Taft Adopts New Policy

Action, Not Talk, Is Favored by His Administration.

Government Publicity Machinery Sent to the Scrap Heap—Cabinet Advised to Avoid Brass Band Methods—Work Rather Than Agitation Advocated by the President—He Also Is Inclined to Speak for Himself and Is Making Plans to Meet the People—He Resents Insinuations That He Is Not Progressive.

Washington, April 21.—The Taft administration is proving to be a consistent one. From the White House down to the most obscure bureau there is now an understanding that action and not talk is desired.

No one knows just what has been passed between the president and the members of his cabinet on this subject; no one will ever know because the secret of the cabinet meetings are kept so close that not even the members understand that the cabinet officers in cautioning subordinates not to resort to the "brass band" methods of the former administration are carrying out the wishes of the president.

The last administration believed in the efficacy of agitation. It believed in the propagandist. In order to carry forward the work of agitation, publicity bureaus were established in most of the departments. The government press agent came into existence.

Somehow the new president seems to believe his administration can get along without the assistance of the government publicity man. There has been no official statement of the administration since the inauguration.

Naturally the change has provoked a great deal of discussion in unofficial quarters. Men who were enlisted under the former president in the campaign of "education," as they prefer to call it, are quite certain there has been a backward step.

There is another view of the subject that may be taken: President Taft, according to men who are close to him, desires to be his own spokesman. This is also pointed out that he also has his own ideas as to how he ought to reach the public.

EACH FACTION CONFIDENT

Daughters of the American Revolution Will Choose Officers Today.

Washington, April 21.—On the eve of the balloting for officers of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the contestants are concentrating their forces and each is claiming the victory.

A dramatic feature of today's meeting was the frank statement of Miss Janet Richards, official reader, that she alone was responsible for the "blunder" of last night which had placed Mrs. Story, Mrs. McLean and the congress in an awkward position, resulting in the refusal of the president general to recognize Mrs. Story in order to submit her report as regent of New York.

A good deal of business was transacted during the day. Many reports from committees were read and ordered printed and the annual contributions for Continental Hall fairly swamped the president general's desk.

AMBASSADOR BRYCE SPEAKS

Anniversary of the Birth of Calvin Is Celebrated at Baltimore.

Baltimore, Md., April 21.—The principal speaker tonight at the celebration of the anniversary of the birth of John Calvin was Ambassador Bryce of Great Britain.

Mr. Bryce observed that he was not going to say anything about Calvin's theology and little about his life, but would merely characterize in precise terms his historical significance.

After discussing Calvin's change of religious views and his stay at Basel and at Geneva, Mr. Bryce said: "The sources of Calvin's influence were to be found partly in the character of his intellect and partly in the force of his will.

When he began to write those who were breaking away from the German church, for they had not yet come to be known as protestants, were not only unorganized, in religious bodies, but at variance upon all sorts of questions of doctrine, discipline and ecclesiastical government.

Calvin's great book, the Christian Institute, provided all these. It was a systematic body of doctrine; it was also a body of practical ethics based on the scriptures applied to church discipline; it was also a scheme of church government.

It will not be a trip for the purpose of starting an agitation of any kind," said one of the president's friends today. "But the president will, I am certain, give the public a clear idea as to what he hopes to accomplish. He prefers this plan to that of having government 'press agents' here at the capital handing out daily statements as to what the administration intends to do."

From an authoritative source comes the information that Mr. Taft is charged over the insinuations in some quarters that he is a "progressive" president. He feels, according to this information, that certain persons have mistaken methods for policies.

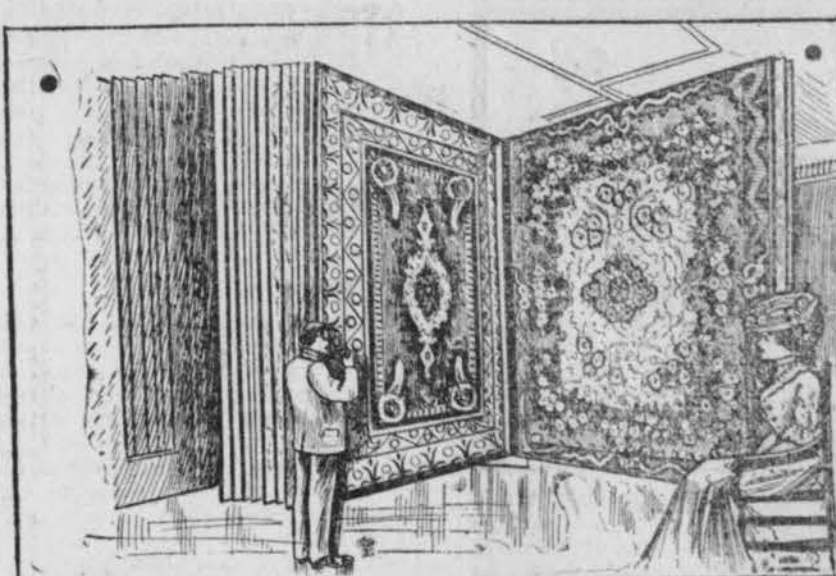

GOVERNMENT EXPERTS DOING AWAY WITH SMOKE

Plague of American Cities Conquered by Science—Remarkable Results Achieved at the Geological Survey Experiment Station at Pittsburg, Pa.

Washington, April 21.—The smoke plague of American cities has been conquered by science, according to the statement of federal experts who have been studying the problem for a number of years. They not only make the assertion that smoke prevention is possible, but stand ready to prove it by actual demonstration to anyone sufficiently interested and are proving it every day at the United States geological survey experiment station, at Pittsburg, Pa.

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The investigation indicates that the clean, comfortable American city with a normal amount of sunshine is not far off. Smokeless cities only await a quickened public conscience to the fact that this nuisance means uncleanness, poverty, wretchedness, disease and death. The public has only to realize that smoke in the cities costs in merchandise in stores and warehouses, more than six hundred million dollars a year.

GOVERNOR VEToes BILL.
Executive Saved the Day for the Minnesota Iron Ranges.

The people of Minnesota directly or indirectly interested in the iron mining industry of the state are much pleased with Governor Johnson's action in vetoing the tonnage tax bill. A few minutes after the governor's veto was sent to the house of representatives the news was spread over the wires throughout the state. All Tuesday morning there were reports that the bill had been vetoed, but they were untrue.

The people of Duluth are unanimous in their praise of the governor, declaring that he showed great courage and backbone and displayed the true qualities of statesmanship when he placed his veto on the tonnage tax bill.

In his message to the legislature Governor Johnson spoke straight from the shoulder and it is said that when it was read to the house the member broke into a round of applause which made the dome ring, and many of those who voted for the bill joined in the ovation. The governor is highly commended because he has risen superior to partisan and sectional considerations, and he now has more loyal supporters in northeastern Minnesota than ever before.

It is said that there is absolutely no possibility of the bill being passed over Governor Johnson's veto. If it comes to a vote in the house it is predicted that it will not even get the sixty votes necessary for original passage, not to speak of the eighty needed to override the veto.

In his message to the house the governor states that the measure threatened to violate the fundamental principle of taxation, that of equality, at the same time that it failed to meet the constitutional requirement of uniformity in taxing the same class of property. The effect of the bill, if made a law at this time, would be to strike a severe blow at the development and prosperity of all the great mining companies of north-eastern and north central Minnesota, also the agricultural, commercial, financial and educational interests.

The governor contended that had the counties of Northern Minnesota a legislative representation based on a just population apportionment the bill would never have passed. Fifty-nine counties of the state receive more money from the state treasury than they pay into it.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BUILDING INSPECTOR

PETER FITZPATRICK EXAMINED 1,465 FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS IN FIFTEEN UPPER PENINSULA COUNTIES LAST YEAR.

Copies of the twenty-sixth annual report of the Michigan Bureau of Labor and the sixtieth annual report of the various factory and building inspectors of the state, just issued by R. H. Fletcher, commissioner of labor, have been received here. The publication is by far the most complete that the department has ever issued. It contains, besides detailed reports of the inspectors in the various districts, much information as to the labor conditions.

Most of the building and factory inspectors submitted more complete reports last year than ever before. Besides a general review of the industrial conditions in their territory, each inspector gave much minor information as to the condition of hotels, schools, and other important public buildings.

Peter Fitzpatrick, of this city, who is the inspector for fifteen counties in the upper peninsula, furnished the department with a fine report of his inspections. It contains much information concerning the principal industries, public buildings, etc., in each county, also a number of excellent illustrations showing views at some of the most important mines and factories. Mr. Fitzpatrick's general review of his year's work is interesting, and is as follows:

Result of Inspection.
"During the year I inspected 1,465 factories and workshops, which employed 19,905 persons, of which 262 were between fourteen and sixteen years of age. I beg to state, however, that 200 of this number were employed only during the school vacation in berry season, and all resumed school at the opening in the first part of September. I will also say that the increase shown in the number of factories over last year does not necessarily indicate that that number of new factories were started during 1908, but is due to a more complete investigation. Furthermore, the decrease of employes as compared with that of 1907, has been largely due to the reduction of forces, caused by the stringency of the market, and set back, in latter part of October, 1907. A corresponding reduction in wages for 1908 has been made, owing to labor being more plentiful than in 1907. I found several iron mines, saw mills, shingle mills and lathe mills out of commission, which were being actively repaired by the company. I have also reported ninety-one accidents, an increase of nineteen over last year. I have issued 183 orders during the year, twenty-six of which were for the erection of fire escapes on schools, hotels, halls, stores, etc. The balance being for equipping boilers with low water alarms, repairing the same and safeguarding machinery, etc."

Inspected 277 Schools.
"I have visited and thoroughly inspected 277 schools, and I am pleased to report that I have found them in excellent condition, well provided with fire escapes and other means of egress and good sanitary conditions. Fire drill is practiced in all schools and doors open outwardly. I am sure the schools of the upper peninsula will compare favorably with the schools of the balance of the state. I found a number of fine and imposing new high schools in my travels, and quite a number of new ones in course of construction. The various cities are vying with each other to see which can get up the finest school, and some of them are fire proof."

"It has been a source of great pleasure to me to meet the school boards and superintendents in all schools and colleges. They were willing and anxious to provide everything that I might suggest or order to make the children absolutely safe in case of fire, and I can assure the parents of children of the upper peninsula that they need have no fear for their children's safety while they are attending school. The boards of education are all deeply interested in their duties and desire to comply with all the requirements of the law."

"Steam predominates as the power used, although electricity, water, air and gas are used to some extent."

"I have inspected 1,416 boilers, of which 1,138 were insured. There is ample work for a state boiler inspector to look after the uninsured boilers."

Hotels and Stores.
"I inspected 118 hotels during the year and found the majority of them in good condition, while some were only fair. They all complied of their business for the past year."

"I visited fifty-nine stores of ten employees and over, and I find they all comply with the requirements of the law."

Child Labor.
"As mentioned earlier in this report, after deducting the 200 children employed during the berry season in canning factories, etc., there remains only sixty-two for 1908 against 186 for 1907. Child labor is getting to be a thing of the past in the upper peninsula. Employers are beginning to realize that it is the most expensive labor in the end, and many firms and factories have posted notices prohibiting the employment of children under sixteen years of age, and they hold the foreman responsible for any violation of this order."

Timber Lands and Farming.
"This has been a disastrous year for parties owning timber land, owing to the destructive forest fires which started in September and lasted until Nov. 1. Vast tracts of forests were burned over and the loss of timber has been heavy. Active logging operations will be inaugurated the coming winter in order to save what they can of the burned timber. Also, owing to the lack of rain, farming products suffered greatly, but there is a fine market for such produce."

NEGAUNEE TO HAVE MODEL HIGH SCHOOL

INSTRUCTORS AND PUPILS WILL HAVE ADVANTAGES IN NEW BUILDING THAT ARE NOT USUALLY PROVIDED IN AMERICAN CITIES OF THIS SIZE.

Negaunee people who visit the new high school building are now beginning to realize what a beautiful structure it is and how well arranged and equipped the interior will be.

The statement that the auditorium will be one of the most attractive to be found in any school in the country is not exaggerated, as the room is certainly beautiful. Excellent taste has been displayed in the decorations.

The lighting fixtures for the auditorium will harmonize with the other color effects. There will be eight clusters, each with nine lights, suspended from the ceiling. The upper portion of the fixtures will be square, and the lights will be in two bunches, one above the other.

The balcony at the rear of the auditorium, which is entered through double doors from the second floor corridor, will be provided with 182 seats.

All of the class rooms, laboratories, offices, etc., are attractive. The doors of heavy oak open in both directions. There is a spring on the bottom which brings the doors into position after a person passes through them and all work without the least noise.

The domestic science department has been provided with three rooms, demonstrating kitchen and dining room. A solid oak sideboard, with three upper sections, and drawers below, is being built into the wall.

The auditorium, class rooms, laboratories, offices, etc., will be provided with Erick automatic clocks, which are to be installed by Patridge & Co. of Chicago.

The fire alarm system, which will be complete, will also be operated by a battery system. There will be several fire alarms at convenient points.

The gymnasium in the basement is being greatly admired. The room has been completed with the exception of the shaving and polishing of the maple floor.

The floor will be put in condition to be used for dancing. There are no obstructions anywhere in the room, as the running track, midway between the floor and ceiling, is suspended from the rafters. The floor space is seventy by sixty-three feet, giving it far the largest area of any entertainment room of the kind in the city.
