Mining News. AMALGAMATED. New Chimney at Great Falls Smelter the Biggest in the World.

An event of the greatest importance to the mining industry in Butte occurred at Great Falls when the furnaces and gases at the Boston & Montana company's smelter in that place were returned into the new stack, the largest and highest in the world.

For several years the smelter has been working under the disadvantage of an inadequate fuel system, and in designing the new stack it was the desire to have a large capacity to handle the fuel.

Alleged Would-Be Dynamiter Killed.—After threatening it is claimed, to blow up the house occupied by his four children and wife, who recently secured a divorce from him, William Dufresne was arrested at Escanaba, and when his room at the Michigan Hotel was searched four sticks of dynamite, with caps and fuse, were found.

Mrs. R. H. Jenney, who has been spending the past month in Pontiac, has just returned. She was accompanied home by her daughter, Miss Gladys Jenney, who has been spending the past year attending school in Washington, D. C. They will spend the summer in Marquette.

A. J. Gilchrist, of Cleveland, one of the owners of the Gilchrist steamship line, was in the city yesterday, and testified before the local inspectors in the investigation of the accident at the Canadian Soo lock some time ago. The Perry G. Walker, of the Gilchrist fleet, was the vessel that rammed the lock.

Iron by Electricity—During the month of June fifty electric flat irons were sold by the city light and power commission, which is a record number for an equal length of time. There are now between 800 and 900 electric flat irons in use in the city, being by far the best popular of the many household conveniences on sale at the city hall.

"Hello Bill" Pleases—The Yankee Doodle Stock company presented one of the funniest farce comedies ever played in this city, "Hello Bill," at the opera house last night, to an enthusiastic audience. The play for tonight is the sensational melodrama, "Tracked Around the World." A waltzing contest will be held on the stage after the performance.

Played at Prison—The Yankee Doodle Stock company played one of their repertoire farce comedies, entitled "Hello Bill," at the branch prison yesterday afternoon, with the prison population for audience, the contractors having consented to give the men time to attend the performance. It is hardly necessary to say that the production was enthusiastically received.

Will Celebrate Fourth—The Swedish Crown society has decided to celebrate the Fourth at the Fair grounds Monday. The celebration will take the form of a basket picnic, in which the Skandia Aid society and the Scandinavians of Neegaunee and Ishpeming are invited to take part. No program has yet been arranged, but it is likely that music and dancing will be the chief attraction, if present plans of the committee are carried out.

Flies Poison Food—Health Officer Dr. Z. Vadnais has recently received from the state board of health a supply of placards, warning the public against the dangers from flies. A number of these placards have been posted about the city. It is stated that flies carry disease germs on their feet, wings and bodies, that all doors and windows should be screened; that flies bred in all kinds of filth; and that the pestiferous insects are frequently carriers of typhoid and tuberculosis germs.

Munising at Marquette—Munising and Marquette will cross bats at the fair grounds Sunday afternoon at 2:30. Marquette will go into the game determined to win, and Munising also is confident of victory. The result should be an interesting game. Manager Fox announces that hereafter children will be charged ten cents admission to the games. On Monday the Marquette team will play with Ishpeming at the latter city. Walsh, the new catcher, will probably make his initial appearance in the Ishpeming game.

Thos. Jefferson Here—The south window of Archambeau's clothing store attracted many people yesterday, where it is to be seen an artistic and original Fourth of July display. The window is appropriately decorated with flags and in the center is a life-size figure of Thomas Jefferson, writing the Declaration of Independence. The Declaration exhibited on the table is a facsimile copy of the original paper, which has been the property of Mr. Archambeau for a number of years. Back of the figure of Jefferson, on the wall, is a fine portrait of George Washington.

June Weather—The report of the Marquette weather bureau for the month of June shows that the average temperature for the month was 60 degrees, which is about one degree warmer than the average for June during the last thirty-three years. The month was exceptionally dry, with but 1.63 inches rainfall, or nearly two inches less than the average for the month. On but eight days did any rain fall, and the new were thirteen clear days, thirteen partly cloudy days and four cloudy days during the month. The maximum temperature recorded was 91 degrees on the 21st, and the minimum, 40 degrees on the 18th.

Building New Switch—The D. S. S. & A. railway is now building a switch from near the old polygon works to the "Issett & Sinclair" proposed rock crushing plant, to be located on the Blenheim farm, just across Whitestone creek. Mr. Sinclair will leave in a few days to purchase new machinery for this plant, which is expected to be in operation within two months. Two cranes are to be installed, which will have a capacity of 250 yards per day. As soon as the new plant is ready for operation, the Prospect street crusher will be dismantled. Issett & Sinclair have a contract for furnishing rock to the city of Detroit, which is keeping them fairly busy getting out rock.

Died in Detroit—A telegram was received yesterday announcing that Wil-

Ian LaFortune, formerly a resident of this city, had been found dead in bed at the Hotel Richter in Detroit, where he was employed as a baker. No further particulars had been received by the parents or brothers in this city up to last evening, and James LaFortune, Jr., a brother of the deceased, will leave for Detroit today. The deceased was thirty-six years of age, and had been away from Marquette for about sixteen years. During that time he has traveled extensively, but had frequently visited his relatives in this city, the last time last fall. In this city there are left to mourn his sudden death, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James LaFortune, two sisters, Jennie and Edith, and three brothers, James, Clifford and Albert.

INSURE WITH PETER WHITE & CO. FLAW IN HIGHWAY LAW.

May Apply Only to Counties That Have Adopted County System.

That the legislature in the rush of the last few days of the session was hasty and careless with many bills has been stated, and every day more weak features are being discovered in new acts which will undoubtedly be used as basis for attacks upon the validity of many of the laws enacted by legislators in their rush to get home and allow the prophecy of Speaker Campbell to be made good, that the session would be short.

Questionable phrases and sections have been found in the Warner-Grantton liquor law, the primary election law, and now the voluminous highway act has been found to contain a weak spot.

This was termed by the legislature a codification of all highway acts of the state, although the state has never had good success with that class of law-making. In manufacturing it whole sections and acts pertaining to this part of the state's activity were taken bodily for use in the new law. Among them was the act in regard to counties which had adopted the county road system containing a provision that no portion of the act should apply except to counties which had voted to adopt that system. Unfortunately some one neglected to change the word "act" to "section" and now the law is said to read that no portion of the act shall apply to any except counties which have adopted the county road system, which, it is said, may cause trouble, especially as to what provides for the raising of taxes. There is, however, some question as to what the courts will say regarding the word and some state officials believe the act will stand.

If, however, the court should hold that the whole act applies only to such counties as have adopted the county road system, as it reads, the whole highway system of the state might be endangered.

The assisting pianists will be Miss Mamie Svaenborg and Miss Margaret Gilmore, the former to play for Mrs. Oscar, the latter for Mr. MacPhail, while Mrs. Hellstrom prefers that her husband, in the absence of an orchestra, will play for her.

Mrs. Hellstrom's program is entirely new, with the exception of the waltz song from "Bonnie and Janet," previously sung here with the symphony orchestra and now to be repeated by request.

CANADA'S EMBARGO COMPLETE.

Coastwise Trade of the Dominion Now Restricted to British Vessels.

Halifax, N. S., July 1.—To the shipping interests of Canada, and of Nova Scotia particularly, July 1 is as the dawn of a new era of mercantile marine prosperity, for today the exclusion laws against foreign coastwise shipping become completely operative.
