WESTERN "RADICALS" IN SENATE PACIFIED

That They Have Been Given Good Committee Berths, However, Does Not Mean They Have Been Placed in the Seat of Power—That Continues in the Possession of the Easterners, and Will for Many Years Yet.

Washington, March 26.—In a noiseless way, but none the less effectively, the senate has been "westernizing" itself within the last month or two. The best of the new western senators have been "taken in" as the saying goes. That means they have been given some additional recognition, not that they have been placed in the seat of power. The East, particularly New England, more particularly Maine, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, continues to control in that branch of congress. It will be many a year, apparently, before that condition of things will change.

Senator Hale of Maine has been instrumental in bringing about this "westernization" but Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island has co-operated closely with him in the adjustment. They have found good working places for the crop of western senators, four years in the service, and good places for the crop of western senators two years old, and have even provided for their seats, which are hardly warm in their seats.

This action will quiet the clamor that has been making for months. As an example, one of the biggest "kickers" among these westerners has been Senator Burkett of Nebraska, one of the youngest men in the senate. He came there four years ago from long service in the house, where he had been a member of the appropriations committee and also a protégé of "Uncle Joe" Cannon. It seemed to the old leaders that Mr. Burkett did not "size up" well in the senate and they were chary about giving him important committee places. The result was that Mr. Burkett began to make a noise against everything that the leaders brought up. Now he is assigned to appropriations, although with some misgivings. He will speedily fit into the senate machinery.

Quick to Take Up Able Men.

Whatever may be said to the contrary, the men who exercise control of affairs in the senate are very quick to take up any new senator who shows good ability. Senator Cummins came to the senate with a national reputation. Although he belongs to the progressive republican faction, as distinguished from the conservative eastern men, the leaders are already "taking him in." He has been in the senate less than four months, but he is to be one of the members of the new and very important committee to regulate the total of expenditures—which some designate the budget committee and some the committee of controllers. Soon after Senator Cummins came here he joined the insurrectionists, but he quickly put on the brakes, as he discovered that he was not altogether in harmony with their methods.

Borgh Getting On.

Another able young westerner who has been taken care of this session, during the reorganization, is Senator Borah of Idaho, who has demonstrated some capacity for legislation and has trained some with the insurgents. But he carried himself so well and proved himself so thoroughgoing in whatever he attempted, that the leaders reasoned he could well be set to important committee tasks. Senator Hale made him a member of the committee on committees, which was only the first step. Senator Bourne of Oregon, the famous "second original term" man, who persisted in advocating the nomination of President

is proved by the old ruins, which we examined closely, and not in a single instance did we find an earthquake crack in them. Panama is not an earthquake country. There may be an earthquake down there some day, but as for that matter there may be one in New York, too, some of these days. Let me say a word of the sanitary situation on the isthmus. I saw only half a dozen mosquitoes while I was there, and they were shown as curiosities. The yellow fever is gone and the malaria practically eliminated. The food supply is under government control, and all the water is sterilized, and today, in my opinion, the isthmus of Panama is a healthier place than the city of New York. Had the French mastered the mosquito I cannot but think that they would have finished their canal."

PAPERMAKERS ARE ROUTED

Their Arguments Against a Lower Tariff Are Overthrown and They Are Defeated at Every Turn—No Danger of Any Competition from Canada.

Washington, March 26.—Wisconsin paper makers have attempted an assault upon the paper schedule of the Payne bill and have been bowled over in the first round. A delegation headed by George A. Whiting of the Whiting Paper company and F. J. Sensesbrenner descended upon Washington, rounded up the Wisconsin delegation in congress and announced that this was only a beginning by the paper makers of state delegation meetings at which the congressmen would be expected to pledge themselves to vote against the ways and means proposition to reduce the duty on print paper from 80 to 82 a ton.

In the Wisconsin meeting sat William H. Stafford of the fifth district, who happened also to have been a member of the paper and wood pulp recess committee headed by Representative Mann of Illinois, whose recommendations had been adopted by the committee; and every time the Wisconsin manufacturers made a statement calculated to reveal the iniquity of the Payne reductions, Mr. Stafford gave a few facts and figures which left them not a leg to stand on. To the wait that the reduction would ruin the paper making industry Representative Stafford quoted figures to show that it cost more to make a ton of paper in Ontario than in the United States. Mr. Stafford showed that the Ontario mills paid more for skilled labor working eight hours, than the United States paid for a day of eleven and twelve hours.

GOVERNOR SMITH PROTESTS.

Declares Provisions of the Payne Bill Disastrous to the Philippines.

Washington, March 26.—Governor General Smith of the Philippines has sent a long cablegram to a high officer of the administration, who is also very close to Mr. Taft, protesting against the treatment of the islands by the Payne tariff bill. Governor Smith, according to the stories which have received thus far limited credence, believes that the provisions relating to commercial relations between the United States and the islands were very unsatisfactory.

GATUN DAM SURELY SAFE.

Engineer Allen Hazen of Mr. Taft's Board of Experts Tells of His Investigation.

New York, March 26.—Allen Hazen, who was a member of the board of engineers which accompanied President Taft to Panama to investigate the truth or falsity of the criticisms that were directed for so many months against a canal of the lock type, told the members of the New York Universalist club the results of that investigation.

"Before we went to the isthmus," said Mr. Hazen, "President Taft told the board of which I was a member that he wanted us to look at the work from all points, to study it in all its phases, and that if we discovered any weaknesses anywhere we were to say so and he would do what he could to remedy them. So we went there with power to ask all the questions necessary. The canal now being built will be large enough to permit the safe passage of vessels 110 feet wide and 1,000 feet long, and navigators who are familiar with the work down there have told me that they will be able to make the passage from ocean to ocean quicker and safer in the lock type than they could have had the sea-level type been decided upon.

American papermakers would meet, and Mr. Stafford said the committee got its figures from the Booth mill. The Wisconsin men urged that unskilled labor cost more than in Canada, and Mr. Stafford, backed by Representative Steener, proved that even unskilled labor was more expensive in Canada than in the United States.

The Wisconsin men came across with the plea that if the six dollars duty were to be removed from wood pulp the Canadians should abolish their own duty of five dollars. Mr. Stafford held that the protection to the consumer embodied in the Payne bill would be absolutely destroyed if this were done, as he showed by facts and figures that the Canadian industry in wood pulp would be destroyed by American competition if the Canadians had no protection. This was not the main point, however, as he said that as soon as the American paper trust had succeeded in wrecking its rival it would turn around and put all the consumers of the United States at its mercy. In fact, he showed that sales of Canadian paper and pulp in the United States by Canadians were sometimes possible because the American trust persisted in holding its prices so far that they let the Canadian goods in. American pulp makers now had protection, he said, in the fact that Ontario does not permit wood pulp to be exported, but the scheme proposed by Wisconsin would kick over the whole arrangement. The papermakers turned and fled, and it is said in Washington today that they have given up the fight.

SITE A WILDERNESS A FEW MONTHS AGO

Model Town in Newfoundland Is Given Over Wholly to the Making of Wood Pulp.

St. John's, N. F., March 26.—What was several months ago a tract of virgin wilderness in the central section of Newfoundland is today, because of the scarcity of pulpwood in the United States, a town of nearly two thousand inhabitants equipped with the most modern devices for labor conservation, comfort and expedition. The town of Grand Falls, which had its inception in the fact that a wealthy English newspaper owner desired to assure himself of a continuous supply of pulp wherewith to manufacture his paper, is the latest of the "boom" towns which have sprung up on the North American continent periodically. In the present case, however, private capital and enterprise are entirely responsible, and the inhabitants are persons carefully chosen because of their fitness as model citizens, skilled pulp makers, laborers and wives and mothers.

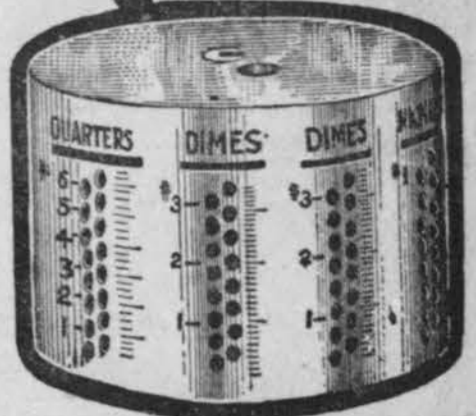

BASEBALL MEN REACH AGREEMENT

CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH ISHPeming AND NEGAUNEE INDOOR TEAMS WILL PLAY SERIES ARE SATISFACTORY TO BOTH MANAGERMENTS.

The management of the Ishpeming City and Negaunee Union indoor baseball teams yesterday accepted the conditions prepared by the representatives of the Mining Journal and Iron Ore for the series of games to be played in the two cities.

The agreement is as follows: Articles of agreement between the Ishpeming City indoor baseball team and the Unions of Negaunee for a series of five games to be played according to the rules hereinafter specified by Ed. J. Butler of the Marquette Mining Journal and E. G. Carney of the Ishpeming Iron Ore.

COUNCIL BUSIED WITH MINOR THINGS

MANY MATTERS DISCUSSED BUT LITTLE BUSINESS OF GREAT IMPORTANCE DONE.

The committee on streets and sewers recommended that land be leased of Mrs. Schwalm on motion to run a sewer near Front street, between Michigan and Ohio streets.

The committee on streets and sewers reported that the petition of Mary Told for a rebate of her sidewalk assessment of \$77.10 be not granted, inasmuch as there was no legal way to relate the assessment.

The public health committee reported that one meeting had been held at which the subject of tubercular cattle in this city had been discussed, with Dr. A. W. Deadman present.

Assessment rolls were confirmed for sewers in Division street from Genesee to Mesnard street and in parts of Alger and Lee streets.

The council then adjourned to meet again next Friday night, April 2.
