But things are changed and never was it more noticeable than this spring The woodsmen are returning, it is true but the return is scarcely noticeable In the first place, the type of men wh work in the woods has changed. Th old woodsmen have moved along. They are in the West, in Alaska, in Canada are following the frontier as it moves steadily backward. The men who have taken their places are either steady hard working men, who have families dependent upon them, and carefully save the money they earn in the woods, or they are the poorer classes of laborers from southern Europe, whose spirit has been broken by centuries of poverty. Sodden dissipation has replaced the old time revelry. Their dissipation is not the dissipation of the old-time lumberjack who had to find some vent for his pen up energy and animal spirits. Few woodsmen in these days spend a winter in the woods. Some claim it is the fault of the employment agent and the foreman and the old story of collusion to keep the lumberjack moving for their mutual benefit. Others claim the men have changed, and are no longer content to spend the winter in the woods, re turning only in the spring with a "roll." Whatever the cause, the fact remains that but few men remain in the woods for more than six weeks or two months at a time.
