London, April 15.—Dr. Marie Stopes, D. Sc., lecturer on fossil botany at Manchester University, has returned to her home in London after eighteen months' research regarding the primeval fossils of the world.

GILA MONSTERS INCREASING.

"Naturalists who recently visited the Mojave desert in Arizona say that there has been an increase in the number of gila monsters in that region," said Dr. A. B. Cudron of Prescott, Ariz. "These lizards are of great interest to the geologists for in spite of investigations authorities still differ as to whether the bite of a gila monster is fatally poisonous. I have had several instances come under my observation where men have been bitten by gila monsters, but in each case the bite was not fatal. In the case of a gila monster biting a guinea pig, however, the poison was fatal a few minutes after the bite of a gila is fatal to a human being and the lizard is held in much respect by them. It is likely, however, that this fear is occasioned largely by the repulsive appearance of the reptile. The head is very prominent, comprising about one-fifth of the total length of the body, and like the back it is thickly covered with yellow and black tinted tubercles. Its skin is very tough, and although the bones of the tail are fragile, this part of the reptile is very strong, it being possible for the monster to raise itself and balance the body on the tip of the tail, thus enabling it to climb rocks and steep ascents. There is no doubt that the teeth lead to gila containing poison, and it is very noticeable in its movements, but it is not much like other reptiles. If one attempts to strike the gila with a stick, it will grasp the weapon in its jaws like a dog does, and when angered it emits its breath in a succession of quick gasps. It is supposed that the breath of the gila, as a drug-like effect on insects, and as it can be detected at a considerable distance it is believed that this is the way it catches its food."—Washington Post.
