

### Mining News

Review of the Last Three Years-Average 43,000,000 Pounds Per Month.

It is both an important and an intersting fact that the average monthly demestic consumption of copper during the last three years-including the rec ord-breaking year of 1906-has been less than 43,000,000 pounds. The average consumption in 1906 was about 57,000,000 pounds monthly, and at no time in that year did the nelting exceed 60,000,000 a month, although for a brief period deliveries into consumption during the height of activity somewhat exceeded the ac-

tual consumption.
It is estimated that domestic melting oday is about 60 per cent of the tonnage which went into consumption in 1906, which indicates about 36,000,000 pounds er month, but even on the assumption that melting has increased to 70 per cent of naximum we are consuming in this country today only about 42,000,000 ounds per month. The deliveries into onsumption since Jan. 1, according to the Copper Producers' association report ave been at a much higher rate, indicat ng that consumers are gradually increas ing stocks, making them more independ ent of the current market.

Recent reports from both Germany and Breat Britain show that there has been a falling off in consumption in Europe a empared with 1907 and indicating that nelting in Europe is not over 75 per cent what it was a year ago. Exports rom the United States to Europe have herefore been in excess of foreign conumers' requirements, indicating that opper is still going into stock in Europe






