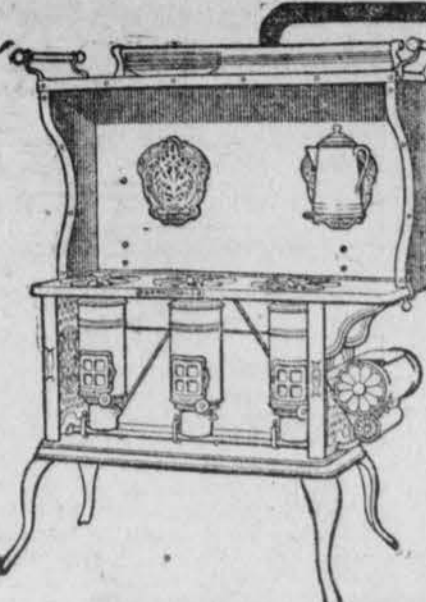

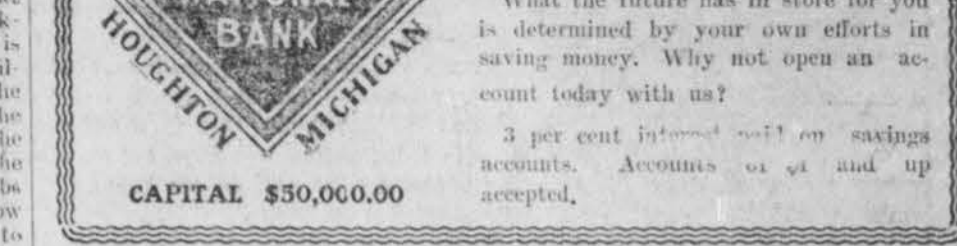

CUTTING DOWN EXPENSES.

Firm Stand in That Particular Taken by the President.

He Expects to Be Given Congressional Co-Operation—No "Pork Barrel" for Use in the Next Campaign—Mr. Taft Believes the States Should Not Have too Much Assistance.

Washington, June 15.—The necessity for strict economy in federal expenditures is being impressed on members of congress who call at the White House. No new schemes for borrowing into the already depleted treasury are to receive the sanction of the president, and he is counting on the co-operation of the leading Republicans in the senate and the house.

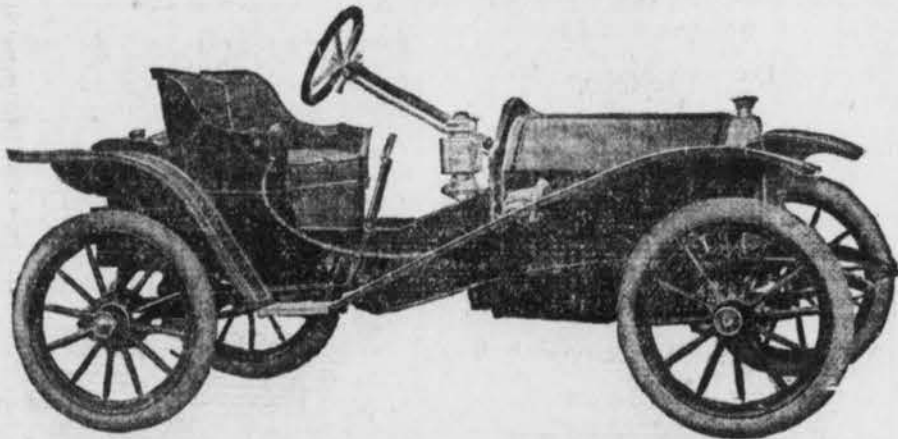

JURY STILL OUT IN GIBSON CASE

AFTER TEN HOURS' DELIBERATION IT HAS NOT AGREED UPON A VERDICT.

MURDER OR MANSLAUGHTER

Generally Supposed That Disagreement Is Upon Degree of Guilt Rather Than Upon Guilt or Innocence.

The Gibson murder case went to the jury at 11 o'clock yesterday, but no verdict has yet been returned. The jury members were locked in their room until 9 o'clock last night, and, as there seemed to be no prospect of an immediate agreement, they were taken to the hotel for the night, and will resume their deliberations this morning.

The general opinion seems to be that the jury is divided on the degree of Gibson's guilt, rather than on whether he is guilty or innocent. It is surmised that a part of the jury desires to return a verdict of murder without capital punishment, while the other faction believes the prisoner only guilty of manslaughter.

The court room was crowded yesterday morning when the arguments were opened by District Attorney Covell, for the prosecution, and every word he and Mr. Larmonth uttered was followed with the closest attention. Mr. Covell argued that on the evidence the jury should return a verdict of murder. He said that the prosecution had shown that Gibson killed McManus in cold blood, without giving him a chance to defend himself, and Mr. Covell asserted, the crime bore all the evidence of malice and deliberate preparation. He failed to see any extenuating circumstance that should sway the jury to find that anything less than a capital crime had been committed. His argument was strong and was vigorously put.

Mr. Larmonth handled his argument in an effective manner also. He talked in easy style, with little use of climax and his points were made simply and directly. The burden of his plea to the jury was that Gibson had killed McManus not in malice but in fear. The cause of the tragedy, he said, was the encounter between the men in which McManus had threatened Gibson's life. With this threat burned in his mind, Gibson, within the hour, slew McManus because he believed that otherwise McManus would slay him. Mr. Larmonth pictured the effect of a military training on the men who undergo it, and called attention to the ease with which a man in the army can obtain the weapons to carry out a purpose to kill. He pleaded with the jury to return a verdict of acquittal if they found that Gibson had acted in fear, and asserted that there was not a scintilla of evidence to show that he had acted in malice.

Judge Knappen charged the jury at length and with great care, making the law plain to its members. It was the comment of many who heard the charge that, in their opinion, it leaned somewhat to manslaughter as the crime committed by the defendant. The judge informed the jury that could return three verdicts, namely murder, murder without capital punishment or manslaughter. On the completion of the charge the jury withdrew.

Convicted of Smuggling.

During the afternoon, while the Gibson jury was out, another jury was drawn and the case of the United States vs. Thomas M. Rogers was disposed of, the defendant being found guilty of smuggling. The offense was committed at the Soo custom house. But few witnesses were introduced by either the prosecution or the defense, the latter seeking to show that neither technically nor in spirit had there been any violation of law. Before adjourning for the day was taken, Mr. Rogers' attorney gave notice that he would file a motion for a new trial on the ground of error. At his request, the court will take up the matter of sentencing Rogers and also David Lamere, convicted of timber trespass, the first thing this morning.

A start was also made in the case of the government against Mary LaBlanc, who is charged with smuggling, the alleged offense having taken place at the Soo. A jury was impaneled in this case, at which juncture the court was adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.

HANCOCK LIKELY TO RETAIN COLLEGE

MARQUETTE STANDS LITTLE CHANCE OF SECURING FINNISH INSTITUTION OF LEARNING.

The Finnish Lutheran synod of the United States, in session at Eveleth, Minn., this week, will be of unusual interest to the people of this city, inasmuch as the question of the removal of the Finnish college from Hancock will be decided. Some effort has been made during the past year to induce the college to locate in this city, the Hotel Superior having been spoken of as a desirable location for the institution. However, it is not thought that Marquette stands much show of getting the college, and it is probable that it will remain in Hancock, according to the following from a copper country exchange:

"A subscription has been started by those in charge of the Hancock Finnish college, for the purpose of raising a fund for the maintenance of the school, and a paper is being circulated among the business men of the city. F. Tolonen, business manager of the college, is one of those who is making the canvass, and interviewing merchants and others to get their names signed to the subscription list.

The amount which it is desired to raise is \$6,000, sufficient to guarantee the maintenance of the college, and the salaries of teachers for a period of at least three years. A larger amount than this will be needed, it is stated by those interested in the movement, but the balance will be forthcoming from the tuition fees received from pupils. The school is the only one of its kind in America, with a seminary department for the training of young men for the Finnish Lutheran ministry. It has been supported by the Finnish Lutheran congregations of the country, and is under the supervision of the Suomi synod, which devotes a considerable portion of its time at each annual convention to consideration of the affairs of the college. A large number of pupils attending the school come from Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Wyoming, Dakota and Eastern states in which there are large Finnish communities, besides which there are a number from Hancock and other towns of the copper country. The amounts received from tuition fees are insufficient to pay all of the cost of maintenance, and various entertainments, picnics, fairs, etc., are held in Finnish communities to raise funds for the benefit of the school. These sources of income are more or less uncertain, and it is desired to raise a fund that will insure the maintenance of the school for a period of at least three years. During the past couple of years the question of moving the school to some other location, either further west or to some Eastern point, has been agitated, and a very alluring proposal has been made by the city of Marquette, which offers the old Hotel Superior for the occupancy of the college. The matter of its retention in Hancock will again be discussed at the coming annual meeting of the Finnish Lutheran synod of the United States to be held next week in Eveleth. There is a sentiment among some of the directors and others in favor of removing the school to some more centrally located point, and the matter will be thoroughly discussed at the convention. Whatever decision may be arrived at relative to moving to some other city, it will not take place, according to a statement made by a prominent Finnish resident of Hancock, who has been influential in promoting the interests of the school, for several years yet, although it is not unlikely that in time it will be necessary to move elsewhere."

The powers conferred on the Russian council of ministers in June last year to make its influence felt in Finnish legislation against which the Finnish senate, as well as the diet, has hitherto protested in vain, have led to the crisis in which important constitutional issues are involved.

The Russian government has even gone so far as to propose the appointment of a joint commission of representatives of Russia and Finland to consider the advisability of giving the people of Finland the opportunity of electing representatives to the Russian duma, a step which would be equivalent to the reduction of the grand duchy to the position of a Russian province.

SCHOOL CHILDREN NUMBER 3,317. Annual Census Shows No Increase Over Last Year's Figures.

The annual school census, which has recently been completed under the direction of A. J. Richardson, shows that there are 3,317 school children in this city between the ages of five and twenty years.

Although the total is about the same as a year ago, a comparison by wards show some surprising changes. In the Second ward nearly 150 less children were found than were enumerated last year, which loss is made up by a gain of 100 in the Third ward and of between thirty and forty in the Fifth.
