

If they should hold the 'wets' down to a close win, or, by some fluke should carry the county it would argue that there is more prohibition sentimen abroad than has yet been conceded, and that a vote on the question in the state would be no one-sided affair. In any event the vote in Kent county could not fail to have unusual significance.
