each third year, when the head camp meets. The executive officers are encouraging state encampments, believing that they will result in creating additional interest in team work. The expenses incurred in attending the encampment will be borne by the teams, or the lodges they represent.

The market has been sold to a standstill in anticipation of a very bullish report, but these figures are construed as being distinctly bullish, in view of the fact that recent sales of the metal amounting to upward of 100,000,000 pounds were made in the month of March, and consequently do not show in this report. CREAMERY WILLING TO LOCATE HERE

PROVIDED SUFFICIENT QUANTITY OF MILK CAN BE OBTAINED TO MAKE IT PAY.

WOULD BE BOON TO FARMERS

Industry Would Result in Agricultural Development of Surrounding Country, Say Those Who Know.

A proposition of more than ordinary importance to the business interests of this city has recently been made to the manufacturing committee of the Commercial club. The chairman of the committee stated yesterday that he had received assurances from a creamery syndicate, operating a number of factories in Wisconsin and in other parts of the Northwest, that the company was anxious to put in and operate a creamery in or near this city, provided that a sufficient amount of milk could be guaranteed to make the plant profitable.

It is understood that the company must be assured of the milk from about 500 cows before it would consider itself warranted in erecting and equipping a butter making establishment. The company in question is said to be one of the largest in the Northwest and to have excellent financial standing. In the proposition made it is stated that the company pays and expects to pay the Elgin scale of prices for milk and cream.

The installation of a large creamery, such as this company proposes to establish, would be of great import, both agriculturally and in a business way, said a prominent business man yesterday. "It would mean that dairying would in time become the chief industry of the farming population of this locality. To entry on the dairy business successfully and profitably means that the farms must be improved, new buildings erected and the land cultivated in a more systematic way. The agricultural population would naturally be considerably increased, all of which would result in increased and additional business for the city of Marquette.

Harvey District Best Adapted. "The farming region near Harvey, Marquette and Yalmar is generally considered to be best adapted to the dairying industry, although it could be developed profitably in Marquette township, as has been demonstrated by several farmers now selling milk at retail in this city. While it is not probable that the creamery would be located within the city limits, the committee believes that the people of Marquette should do all possible to induce the creamery to establish a plant in this section of the county. As was forcibly illustrated in the talk given by Leo M. Geismar, at the Commercial club banquet several weeks ago, the development of the farming districts surrounding a city are of even more importance to that city than additional industries. One of the strong points made by Mr. Geismar was that the farmer both sells his products and buys his necessities from the city merchant, thus giving the latter a double profit; moreover, the farmer comes for all time, while factories are apt to suspend business or move away at any time.

"It is said that the Harvey farming district will soon be at the point where the tillers of the soil must change their methods of farming, or leave the land. Those who are familiar with the country say that the farmers have pursued the policy of selling wood and hay from the land, and putting nothing back on it in return, until it is becoming exhausted, and something must be done to restore its fertility. It has been said that the quality of hay brought into this city has been poorer every year for the last few years in many of those called farmers' fields. This is clearly demonstrated in northern Wisconsin, where hundreds and hundreds of cleared homesteads have been transformed into up-to-date and profitable dairy farms. In most cases this has been accomplished through the medium of the creamery.

Judging from the experience of Wisconsin and the advice of agricultural experts, the most feasible way of developing the wonderful agricultural resources of this community would be to make it a great dairy country. Before the farmer can be expected to purchase cattle and go extensively into the dairy business, he must be assured of a market for his product. In the offer of the creamery syndicate he is afforded that market. GETS A GOOD POSITION.

W. F. McKnight, Appointed General Counsel for Honduras Railway.

A dispatch from Grand Rapids says: William F. McKnight, a well-known politician and attorney here, has received the appointment of general counsel for the Honduras National Railway company, which United States and Honduras capitalists are promoting. L. M. Fairbanks of Marquette, brother of ex-Vice President Fairbanks, is president of the road. M. L. Milligan of Springfield, Ohio, is vice president; Spencer B. Pugh, Chicago, secretary, and Franklin O'Keefe, Chicago, treasurer. The new road traverses the rich region of Honduras and has been granted immunity from taxes and many valuable concessions by the government. One hundred miles of road will be completed this year. Mr. McKnight was formerly an officer of the Northern Lumber company, operating at Birch, Marquette county.

NO CHANGE IN TROUT SEASON THIS SUMMER

ANY BILL PASSED BY THE LEGISLATURE LIKELY NOT TO BE EFFECTIVE FOR NINETY DAYS AFTER SESSION.

State Game Warden Pierce is reported to have made the following statement regarding game and fish regulation, a subject now under discussion by the legislature: "The bill changing the open trout season back to May 1 to Sept. 1 passed the senate some days ago and is now before the senate fisheries committee. I am inclined to think that the bill will pass the senate, but I don't know whether it will be possible to give it effect this year on account of the provision that no act shall take effect until ninety days from the end of the session, excepting that the legislature may give immediate effect to acts making appropriations and acts immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety, by two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house. The trout bill hardly comes under any of these exceptions.

General Hunter's License. "The bill that I am most interested in passing is the general hunter's license bill, requiring every man who hunts protected game to secure a license, just the same as a license is required of every man who now hunts deer. The license fee as fixed in this bill is one dollar, and I do not believe the payment of that amount will be a hardship upon any man in the state who desires to hunt. I see no reason why men who hunt partridges, quail and duck should not secure a license just the same as a man who hunts deer.

"If this bill becomes a law it will not only furnish a decent fund for the enforcement of the laws but it will give every man the right to hunt. It will enable us to identify any man who is out hunting and in that way we can soon locate the violators and the market hunters, and it will also enable us to enforce the law requiring a license from non-residents of the state. This law is difficult to enforce now and we are unable to get the license fees from half of the fellows who come in from outside of the state for the reason that they are from Saginaw, Grand Rapids or Detroit. In order to enforce the law we must file an affidavit with the fellows who will not take a chance on committing perjury in order to save the non-resident fee.

General Fish and Game Bill. "I am also in favor of the passage of a good general bill for regulating fishing on the inland waters, but it is a difficult matter to frame a bill under the new constitution, for the conditions are so much different in different localities of the state that it seems almost impossible to enact provisions that would apply reasonably to all the different waters in different sections. We are trying our best to work out something along that line.

"In regard to a general game bill, of course it is easier to frame a bill that will hit all parts of the state. I have drawn a bill which, while it does not go so far in some respects as I would like it to go, will in my opinion, greatly improve conditions and perhaps will pass as strong a one as the legislature will pass. The principal feature of the bill, or at least the one that will probably attract the most attention, is that limiting the number of birds that may be killed in a day, or that may be in possession at one time. It limits the number of birds that may be killed during a season, which has not been done heretofore.

MANY ENGINEERS HAVE NOT SIGNED

REPORTS FROM DULUTH INDICATE THAT DANGER OF LABOR TROUBLE ON THE LAKES IS NOT OVER.

It was reported from Chicago recently that practically all of the engineers in the employ of the Pittsburgh Steamship company had signed the "open shop" contracts for next season and that, in the opinion of officials of the company, there was now little reason for apprehending an engineers' strike at the opening of navigation. The conditions existing in Duluth do not bear out the above statement, according to the Duluth Herald, and the opinion is expressed that the opening of navigation on the lakes will in all probability be accompanied by labor trouble.

"There are in Duluth eighty marine engineers and each one of them has returned his contract unsigned to the boat owners or their representatives," says the Herald. "They say that the contract calls for the open shop, and that they cannot stand for it. While the contract does not mention anything about decreased wages, and the engineers know that the owners are not thinking of cutting the wages, they say there is even more of a financial loss to them by signing a contract than if the wages were really cut. The contract, they say, binds them to a boat. No assurance is given them that they will have work and if the boat is not put in commission they are expected to wait until she is. That is, they bind themselves to the boat to which they are assigned by signing the contract. They are then bound to wait until that particular boat is put in commission. Maybe she will be used and maybe she will not. The engineer who has signed the contract is not allowed the privilege of working where he can get his own money, but all other unions which they might come in contact during their duties aboard ship.

"The Duluth engineers, as well as those all over the lakes, say they will not sign up, and that the boats will just this year be idle not because of lack of work, but because there will not be engineers to run them.
