### JOHN POWER PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY

PROMINENT ISHPEMING MAN, WIDELY KNOWN AND HIGHLY ESTEEMED IN UPPER MICHIGAN AND WISCONSIN, ANSWERS THE FINAL SUMMONS.

John Power, who had lingered between life and death for some days, passed away yesterday morning at the family home on North Maple street. His demise, while a great shock to his many friends, was not unexpected, as it was known that he could not recover. Mr. Power had been a patient sufferer for several months past, and it was known for several weeks that it was a question of only a short time when he would pass away. His death was due to a complication of diseases from which he had suffered for years. During his early sickness he spent some time in the South, seeking relief. For some little time following his return his condition was much improved, but his health was never fully restored.

Mr. Berg has been prospecting on his own account the great part of the past four or five years. In 1907 he discovered a gold vein that he claims is the richest ever located in the western part of Alaska. After proving up the veins sufficiently to satisfy himself that paying mines could be developed he went to Seattle, where, with the aid of friends, he organized the Alaska Trokant Mining company. Three mines, the Copper King, Mount Berg and Mount Wedo, have been opened, and the company has acquired 360 acres of land, on which the mines are located. The Mount Berg and Mount Wedo are in one valley and the Copper King is in another.

The company has platted the townsite of Tronsberg, three miles from the mine, and a mill site has been located about midway between the mines and town. The company expects to work fifty men at the properties the coming summer and the construction of a railroad, extending from Tronsberg to the mines, will be started within a few weeks. Mr. Berg is treasurer and general manager of the company, which has a capital of \$1,500,000 and is incorporated under the laws of Washington. The par value of the stock is \$1 per share and 500,000 shares are held in the treasury. All of the properties being developed by the company carry lead, gold and silver values.

Mr. Berg is thoroughly posted on Alaska and he predicts some of the more prominent mining districts will grow rapidly from this time on. Railroads are now being constructed and the population of practically all of the towns is increasing. Wrangell, which is the second oldest town in Alaska, was founded 103 years ago, and was named after Alaska's second governor. The population at this time is only about 1,000, but it is an important port.

The entry into the Alaska district of the Guggenheims interests is proving an excellent thing for the country. The Guggenheims own the Bonanza mines, which are said to contain the richest copper veins of any property in the world. Much of the copper being produced assays from 28 to 38 per cent in mineral. The company will soon complete a railroad 160 miles in length from Cordova to the Bonanza properties, at a cost of over \$12,000,000. The bridge spanning the Stieken river, not far from Cordova, will cost over \$2,000,000. The transportation of the steel from this country is quite an item, as the freight rates between Seattle and the Alaskan coast are high. A considerable amount of placer mining has been done on the Stieken river, which was one of the first streams explored in that country. The early prospectors went up the river, which is navigable for 160 miles toward Stagway, Dawson and other points in the northwest.

**BENEFIT OLD SOLDIERS.**

Grand Army Men of the State Hope Chandler Bill Will Become a Law.

If the Chandler bill introduced in the house by David G. Chandler, representative from Grand Traverse county, becomes a law, several members of Charles H. Towne post of the Grand Army, of this city and Negaunee, will be benefited. The bill provides for the exemption from taxation on real estate to the amount of \$1,200 of any soldier or sailor or of the federal government, who served three months or more during the Civil war, and real estate to an equal amount of any widow of such soldier or sailor, provided they are not the owners of taxable property of greater value than \$2,500, and, in addition, the personal property of any pensioner not exceeding in value \$300 over and above all other exemptions.

### ALL IN READINESS AT MARQUETTE PORT

ORE DOCKS AND FISHING TUGS PREPARED FOR THE OPENING OF NAVIGATION.

FIRST BOAT APRIL 20, MAYBE

Dispatch from Cleveland Says That "Panay" Is Scheduled to Load Here on That Date—Marine Business Quiet.

Marquette marine men are getting everything in readiness for the opening of navigation at this port, which is expected to occur between April 20 and May 1. The ice outside the breakwater is now broken up so that a boat would have little difficulty entering the port, but the field inside the breakwater is still unbroken.

According to a dispatch from Cleveland the steel steamer "Panay," of the Carter fleet, of Erie, is the first boat to be placed for ore this season and her owner has agreed to have the boat at Marquette ready to load by next Tuesday. The local dock agents have received no notice of the Panay's coming, and no start has been made toward filling any of the docks.

The D. S. S. & A. dock office at the foot of Main street has been opened up and the books are being gotten in readiness for the season's business.

Freight Market Quiet. The freight market is very quiet, and none of the big ore shippers is in the market for tonnage.

The independent owners will be slow in getting their boats ready, and it will probably be as late as it was last year when a general start is made.

Lake Fishing Next Week. Local fishermen are fitting up their tugs for use as soon as the ice is entirely gone, and the nets will likely be set some time next week.

STREET COMMISSION UNJUSTLY CRITICISED. LARGE PART OF LAST SEASON'S EXPENDITURES WERE MADE AT THE ORDER OF THE COUNCIL—THE FIGURES.

On account of the unusual amount of work done by the park, cemetery and street commission at the order of the council and work the cost of which was assessed against the property benefited, the total of expenditures by the commission for the fiscal year ending last month reached the total of \$88,593.93, as shown in the annual report, recently published.

The appropriation for the park, cemetery and street commission a year ago was \$33,000, of which \$5,000 was for the park and cemetery fund. This left \$28,000 for street and general improvements. These amounts were considerably in excess of those for the previous year, when the total appropriation was \$18,500, but in large measure the great increase in the total of expenditures was due to the increase in the amount of work ordered by the council and done for private individuals.

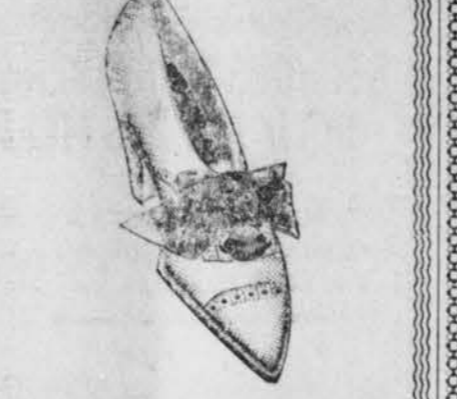
