NEW YORK COURTS DRAW COLOR LINE

That in Eyes of the Law Negroes and Whites Do Not Suffer Equal Humiliation for False Arrest, Is the Stand Taken. New York, May 21.—A negro and a white man do not suffer equal humiliation in the eyes of the law for false arrest, according to the appellate division of the supreme court, which today sustained an order of justice Dugro, of the supreme court, reducing the amount of the damages awarded George Griffin, a Pullman porter, from \$2,500 to \$300.

The amount of damages in cases such as these depends upon a man's standing and circumstances. If he is colored, that fact should be considered."

Census Bill Hangs Between the Houses of Congress.

The Pathfinder Dam in Wyoming Is Completed After Three and a Half Years of Work—Hope for Ocean Mail Legislation at the Next Session—Comptroller Murray Trying to Improve National Banks—New Lincoln Cents Will Be Ready in August.

Washington, May 21.—The census bill is still suspended between the two houses of congress. Until it becomes a law the director of the census cannot proceed to carry out his plans for a great amount of preliminary work that must be done within the next few months. He is ready to subdivide the states into census districts, and would be glad to have supervisors appointed and ready for duty by the first of July.

But the greatest change in all the history of the valley has been brought about by the construction of the great irrigation system now well on its way to completion. Already the dreary prairie of plain and sky has been broken, and thousands of homes and fields of green dot the landscape. Lands which a few years ago were valued from one to five dollars an acre are increasing rapidly in value and now sell at from twenty to fifty dollars. Most of the land from which water is now available is in private ownership, but many of the farmers who have holdings in excess of that for which the government will furnish a water right must dispose of their land at reasonable prices.
