



MOVE FOR INCOME TAX. Senator Bailey's Proposition Will Test the Sentiment.

Indication That the New Tariff Bill Will Result in a Deficit Will Be an Argument in Favor -The Supreme Court Decision in 1895 Is Not Regarded as Final-Constitutionality of the Plan Has Been Passed Upon Twice-First Decision Was Favorable—Five New Members Since Last Ruling Was Made.

Washington, May 2.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas has challenged the United States supreme court, the Republican party and the sentiment of the country generally with a bill for an in-come tax. Mr. Bailey is a Democrat, and Democratic amendments to Republican tariff bills rarely become law. Neverthe less Senator Bailey's income tax proposi tion comes at a psychological moment No one knows exactly the amount revenue deficit predicated by the tariff bill, but it can be \$50,000,000. Something depends on the trimming by the senate of the very liberal drawback provisions of the Payne bill, something on the workings of the maximum and minimum feature, if it ever works, while both bills have vet to emerge from conference Washington sentiment, however, is rapidly turning toward the income tax idea. and the Bailey amendment comes at an opportune time. It provides for a tax of 3 per cent on dividends, which the Repub lican leaders also have had in mind; and its feature of chief popular interest is a 3 per cent tax on incomes in excess of \$5,000 a year. As Senator Bailey explained, the bill is substantially the income tax provision of the Wilson act of 1894; and the Texas senator estimates off-hand that it will produce revenue ris ing \$50,000,000 a year. The old law fixed the rate of taxation at 2 per cent and exempted incomes of \$4,000 and less.

Keeper Wittie, the only eye witness to the disaster, tells the following "With a blinding snow storm driven before a sixty-mile-an-hour gale from the northeast raging, that dashed the spray 150 feet high over the light house and into the water on the opposite side of the island, about 11:45 Friday morning I heard the distress whistle of a vessel about 200 feet east of the fog signal and, rushing toward the sound, saw a barge being driven at the mercy of the waves within hailing distance. While the crew were frantically en deavoring to hoist sail to clear the island, the craft was driven against the cliff below me and her bow crushed to splinters. Another swell and the boat was dashed to pieces on the rocks and for a moment I saw four of the crew in the water and heard one of them call "For God's sake, throw us a line." The men were fifty feet below me, and my utmost efforts to get a line down to them only resulted in its being blown back upon the rocks by the terrific gale, A

As the brave light keeper was stand ing on the rocks endeavoring to get life line to the drowning men, the waves momentarily threatening to wash him into the sea, a beam from the wrecked heavy ice had crushed in her plates and vessel was thrown on the island by the waves, which struck him full force and dislocated his shoulder.
