Treaty of 1837.

The difficulty of roll-making began not long after the treaty of 1837 was made between the government and the "Ottawa and Chippewa Tribes of Michigan" so-called to distinguish them from the Ottawas further south and the Chip pewas farther north. These new tribes consisted of five bands composed of those who had straved or secended from the larger tribes-the Sault Ste. Marie, Mackinac, Little Traverse, Grand Tra verse and Grand River bands, Straving northward and southward, respectively from their ancestral homes, they made common cause in this treaty of 1837 and thus their descendants are entitled to share in the present distribution.
