CUBAN GUN-BUYING MAY AFFECT THE TARIFF. Washington, June 1.—There is a great deal of interest evinced here in the recent contract made by the Cuban government for the purchase of 15,000 rifles in Germany and a large number of coast defense and field guns in France.

FEDERAL REGULATION. An interesting piece of legislation proposed in congress is a federal law regulating the shooting of migratory birds. It is held that congress has jurisdiction over ducks and waterfowl which migrate annually from one portion of the country to another and could pass an act establishing a closed and open season throughout the country for birds of this character.

It will be admitted, however, that the present regulation of hunting is in many states unsatisfactory. In a general way the birds get the worst of state legislation. The wide differences in regulatory laws, their frequent alteration and the constant complaints made against them all go to show that game is inadequately and often unscientifically protected.

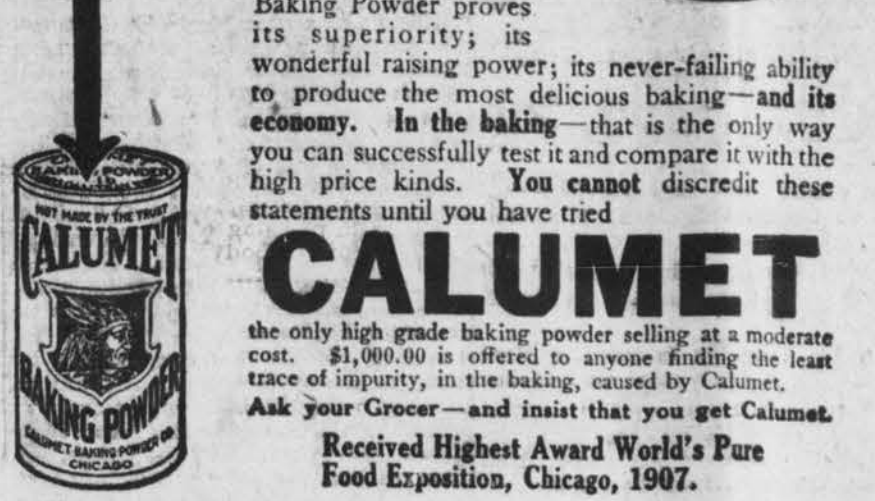

and saw the coming of the financial panic long before it actually burst upon the country and they stopped work with a good treasury and all debts paid.

The Amazon-Butte Copper company owns several hundred acres of mineral ground south of the Pittsburg & Montana mine, developed by shaft and crosscuts at a depth of 450 feet. The Amazon-Butte continued its exploration work after financial troubles came and incurred a considerable indebtedness by the time the property was finally closed but the stockholders got together and made the stock assessable.

Among the first to get out from under the troubles of finances was the East Butte Copper Mining company, which was organized nearly two years ago. Development work has been pushed since then and independent of the consolidation with the Pittsburg & Montana company, the East Butte is developing a good mine.

The Butte Central Copper company, organized to succeed the Butte Central & Boston Copper corporation in the ownership of the Ophir mine, has been completely financed and is now in shape to carry on exploration work indefinitely.

NOTES OF COPPER NEWS.

The work at the Arizona Commercial property is steadily proceeding and both the smelter and mine show the effects of the energy in prosecuting development and construction. It is expected to have the smelter in working order during August and that the mine will be able to supply the full capacity.

Butte & London.

Some of the other new companies of the Butte district, which have been shut down for several years on account of a lack of funds, are also expecting to resume work with an improvement in the copper and copper markets.

Colusa-Leonard.
